



Community Shops Fund

Thank you Haltwhistle and District!

The success of the Community Shops Fund relies not only on the abundance of donations from the public, but also the hours donated by dedicated volunteers to operating the Community Shop and the Community Bookshop, as well as their lovely customers.

This successful combination has ensured that the Community Shops Fund could award grants totalling £18,131.32 to eight projects during its second round of funding.

Three large grants were awarded to

• The Haltwhistle Swimming and Leisure centre for equipment and pool time to enable local children with special needs to take part in alternative sessions during the summer holidays, providing another reason for community members to visit this popular summer venue.

- The Field Shelter Arts Space for their Summer Arts Programme, encouraging local people to explore a variety of different art forms in an inspiring location, and
- Bardon Mill and Henshaw Village Hall and Community Projects Group, for repairs to the Village Hall floor, ensuring the continued use of this vital community asset, for other community projects and events.



Haltwhistle Partnership

Five small grants were awarded to:

- The Roman Wall Sheep Show for children's activities at this popular annual Haltwhistle event which exhibits such traditional activities as Cumberland Wrestling and Fell Racing.
- The Haltwhistle Cricket Club for repairs to their club house and cricket grounds to enable 'All Stars Cricket' and other activities for local adults and children.
- All England Netball, Haltwhistle for summer holiday netball sessions and equipment to develop a youth program and encourage further local participation.
- The Haltwhistle Renewables Group for costs towards a feasibility study on hydro-electric power from the South Tyne at Featherstone for the benefit of the community.
- St Jude's, Knarsdale for repairs to the church and community noticeboard to provide a focal information point for the congregation, local community and visitors.

We look forward to seeing the outcome of these projects. We hope they have as much success as the Haltwhistle Young Farmers who received money from the first funding round towards their Pantomime Production costs. This enabled young farmers from Haltwhistle and district to perform and compete in the Regional Pantomime Competition.

The third round of funding is anticipated for Autumn with dates to be confirmed, so if you have a project that will benefit the local community, keep an eye out for details soon.

Town Council

At the June meeting, Haltwhistle Town Council discussed several key issues impacting the town.

Councillors reiterated their concern about the safety of the Alston Arches area, following continued silence from the Environment Agency. The Council has flagged the site as potentially hazardous, particularly for children and dog walkers, and is pressing for urgent remedial action.

A gate along the burn path has been repaired by the Council following recent damage. Separately, a broken see-saw in the Comb Hill play area has been removed for safety, and a replacement has now been ordered.

The ongoing toilet refurbishment project was also raised, with councillors expressing frustration not only over the associated parking restrictions near the hospital, where confusing signage and the premature loss of parking spaces are continuing to cause concern for residents and visitors alike, but also over delays to the works themselves.

Councillors are raising these matters directly with Northumberland County Council, as the current situation is not considered acceptable.

Residents are also reminded of the upcoming Councillor Surgeries, which offer an opportunity to raise concerns or simply have a chat with one of your local representatives. The next sessions will take place at the Town Council office on the train station platform on Friday 19th July and Friday 16th August.

Please also note that the date of the next community litter pick has been Sunday 6th moved to Volunteers are asked to meet in the Market Square 10am. ΑII at equipment will be provided, and refreshments will be available afterwards.



Holy Cross, Haltwhistle

This month the vicar wanted our Herald articles to talk about what the church is here for and he suggested prayer, teaching and remembering. He's just been showing two classes from Hallbankgate Village School round our church – they had a wonderful trip centred round the theme of remembering, in particular people from the time of the world wars and we were able to show them our Roll of Honour, and some medals both from Haltwhistle and from Farlem.

With the school visit it was clear that remembering seems to be quite important for the church - we have the Roll of Honour, but also a Book of Remembrance to remember those known to us who have died, and we the possibility of lighting have candles for remembrance, thanksgiving and prayer. We have stained glass windows that can be given in memory of someone, and may depict someone else important in our faith story who we want to remember - Haltwhistle is unusual in having a high proportion of women represented in our windows. And of course the whole building is here in memory of Jesus Christ and there are reminders of him in the carvings windows and services.

Each week we remember him with a Communion Service, where we share a little bread and wine, doing it as he commanded, in remembrance of him.



We invite you to come and look round, and to remember. It can bring strength for living to remember and to give thanks for all that is good. We have a good God and we remember that every Thursday morning quiet service with of 10am a Communion, and on Sunday morning at 9.30am a service with hymns readings, a sermon and prayers, and afterwards we enjoy each others company over a cuppa.



Every now and then, Steve our vicar encourages us to read our bibles for ourselves. It's not the easiest of books, but when you remember that it's a collection of lots of smaller books and you don't have to read it all in order it's a bit easier.

Our Sunday readings in church try to give us a taste of the whole bible over three years. Steve likes the Old Testament and he does his best to give a big overall view on the Sunday reading, hoping we'll go back and read the whole story.

At the moment, our readings for July and August give us bits from Paul's letters to Galatians and Colossians. and then Hebrews, and the Old Testament tasters are from Amos, Hosea and Isaiah. This year we're steadily hearing our way through St. Luke's gospel too. Some church members have enjoyed reading the whole book/letter when it comes up in the Sunday readings so that they get the whole story rather than just small section we the hear Sundays - that's going to be a bit challenging when it comes to the longer books like Isaiah!



The bible pictured here was inherited by someone in Haltwhistle and Steve brought it to our church to show us. It has a devotional commentary on each page to help you understand it. The writing is very small but the commentary is good and the pictures are lovely.

All Hallows, Henshaw

If you are a parent or grandparent of youngsters aged about 10 to 12, you may be familiar with the Wimpy Kid books – he is Greg, aged 12, American, and a boy who sets down all his thoughts and actions in his diary.

This is not an obvious place to start looking for advice about praying, but his reflections raise some interesting questions. Greg writes: Last night I prayed extra hard that I wouldn't end up with Ruby as my dance partner.

Then I worried that maybe you only get so many prayers answered in your lifetime, and I might be using mine up too fast. I have about 75% success rate with my prayers - is that good or bad? Anyway, I think I will need to be more specific when I pray for something because today my wish was granted but I'm not happy about the way things turned out. When the teacher called out the names of who we were to dance with, I didn't get Ruby, but when the teacher got to me, there were no girls left, so she picked a boy for me - the next thing I knew, I was dancing a waltz with Carlos. The moral here seems to be "be careful what you pray for".

We are familiar with praying in church, but at other times, in our day to day life, we can take a moment to picture Jesus and then say what is in our heart and what we are feeling and concerned about. At a church school, the children were shown how to use their hands as a starting point. Your thumb is the strongest, so give thanks for all that is strong in your life, like your family and friends.

Next, your first finger, a pointing finger, reminds us to pray for all those who guide and help us – like parents and teachers. Next your middle finger which is the tallest – reminding us to pray for those in power. Then our ring finger, a weak finger reminding us to pray for the poor and sick. And finally the little finger, smallest and last, which reminds us to pray for ourselves.

Prayer is like exercise in that it is good to keep doing it. Remember when you pray that the Lord's Prayer says "Thy will be done " so not every prayer will be answered, but as we engage in quiet prayer, this may give us time to realise that what we want cannot happen without hurt or sacrifice by others and that may help us to come to a reconciliation with the issues we face.




Haltwhistle Swimming Pool is Open!
