We were fascinated by the use of voles under plastic sheeting to prepare his soil, as well as his work on supporting seed banks with mixed varieties of seeds. A butterfly walk on July 23rd with a picnic for all the family was also a big success. A talk by Lauren Holt, NT Area Ranger and Oscar Chambers -Smith of the Beaver Trust, on September 9 in Cross Memorial Hall, 7pm, promises to be fascinating. Lauren will tell us about her plans for the Mendip Hills and Oscar will surprise us on what beavers are up to in Somerset. Suitable for all the family.

Badgworth Parish owned & managed Greenspaces - Badgworth Parish Council will shortly be undertaking a consultation regarding parish owned and managed greenspaces. All members should now have received the report and accounts together with an agenda via e-mail or by post and they are very welcome to attend the meeting.

<u>Eco Church -5 Things You DON'T Need to Stress About -</u> Climate change can often feel overwhelming. While there are many difficult, complex challenges to address, it's important to remember that not everything is a cause for concern. Here are five things about the climate that you DON'T need to stress about:

- 1. More People Care About the Climate Than You Might Realise You might feel isolated in your concerns about the climate, but 86% of people surveyed across 63 countries "believe" in climate change and a further 72% supported policies to tackle it. This means that more minds and resources are being dedicated to solving climate-related issues.
- 2. Renewables Are Cheaper Than Fossil Fuels Renewable energy sources, like wind and solar, have become cheaper than fossil fuels in many parts of the world. This means that it makes more sense to invest in renewables than fossil fuel alternatives, which is one of the key reasons that renewables are growing over 50% each year.
- 3. Companies Are Required To Report On Sustainability The EU has implemented regulations that require companies to report on their sustainability practices. Knowing that large corporations are mandated to report and improve their sustainability efforts can alleviate some of the stress about the overall environmental impact of big business. Whilst the EU are in the lead there are other countries following suit, so expect to see more of this.
- 4. Being Green Doesn't Mean You Have To Wear Sandals There's a stereotype that living sustainably means adopting a minimalist, do-it-yourself lifestyle, complete with homemade clothes and sandals. However, the rise of sustainable fashion brands means you can make environmentally friendly choices without sacrificing style or convenience. By using sustainable materials, and ethical labour practices, you can look good, feel good, and do good for the planet, all at the same time.
- <u>5. Using our Churches!</u> Each of our 6 church buildings has a carbon footprint of less than 4 tonnes of carbon per year. That's probably a lot less than you! To calculate your own carbon footprint, there are many options online, but these 2 are a great start. www.giki.earth/zero/ www.footprint.wwf.org.uk/

The church tower bells - The tower bells were successfully removed from the tower at the beginning of June. The bell tower entrance and the aisle width were spot on for the bells to pass through to get into the churchvard. Hi five to the Victorians as there was only mm's to spare! The bells were displayed in the churchyard for villagers and friends to view. We celebrated with drinks and nibbles and raise just over £400. Thank you. The hi-light was seeing the size of each bell and their inscribed dates. The earliest being 1609. Many people climbed up into the tower to see where the bells are hung. Sadly, bell 2 was cracked and has to have specialist welding before it can be rung again. This was an un for seen expense of £3,500. I need to say thank you so, so much to villagers and friends who donated so generously to pay for the welding. We now only have a shortfall of £2,250 to complete the whole project and get the bells back ringing. Please help get to our target if you possibly can.

A discreet cable extension from the organ in the west end of the Nave has been laid to the east end of the choir stalls, to enable the choir to hear the organ more clearly.
