Jonathan Foster writes:

As I write this letter we are in the midst of Jubilee celebrations. One of the enormously positive aspects of Queen Elizabeth II's reign has been her role as an honest, respectable and trustworthy head of state. In my last letter I touched on the central importance of love in the Christian faith, this time I would like to look at the issue of truth and how love and truth are connected.



You see, truth is important, but sometimes we can lose sight about just how important it is. For example, in one of the closest things to the human heart, relationships, being able to trust that we are being told the truth is critical, as not being able to trust someone effectively destroys the relationship. Being able to determine the truth in our workplaces is also important, can we trust a company to deliver what they say they can? Working with a dishonest colleague is extremely difficult, while working for a dishonest company is demoralising and corrosive to our own values. While we like to joke that all politicians are dishonest, catching the people who we trust to govern us in obvious lies and deceptions is deeply concerning. On a global scale, when countries gain a reputation for obscuring the truth with a multitude of lies it has enormous and long lasting consequences for global cooperation and the rule of law.

In John chapter 8 Jesus tells us "If you obey my teaching, you are really my disciples; you will know the truth, and the truth will set you free."

This is a bold statement and needs some unpacking. What is it we should obey? Well earlier in the chapter the religious people of the day had brought Jesus a woman found in adultery hoping Jesus would condemn her to death. Instead Jesus offered love and forgiveness over condemnation, and later on in the chapter explaining that the desire to kill is itself evil. Perhaps one of the clearest statements of Jesus' teaching is in John 13 where he gives the disciples a new commandment to love one another.

The people who heard Jesus were outraged. They couldn't understand why they would need to be set free. We like to think we are free, but when we engage in things such as dishonesty, hatred, violence and pride, as much as we might think they harm others, they also harm and imprison us. Perhaps this concept is best expressed in the words of Sir Walter Scott:

'Oh what a tangled web we weave, When first we practice to deceive,'

It is into this complex world of deception, hatred and pride that Jesus' words ring true. When we express the love that Jesus has shown us, we enter into the truth of the gospel. When we live lives of truthfulness we are set free indeed.

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

The Queen's canopy

Christ Church began celebrations at Forest Church, an outdoor gathering which meets in the afternoon once a month on the 4th Sunday. We planted an oak tree opposite the millennium yew as part of the Queen's Canopy. The children had great fun watering it in. Apparently they couldn't add too much water. We chose an oak tree because it is a British tree and could represent the stability that the Queen has given to our nation. Oak trees are also mentioned in the Bible. They are often places of meeting, Abraham had pitched his tent by the oaks of Mamre when three strangers came and told him that Sarah was going to have a child and they would be the start of a great nation.

Jubilee Exhibition

We hosted a Jubilee Exhibition of Royal memorabilia and photographs including a book of memories of the Coronation by Jean Glen who had been able to travel from Liverpool to London for the day. She wrote about the excitement which had sustained them through the rain and the kindness of Queen Salote of Tonga who kept the hood of her carriage down so people could see her despite the rain.

There were many memories and photographs of times when people had met the royal family from previous jubilee celebrations and Duke of Edinburgh and Queen's Guide awards. It was good to look back on the memories and see all the connections that we have had.

Items on display included a coronation mug, a presentation Welsh New Testament, along with some horses and corgies. Plenty of cakes and cups of tea were served. Before the exhibition closed each day, prayers were said to give thanks for Her Majesty's reign.







Service of Thanksgiving



On Sunday 5th June we held a service of thanksgiving followed by a picnic lunch. The service included the special Platinum jubilee anthem written by Graham Kendrick and Rend collective, prayers for The Queen and time to reflect on the Queen's personal faith which has sustained her through not just the past 70 years of leadership but the whole of her life.

As this was also Pentecost Sunday it was good to be able to note that the Queen does not lead through her own power but through service inspired by the Holy Spirit. The Queen has upheld her commitment "to seek God's grace to be a true and faithful witness unto the Lord" particularly through her Christmas broadcasts, which she writes herself.

Before her coronation the Queen was given a book of 33 daily devotions to help her prepare spiritually as well as mentally for what she was about to commit herself to. In one of them she was invited to pray "Lord Jesus, grant me grace to defend the Faith of thy Church, in my own heart and life; and with the whole company of the faithful to promote the work of the Church for the good of this people and the growth of thy Kingdom." It was a privilege to celebrate her commitment to this promise through the service.



And, of course, afterwards we celebrated with a traditional bring and share lunch. When we sing the National Anthem, we are actually singing a prayer that asks God to inspire and protect our Queen and give her a long life. God has answered that prayer giving her over 70 years on the throne, one of the longest reigns in history.

WOULD YOU LIKE TO HELP ACTION FOR STANNINGTON?

Alison Cook was interviewed by Carol Ritson about her life, faith, and his role as a Curate at Christ Church Stannington

Where did you grow up?

I was born and grew up in York, and trained in Infant school teaching at The College of Ripon and York, St. John's. I taught in two schools in York, and in the summer of 1986 while working as a volunteer instructor at the Christian Mountain Centre in Wales, I met Chris. After we married we moved to Jamaica where we taught in a boarding school on the top of a mountain. Then we lived on the Isle of Arran in Scotland where I worked as an outdoor instructor in a mountain centre. Our first two children were born during our time in Giggleswick and in 1994 we came to live in Stannington. I enjoyed being a stay-at-home Mum, three years training as a curate in Stannington. childminder. I have loved being able to care for and amazing to watch children grow up and see how their passions lead them on their career paths.

How and when did you become a Christian?

I always went to church, as a child, as a teenager, through college years, and into adulthood. 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Rivelin Valley Conservation Group

The Rivelin Valley Conservation Group (RVCG) receiving the 'Lifetime Achievement' and 'Overall began life in Sep 1991 based in Crosspool in Winner' awards. Sheffield. Local concern about 'anti-social behaviour' in the local woodland had brought about a meeting to tackle the problem. An action group was formed and Roger Kite (scout leader and Sheffield Council Principal Engineer responsible for footpaths), became chairman. Some members of the RVCG formed a task team to open up the local woodland and improve the footpaths to make it more accessible to the public and less attractive to The task team was well supported undesirables. and its work on Council owned woodland began to expand to adjacent areas. This included Carver Fields owned by the Sheffield West Methodist Circuit and eventually the Rivelin Valley itself to help improve the Rivelin nature trail and help maintain its mill ponds.

The RVCG committee also created other functions such as the monitoring and commenting on local planning submissions and inquiries whilst keeping an eye open for unsolicited building work. They invited experts to give guided walks and talks at 'Open Meetings', attending fairs and events with its own stall, organising visits to local places of interest. The RVCG continues to offer guided walks of and production of its own newsletter which is now in its 120th edition. All these functions directly involved the public and its membership began to swell. small annual membership fee was charged which is still only £3 per household today and the generosity of members through donations has kept the task equipment with Sheffield City Council providing nature trail in a close ongoing working relationship.

1998. Keith Kendall launched an RVCG publication, 'Walking the Rivelin' and now with co-author Sue Shaw, is currently in its 6th edition. In 2004, the Rivelin Valley Conservation Group was awarded the Duke of York's Community Initiative, recognising the quality of the Community Spirit and best practice in Community enterprise and leadership. In 2006, Roger Kite was awarded an MBE for his contribution to the community. In 2009, the **RVCG** also won the Sheffield Telegraph Environment Community Award and again in 2011

After 19 years, Roger Kite stood down as chair due to family commitments and was replaced by Graham Appleby who has been chair for the last 11 years. If you do the maths, the RVCG has just celebrated its 30th anniversary marking it with a sculptured stone bench in Rivelin Park which was revealed by the Lord Mayor of Sheffield, Councillor Gail Smith.


