DEAF BUT HEARS GOD'S WORD

Emily Owen is a remarkable woman by any standard.

At the age of 21 and already having lost the hearing on one side and damage to a facial muscle which affects the way she looks, Emily was given a life or death ultimatum, go totally deaf or die! That was when she had a third major operation in six years but throughout that time her faith was rock strong and remains so, writes Mitch Irving.

He says: "I met her when I went on a retreat 'In Between Times" that she led at Launde Abbey and told those attending how she has written several books, many of them Bible based but including a personal memoir of her life to date, and of God's goodness. I had seen her before when she gave a brief talk at a book signing morning at The Vine in Hinckley."

Problems with her health began in her early teens when she had difficulty walking in a straight line and suffered terrible headaches. Two massive tumours were discovered and the subsequent operation caused her to go deaf in the first ear, only for the problems to re-emerge when she had started at university which resulted in her losing her hearing completely and having to give up hopes of a career in education.

"Her testimony was an example to many. The title of the retreat she said came from the fact it was between Easter and Pentecost but it is also indicative on a personal level to her of the gaps in her life amidst the major operations – even now when she goes for annual checks scans show the many tumours in her body."

For those attending the retreat there was also a surprise when it was revealed that BBC TV cameras and presenter Pam Rhodes would be filming two episodes of "Songs of Praise", one of which has already been shown, during their stay.

"I encountered her a couple of times and she was really lovely, apologising for interrupting our retreat," adds Mitch.

VINE MANAGER LEAVING

GIVE FREELY – AS PCC RECEIVES

In the Old Testament people were encouraged, if not required, to give a tenth of their produce or property each year to thank God for his goodness.

It was known as a tithe which means tenth and, in the same way today, SS&SJ parochial church council (PCC) makes donations to charities and good causes in the same proportion from what they receive, in dividends from the shares they hold, interest, and the total amount of regular giving by worshippers.

St Simon & St Jude PCC has just made this year's allocations to the ones they support.

Beneficiaries of the full portion of £849.76 each are the Church Mission Society, Home for Good, Christians Against Poverty and the Barwell and Earl Shilton Street Pastors. Those getting a half portion of £424.88 are Mercy Ships and the Children's Society.
