#### **NEWS FROM ANDREW FANSHAWE**



Dear Friends,

On this Easter weekend we just wanted to write and wish each of you a very blessed Easter and we pray that the truth of what we celebrate in this season will permeate your hearts and that we will never loose the wonder and awe of the fact that He who had no sin, became sin for us, so we may become the righteousness of God.

This will be a simple email as we are on a family trip driving a 1000km to another Iris base where we will minister at a easter conference that will be taking place. Please pray God will keep us safe on the long drive and use us powerfully as we are there.

We also wanted to update you on the house. God has amazingly provided the money that we needed to put a large enough down payment on the house so we can borrow the rest from the bank. The bank are still just waiting for one more document from the sellers but we are almost there! When we told our neighbour that we managed to get enough money to buy the house, she fell down on her knees with tears in her eyes, thanking God. So I guess she was rather happy we would stay but she also knew that we needed a miracle for it to happen and so it was a good testimony of God's provision for her and those around us.

We would also like to ask you to continue to pray for my mum. She had a successful mastectomy and recovered well but on the 2nd of April will under go 5 sessions of radiotherapy. Please pray that her body will react well to this and that she will not get too tired.

Finally, on Monday our next mission school starts. It is always one of the highlights of the year as we train and raise up the next generation of missionaries that come from various nations around the world to be with us. This year we have a larger number of families involved than usual which will give us a new challenge in logistics. We have 6 families, who

between them have 13 children and that is apart from all the singles that will be coming. I do a lot of the teaching on the school and would appreciate your prayers that God would release his revelation, anointing and authority on me as I speak and please, as always continue to keep Claudia and the children in your prayers during this time.

We have much more to write but we have to get to bed as we will get up early in the morning to hit the road again, but we didn't want easter to pass with out sending you our love and thanks for all your prayers and support.

Jesus is alive!

Educaid - Learning for Life March/April, 2024 - Update for Christ Church, Douglas-in-Parold

Greetings to everyone at Christ Church, Parbold from us all here at EducAid in Sierra `Leone. We wish you all a very happy Easter that renews our lives in both Parbold and Sierra Leone. We hope, too, that 2024 brings Peace throughout the world.

This update is in two parts - the first part is from Miriam, the Country Director of Educaid Sierra Leone which provides a few bullet points identifying just some of the current work of EducAid. Her notes identify a mind boggling range of involvements that are taking place in challenging circumstances. She writes -

I hope that all is well with everyone at Parbold Douglas Church.

-We are working with over 30 new schools using a new AI tool to help remote, untrained qualified teachers have access to resources and guidance via WhatsApp.

We are continuing our work with 65 primary schools supporting 13,000+ children in a big school improvement programme that is seeing some great positive changes in literacy and numeracy learning.

We are continuing our work with 10 senior secondary schools, helping teachers focus on

- Respectful relationships and
- Teaching for real learning.

We are continuing our work with 118 schools in Freetown to support school leaders in providing for the different needs of girls and boys (a gender responsive school leadership programme)

-We are working with a growing number of primary schools on foundational literacy and numeracy, using tablets - each child has a 30 minute session each day on the tablet with a headset and a personalised lesson.

Our own schools continue to do great stuff -

- we have got ICT labs going again in Lumley, with and Rolal and Maronka coming soon
- sports days happened last term for all schools
- Rolal has a new student-led "Ministry for the Future" that will be engaging kids in exciting activities about the challenges and opportunities that lie ahead

# **Educaid - Environment Action**

EducAid works to increase the environmental awareness and appreciation of children and young people. We offer our students opportunities to learn about climate change, pollution, deforestation, biodiversity loss, and how these issues affect us in Sierra Leone and globally. Our programmes teach students renewable energy, waste reduction, water conservation, and many other sustainable practices. This past term our Lumley school has been part of several hands on learning experiencewswhere they have participated in beach cleaning and re-cycling.

# **EducAid - Technology**

EducAid is working to include technology in education and best use it as a tool. This semester has seen a new computer lab set up at our Lumley School (pictured), and we are working to open others across all EducAid's sites! Teachers at EducAid Sierra Leone's schools have been using TheTeacher.AI - Fab Data's WhatsApp chatbot, to understand how best to use these important tools to improve education.

EducAid, in collaboration with Imagine Worldwide, has also been working on improving numeracy and literacy across the Port Loko district through the aid of tablets.

We are so proud of the inspiring achievements made by those in the EducAid community and wish you the best of success in your futures.




**Educaid - Equality News**
