# October Parish Newsletter from The Ven Derek Chedzey

**Harvest** – in our rural Diocese harvest is and can be a very important time for our communities. When I was in rural Mid Devon Harvest activities began in the

middle of August and ran all the way through to the end of October. It was often a real village celebration with Harvest suppers, church services and sporting challenges. I will never forget the Bishop of Exeter taking part in the sack race!

Different crops are ready at different times and for the farming community it can be a busy but also stressful time as everything is safely gathered in. As our climate changes the weather can make an enormous difference and the extremely hot dry periods of this summer will inevitably have reduced yields and caused many crops to fail. Whilst some will have rejoiced in the hot dry weather for the farming community drought is something to be feared because it destroys crops and creates problems for the coming season. If nothing else harvest is a time not just to give thanks but to pray for those who work on the land and help provide food for our tables. This year there is much uncertainty because the hot dry summer and war in Ukraine have both impacted our communities creating a perfect storm for those living and working on the land. The bible has a great deal to say about harvest and it is worth reflecting on how we view this celebration.

"Six days you shall work, but on the seventh day you shall rest. In ploughing time and in harvest you shall rest. You shall observe the Feast of Weeks, the first fruits of wheat harvest, and the Feast of Ingathering at the year's end." Exodus 34:21-22

For the Old testament writers harvest was associated with the rhythm of life and even at harvest time days of rest were not to be ignored. More importantly God's law required the people to give thanks and to celebrate by bringing the first crops harvested into the temple and given to God in celebration. Whilst we cannot imagine the church year without these celebrations it has only been part of the church calendar since Victorian times. The present tradition of celebrating Harvest Festival in churches began in 1843, when the eccentric priest Robert Hawker invited parishioners to a special thanksgiving service at Morwenstow in Cornwall. The idea quickly spread and many of the well-known harvest hymns we sing today came from the Victorian hymn writers who saw the opportunity that harvest offered to share the good news of Jesus. Jesus himself often used farming themes in his parables and made the link to the mission of God in the world to create new disciples.

"Later the Master selected seventy and sent them ahead of him in pairs to every town and place where he intended to go. He gave them this charge: "What a huge harvest! And how few the harvest hands. So on your knees; ask the God of the Harvest to send harvest hands. Luke 10: 1-2

Whilst we celebrate the physical harvest and enjoy the fruits of our labours, we should not forget that we are called to work to make disciples and join with God in building the Kingdom. The church is not a passive bystander but an active participant in sharing the good news of Jesus and the Harvest God calls us to join in is the one that leads to eternal life. By all means we should celebrate with our communities but never lose sight of God's purpose for the church.

# Message from the Rural Dean

For the cover pictures over the last few months I've been working through a series of photos of monasteries that I've taken over the last several years, and the picture of Whitby Abbey this month comes from 2013. These days, Whitby seems to be most famous for associations with Dracula – an appalling thought, but good for the tourist trade, I suppose.

Much more important is that it was where the Synod of Whitby was held in 664, hosted by the Abbess, St Hilda. The reason why this is important is that it was the occasion when the English Church, following the decision of King Oswy of Northumbria, elected to follow the Roman traditions and practices, rather than the Celtic. This allowed the English Church to be unified and organised during the following years, and become a part of the wider European Christian communion – and also illustrated a very different relationship between church and state from that exemplified by our late Queen!

But the picture has another importance. Whitby Abbey fell into disrepair on the dissolution of the monasteries during the reign of Henry VIII, and what is left is a dramatic ruin. This serves as a reminder that all our parish churches are maintained by the efforts of volunteers and from donations: neither 'The Church' nor 'The State' maintains those church buildings that are central to our villages and hamlets, it is all down to the devoted work of those who use them, whether often or occasionally.

We might, perhaps, see a link here with the story of St Francis, who is our Saint of the Month for October. Once again, I salute the loving service of those who are looking after our churches and church communities during vacancies.

#### Saint of the Month for October: Francis of Assisi

Franciscan spirituality is famous for its concern for the whole of God's creation, expressed in the *Canticle of the Sun*, from which we get our hymn 'All creatures of our God and King, lift up your voice and with us sing Alleluia!' This creation-wide focus is shared with Celtic spirituality, and there may well be a connection.

Assisi is in central Italy, a little south of Tuscany; just north of Tuscany is Bobbio, where a great monastery was founded in the seventh century by St Columbanus, an Irish missionary. It became very influential, and it is at least credible that the love of creation shown by the Celtic monks of Ireland fed into the tradition of these parts of Italy.

Francis was born in 1181 or 1182 to a wealthy merchant family, enjoyed a fairly riotous youth, and served as a soldier in the endemic local wars. But his soldiering experience and a serious illness caused him to take serious thought, and he experienced a vision in the church of San Damiano, in which God said to him 'Francis, repair my falling house'. Taking this literally, Francis sold a bale of goods from his father's warehouse to pay for repairs to the building. [NB This is a very relevant part of his story for those who belong to St Mary's in Stottesdon!]

The upshot was that his father disinherited and disowned him. Francis went away with nothing to 'wed Lady Poverty'. In 1210, Pope Innocent III authorised Francis and eleven companions to be itinerant preachers, the foundation of the Order of Friars Minor. People flocked to join the order, which had its headquarters near Assisi, and then built a further Friary at Bologna. The Friars called people to repentance and faith; they owned no property personally or corporately, avoided human learning or church office and had a special ministry to the very poorest and most needy.

Francis was eager to end the crusading movement, and went with a crusading force in 1219 to Egypt to appeal to the Sultan in person but met with no success. After visiting the Holy Land, he returned to Italy in 1221.

By this time the movement was developing into a formal Order, being divided into provinces around Europe and developing structure and organisation. Francis revised the rules of the Order, but kept humility, poverty and evangelical freedom at its heart, and then resigned his leadership.

In 1224, Francis was praying when he received the *stigmata*, the physical wounds in his body corresponding to the five wounds of Christ on the cross, and these he kept until his death in 1226. St Francis is one of the patron saints of Italy, and is patron saint of animals. His feast day is on October 4<sup>th</sup>.

# October Molecule of the Month Levodopa and Carbidopa



Many readers of the Wheatland News will know about Parkinson's Disease.

Those who suffer from this have problems with making movements, due to a

problem in a part of the brain called the basal ganglia. When we decide to walk or pick up an object, it is important that all our muscle movements are co-ordinated. To do this, the brain sends a signal to nerves in the basal ganglia that effectively act as an "on-switch", to begin the series of movements that will result in us taking a step or moving an arm. However, in people who have Parkinson's disease, the nerves that form on the key connections within the basal ganglia have died and so the individual can no longer make the movement, much as they would wish to. However, there are treatments that can slow the progression of the disease. The nerves that have died work by releasing a chemical called dopamine; this activates another set of nerves that set the movement in motion. By supplying the brain with the missing dopamine, it is possible, at least for a time, to correct the problem. This has transformed the lives of people with Parkinson's Disease.

The simplest option might be just to give people tablets containing dopamine. However, this will not work (see diagram below).

Firstly, the dopamine is unlikely to ever reach the correct cells in the brain. The brain is very careful about what substances can reach it; the blood vessels that serve the brain are impermeable to many chemicals, including dopamine.

Secondly, dopamine has many unpleasant side-effects, activating cells outside the brain; giving dopamine would trigger all of these. Instead, a drug called I-DOPA or levodopa is given. This is what nerve cells use to make dopamine. It can cross into the brain, be taken up by surviving nerve cells in the basal ganglia and turned into

dopamine. Thus, when the person decided to walk or pick up an object, the circuits in the basal ganglia can work again.


dopamine by an enzyme called DOPAdecarboxylase. This is blocked by carbidopa. Dopamine is made in the brain from L-DOPA; dopamine itself cannot get into the brain as it cannot cross a "seal" around blood vessels in the brain called the blood-brain barrier (BBB), neither can carbidopa. However L-DOPA can pass through this and so can be given as a drug to restore dopamine in the brain.

DOPA is converted to

Levodopa is good, but it still has problems. There are cells outside of the brain which can also turn it into dopamine, and this will then be able to cause the same unpleasant side effects as would occur by simply giving dopamine. So typically, the patients are also given a second drug alongside levodopa, called carbidopa. Carbidopa inhibits the enzyme that converts levodopa to dopamine; in simple terms, it stops cells making dopamine. However, if carbidopa acted all over the body it would stop nerve cells in the brain from doing, defeating the very point of giving the levodopa in the first place. Fortunately, this does not happen. The trick is in the way blood vessels in the brain will only allow a very few substances to cross through them to get into the brain itself. Unlike levodopa, carbidopa cannot cross the "blood-brain barrier", the technical term for the shield that stops all and sundry from getting into the brain through blood vessels. Thus carbidopa will only stop the production of dopamine outside the brain, preventing side effects whilst allowing it to be made where it is needed, in the basal ganglia.

Levodopa is far from the perfect answer to Parkinson's disease; it will help reduce symptoms but is not a cure. There is much research into ways of reversing or compensating for the process of cell death, the ultimate cause of the disease.

# **Billingsley**

The Revd David Poyner writes:

Harvest this year at Billingsley took the form of two events. On Thursday the 8th September, a group met in the orchard opposite the church to celebrate the fruit and "wild harvest". We were picking up on a number of traditions connected with orchards, that start with "wassailing" immediately after Christmas when a crowd would gather to drink and shout loudly to scare away evil spirits from the trees, through Easter and May to harvest itself. We listened to the Gloucester Wassail Carol, read a collection of apple-themed verses from the Bible, sang a hymn, scattered bread for the birds and blessed the trees by pouring cider over their roots. We drank the rest of the cider and retired to church to eat apple-cake and apple tarts. Ellen also provided the equivalent of the corn-dolly, the "apple Queen"; a doll with a crabapple for a head (see photo). This was followed on the Sunday by the traditional harvest festival in church, again with refreshments afterwards. We did hope to have a guest preacher but she had to cancel as she was needed to take prayers for the Queen in Bridgnorth; we hope she can come in October. We had almost 20 people at our two services.

The orchard service took place only a few minutes after the news was released of the death of the Queen. We tolled the bell just before the service and said prayers for the late Queen and King Charles during the service; these were repeated at Harvest itself.

Our final evening service this year will be on **Sunday 9th October at 6pm**, when we hope Jane Peeler will be able to talk about her work as an Anna Chaplain. This is a form of ministry that specifically looks to the spiritual needs of the elderly; it takes its name from Anna, the old woman and prophetess who acknowledged the infant Jesus as Messiah when he was taken to the temple to be circumcised. Anyone interested in pastoral care for the elderly is welcome to attend.

# **October Message**

I'm writing this on the day after the late Queen's funeral, and I guess that, even when this issue goes to press, that will still be an event that is prominent in our thoughts. There were two particular things that struck me in all that was said during that day – one from the funeral service in Westminster Abbey, the other, I think, from the committal at St George's Chapel, Windsor.

The first comes from Archbishop Justin Welby's excellent sermon in the Abbey. In it he said words quoted this morning on the front of the Financial Times: 'People of loving service are rare in any walk of life. Leaders of loving service are still rarer.' At a time of international tension and internal wrangling, it would be comforting to think that some leaders would think about the late Queen's example. Bearing in mind that an estimated 63% of the world's population watched the funeral, this is a message that has had good media coverage!

The second comment was made, I think, by the Dean of the Chapel Royal in Windsor. He described the Queen as having an 'uncomplicated but profound faith'. This, I would hope, may be a message to 'The Church'. How complicated we sometimes make matters of faith! How complicated and obscure our language often is! How incomprehensible our debates and discussions so often are! And yet how simple the central message of Christianity really is! Faith does not have to be complicated to be profound and life-guiding.

Perhaps this is the advantage of having our sovereign as Supreme Governor of the Church in England: not a scholar, not a theologian, not even a member of the clergy, but an ordinary man or woman of faith, practising that in their everyday lives of loving service. And a man or woman who is in the spotlight so much of their life, so that the loving service is clear and visible to all, and the source from which it springs is open and apparent.


So many people have given thanks for Her Majesty's life and service; so many people pray for the same strength to be given to King Charles III as he begins his reign.

# Catherine Mary Preece – 1924 – 2022

The oldest person with strong links to our community and church, **Mary Preece**, died on 12 July, aged 98 years. Mary and her late husband, Eric for many years gave great service to our church and community and we are indebted to them.

A service of celebration and thanksgiving for Mary took place on July 26 and from that her daughters' Ruth and Bronwyn have given permission to us to share these extracts from the tribute.

"Catherine Mary Preece was born at Sutton House, Chelmarsh in 1924. She weighed in at two and a half pounds, and was dressed for months in doll's clothing! Her parents, Fred and Eva Breakwell, were farmers. The family moved for a while to Tenbury Wells then, along with brother John, returned to Tedstill farm, near Middleton Scriven.

Mary attended Deuxhill School where she met Eric Preece; they were married for over 60 years, and had two daughters, Bronwyn and Ruth. Their home was at Walkhamwood Farm at Faintree, where Eric and Mary farmed for 55 years before retiring to Chorley. Mary was a busy farmer's wife, working alongside Eric: she milked cows, drove tractors and lambed sheep.

During the war, she was in the Land Army and drove lorries collecting Prisoners of War to take to work on local farms. She always wanted to drive a tank, but had to settle for a quad bike instead! There was something of a driving theme through Mary's life: when she and Eric were fixing up their bungalow to retire to, Mary went to Montgomery to buy a cooker, and came back, much to Eric's surprise, with a car.

Mary loved horses, and attended all the local shows. Her hobbies were to do with craftwork: spinning, weaving and rug-making, all good traditional cottage industries. Mary had a long and busy life, but always found time to help wherever she could, and she and Eric are remembered here as strong supporters of this church. She passed away peacefully at the grand age of 98."
