# Wind, Fire and a Parrot

As this issue of Eleven Says comes out, we are in the season of Pentecost - the festival of the Holy Spirit. It was once one of the three great holiday periods of the Church's year, along with Christmas and Easter, but eventually all that was left of this celebration was Whit Monday, which became the Spring Bank Holiday in 1971. But to me this festival always brings to mind a French story by Gustav Flaubert, which I read as a teenager many years ago.



The story is called 'A Simple Heart', and tells of a country girl called Felicité. Felicité spent her unexciting life as a servant, giving her life and love unstintingly to those around her.

The family she served was given a parrot, green with blue wingtips and a bright scarlet breast, with which Felicité developed a strong bond.

Her religious faith was as simple as her life, and at Mass she would look at the stained-glass window in the church that depicted the Holy Spirit as a bird. She thought the bird looked very like her parrot, and in time the two became merged in her mind, so that she would say her daily prayers at home in front of the parrot. The climax of the story was Flaubert's description of her death. As a blue mist filled the room, Felicité began to smile, and at her last breath she believed she saw the heavens opening, and a gigantic parrot descending on her head.

Reading this, it was easy to feel superior: to be amused by her simple faith, or to condemn it as idolatry. But the story stayed with me, and I have increasingly realised that it was giving me a wonderful insight into God's generosity. God rewarded her faithfulness with the vision she most wanted to see - the Holy Spirit in the person of a parrot, welcoming her home. And now, I think, why not? Why not a parrot? How can we describe the Holy Spirit - something we cannot see with our normal eyes? Recently it has struck me that the descriptions in the Bible are equally illustrative. The Spirit descended on Jesus at his baptism like a dove; the sound of the Spirit's presence that the disciples heard in the enclosed, upstairs room on that first Pentecost (the fiftieth day after Easter) was like a strong wind and the room was filled with a light that looked like tongues of fire. Even Jesus himself, in describing to Nicodemus the new life in the Spirit, used the image of the wind that 'blows wherever it wishes; you hear the sound it makes, but you do not know where it comes from or where it is going.' Rev. Nick Garrard, in his article earlier this year, drew attention to the Celts' representation of the Holy Spirit as wild goose, with its mysterious migration - a free spirit.

In imagining the scene where the Pharisee Nicodemus visited Jesus at night, in secret, the writer Leslie Weatherhead thought they would probably have met in a shuttered, upstairs room. He envisaged Jesus crossing the room and throwing open the shutters to let the night breeze in as he said, 'the wind blows wherever it wishes'. Just as Jesus might have thrown open the shutters, the previously nervous disciples threw open the doors and rushed out, so inspired by their encounter with the Spirit that they spread the Good News of Christ in a variety of languages; so ecstatic, in fact, that people thought they were drunk!

So here we are, celebrating the festival of the Spirit, and the birthday of the Church that spread across the world, because, just as the genie can't be put back in the bottle, so the Spirit can't be contained in a shuttered room. And I shall continue to enjoy Felicité's vision of the Holy Spirit as a parrot, vivid, exuberant, talkative - even, I might suggest, a good model for the Church today. After all, the liturgical colour used for the altar frontals and robes at Pentecost is red!

Happy Pentecost!




#### What would He say to you?

## Easter at St Andrew's Church, Framingham Pigot

Holy Week in the Thurton Benefice is celebrated with a Compline service in one of the churches on the Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday evenings.

On Maundy Thursday it is traditional for St Andrew's to host the Holy Communion Service to commemorate the Last Supper. This includes the act of washing the feet of the congregation by the clergy, for those who are happy to take part, and is symbolic of Jesus washing the feet of the Apostles. Also as part of the service is the Stripping of the Altar to leave the Sanctuary bare and is symbolic of the humiliation of Jesus at the hands of the soldiers.

Another tradition is to have an Altar of Repose in the small side chapel in the church. This is a temporary altar which symbolises the tomb of Our Lord where the Communion hosts consecrated during the service are placed, or



"reserved", for use on the following day, Good Friday. The chapel is decorated with arrangements and vases of white flowers and many candles.

At the end of the service the interior of the church is left in darkness, apart from the candles burning in the chapel, and some of the congregation quietly depart and others stay to pray silently during the period of The Watch, which recalls how Jesus invited his Apostles to stay with him while he prayed.

On Good Friday it was the turn of St Andrew's to be the starting point for the Pilgrimage to the other churches in the

Benefice. A short service of Holy Communion was held in the church, using the 'reserved host' from the Maundy Thursday service.

A happy group of 'pilgrims' led by Cate, our Curate, then left the church and took it in turns to carry the large wooden cross along the footpaths to the next church, St Mary's in Yelverton, followed by St Peter & St Paul in Bergh Apton and St Ethelbert's in Thurton.

#### TONY BROADBERRY - 1946 - 2023

Tony was a Norfolk boy born and bred. Born in Cromer and educated locally, he left school at the age of 16, going to work for Norwich Union (now Aviva) where he stayed all his working life. "Steady as you go" was his trademark phrase.

Tony had so many noteworthy qualities it is difficult to know where to begin. His generosity of spirit, innate humility and caring for others all shone out. He was a natural sportsman and pursued a wide range of sports throughout his life. He had a good eye for the ball and excelled in tennis, table tennis, squash and hockey to mention but a few of the games he played.

And there were other sports too: he was a keen cyclist, covering the length and breadth of the Norfolk countryside, and he loved kayaking and surfing the waves (usually in Cornwall). In all these things, and in other areas too, Tony loved to encourage others young and old, and had the great ability to make them feel good about their efforts, whatever their standard.

In his younger days Tony represented Norfolk Juniors at tennis and later had a year playing in the Norfolk County team and represented Norfolk at County week. He even met Angie playing tennis on number 2 court at Cromer, she remembers it well.

Angie and Tony married in 1970 and shared 52 years of life together, bringing up their two children, Paul and Claire. Their first years were spent in Norwich, but they then moved to Ashby St Mary and subsequently Thurton, spending a total of 41 years in the area. They were both well-known and much loved by the community in which they became involved in many different ways. He was quietly present in many aspects of church life. He was a regular and key member of the annual Holiday Club (organized by Angie), and proudly kept his name badge in his desk - his Holiday Club name was "Gopher". And he rendered invaluable help in maintaining the churchyard using, amongst other things, that strimmer mentioned above.

Many people attended Tony's funeral from all walks of his life. Donations in his memory were given to Ride On, a charity which encourages cycling for all, and the charity also received Tony's trike, a cycle that he loved, and which only he seemed to be able to master.

Verses from Psalm 23 were used for the bible reading at the funeral, a psalm which reminds us that The Lord is our Shepherd. What more could one need. The Lord watches over our coming and our going throughout life from the time we enter this world to the time we leave it again. And even in that final journey we are not alone, for He is with us. Jesus is our Good Shepherd, who has gone before us dying, as we all must, but rising again on the third day (the Easter story). And in rising, He conquered death, so that we who follow may also share in the great Christian Hope of the Resurrection with sure confidence in Him who is the way to God the Father.

We remember Tony with great fondness and affection, thinking too of Angie and the family, and giving thanks for the life we have shared on this earth. Life goes on. "Steady as you go", Tony.

# South Yare Wildlife Group

The news is often bleak when it comes to nature and the environment and it is hard to know how we can all personally make a difference. However, we do have positive power to make a change: we might not be able to set up a 500-acre nature reserve tomorrow, but we all have a choice as to how we use our garden spaces.

If you look at the statistics the total area of private gardens in the UK is estimated at 433,000 hectares or 4,330 square kilometres, more than a fifth the size of Wales. For England the area is more than four and a half times larger than that of our National Nature Reserves! This illustrates that we can actually make a real difference for nature – together we are strong.

Even by giving just a small area there are so many exciting projects that you can do to bring wildlife and biodiversity into our gardens.

- If you are interested to find out more, the South Yare Wildlife Group are running 'Wild Patch' Open Gardens for the second year. Nine local inspiring wildlife gardens will be open to the public on June 11th 2023 from 10.30 to 4pm, entry is free (see online map for details). This is a great opportunity to see the varied ways other gardeners have opened their garden spaces to help wildlife flourish. You also get to meet the gardeners and share your ideas and experiences.
- Wild Patch Gardens are just one of the campaigns that SYWG are promoting. We are also trying to encourage **Community Climate Action** and our next meeting will be at the Margaret Mack Rooms, Rockland St. Mary, with

Professor Rupert Read, on Monday June 12th at 7.00 p.m. A direct Community Climate Action initiative is The 5 Mile Network, which encourages local people to share resources and skills within a five mile radius, thus strengthening community

links and reducing transport costs. The 5 Mile Network meets on the first Monday of the month at Bramerton Village Hall; i.e. June 5th, July 3rd.

A future date for the diary is the Loddon Wildlife Activity Afternoon on Sunday 15th July at the Jubilee Hall, Loddon. For more information see:

## Climate Action in Rockland St. Mary with Hellington

As we continue to see eye watering price rises for our fruit and veg it has now made me look more locally for our daily needs. Good quality, cheaper day to day fresh produce on our doorstep.

In Rockland St Mary local residents, land workers, nature lovers came together to discuss plans to cope with extremes of weather and rethink different ways of growing crops locally.


Early in the year The South Yare Wildlife Group held a meeting with residents and introduced a leading environmentalist, Professor Rupert Read, who underlined the threat that man made climate change poses and discussed the possible responses to it.

In March local residents came together to brainstorm ways of change and what they would like to see happen in the community.

In April The South Yare Wildlife Group and the Alderfen Marshes team held a seed swap event at Bramerton Village Hall which produced an excellent response towards growing and nature. e.g. no mow May (supported by SNDC). Dr Ian Bedford, an entomologist, gave a talk at the Rockland St Mary Gardening Club on how insects need all year round habitat not just May.

A local resident, retired reed cutter, Walley Mason, gave a talk at Easton College on traditional methods used for reed cutting, which left a better habitat for wildlife and the environment as opposed to today's methods. Traditional scything is used at the community nature reserve in Hellington with Rockland.

The next public meeting for the South Yare Wildlife Group is



The song thrush is a familiar garden visitor that has a beautiful and loud song. The broken shells of their blue, spotty eggs can often be found under a hedge in spring.



of food, but earthworms make up a large part of their diet. When the ground becomes too hard to get at them, song thrushes will eat snails instead. To get at the meat inside, they take the shell and crack it open by banging it against a stone 'anvil'. This behaviour is unique to these birds.





## Bramerton

#### The 'Key' to St. Peter's Church, Bramerton .

Nobody could remember when the main door was last locked nor indeed when there had last been a key! A locksmith was asked about having a new key made and a figure of £800 was quoted, so that idea was shelved on cost grounds. However, thinking it cannot be that hard to make a key, an offer was made to examine the lock and make a new key by Peter Smith who had previously made a key for the Rose Chest.

Having carefully removed the outer wood casing and metal lock, and taken it apart, although rusty it was found to be intact and of fairly rustic components which just required cleaning and lubricating.



The type of mechanism and spring indicated that it would have been made by a blacksmith possibly before 1730 as that was when springs changed to a 'wishbone' profile. It is not the original lock as there is a second keyhole in the door slightly to one side. A similar lock on Holy Trinity Loddon has the date 1710 on it, so maybe the locks were made by the same person, and it would be interesting to compare the keys.

Two keys were made, with the second being a simpler 'skeleton' key as a backup. A small lead plaque was attached to the inside of the wood casing recording when it was restored for when it is perhaps removed in another 300 years' time. So once again, Bramerton Church can be locked.

# The Bishop of Norwich, Graham Usher encourages parishes to take part in Churches Count on Nature

Parishes across England and Wales can now register to participate in Churches Count on Nature, an annual scheme where people visit churchyards and record the plant and animal species they encounter.

The biodiversity survey, supported by environmental charities A Rocha UK and Caring for God's Acre, as well as the Church of England and the Church in Wales, will take place from June 3rd to 11th, 2023.

In the last two years, 900 counting events took place across churches in England and Wales, and over 27,000 wildlife records were submitted to Caring for God's Acre. Churches across all denominations take part in the count each year.

Bishop Graham is the Church of England's Lead Bishop for Environmental Affairs. Bishop Graham says;

We are very excited about large numbers of churches across the country signing up to take part in Churches Count on Nature again this year. Hundreds of thousands of people will be watching Sir David Attenborough's new documentary on wildlife in the British Isles.

Registering for this initiative is a brilliant way for churches to encourage a local response and help to restore the natural habitats on our doorstep. The event will help us determine the level of biodiversity in our churchyards and will be a great opportunity to bring people of all ages together to appreciate the natural world.

As I read the Gospels, I'm struck by just how much nature is noticed by Jesus. We can join with him in seeing our lilies of the field, the thistles in crops, and the birds of the air.

As Christians, we have a responsibility to care for God's creation, and participating in Churches Count on Nature is just one way in which we can demonstrate that care.


