Horsforth Shed

As the school year comes to a close, the groups who attend from Lighthouse School (for students with Autistic Spectrum Disorder) and Southway School (supporting young people struggling to engage with mainstream school) come to an end, to resume in early September.

These four morning sessions are highly valued by those who attend, as this unsolicited email confirms. *“Hi there I just wanted to say thank you. My son attends the shed on a Tuesday morning with Lighthouse School and absolutely loves it. It is the highlight of his week and he always looks forward to it. Thank you so much.”*

We continue with our two regular drop in sessions on Tuesday and Thursday afternoons which are open to all. Regular participants include those with dementia, autism, depression, loneliness or those who simply wish to learn a new skill. The Shed is accessible by wheelchair users and the age range attending sessions is currently 14 to 80. Once again it is the feedback we receive that is so encouraging *“Horsforth Shed to me is a refuge from the outside world... the one place I love to be when the rest of the world is too difficult....It's with immense, heart-felt gratitude that the wonderful team imagined the Shed, brought it to life and run it as wonderfully as they do - and that I'm able to be part of it”*

On Friday afternoon our long standing partnership with Lighthouse Church continues. This proves to be so popular with those ‘battered and bruised by the storms of life’ that it runs at full capacity almost every session. Whilst this is a session that is entirely run by volunteers, our morning sessions are run by Nigel and Richard, both experienced teachers who are on our payroll. I am particularly delighted to report that we now have been able also to appoint Mel Nightingale to take responsibility from me for the administration of the Shed. In footballing terms we have moved from non-league football to the premiership with this one appointment!

Another new development is the leasing of the Shed on Mondays as a training centre to James Patrick. He is an instructor for the Design and Technology Association and makes use of our facilities to train teaching staff in the safe use of equipment. This gives a useful income stream whilst we seek to engage with other groups.

It has been my privilege to write another encouraging report which would not be possible without the help of so many others, including the behind the scenes support of our trustees.

Community Pantry

Horsforth Community Pantry has now been based at St James' for 10 months and is supporting around 30 local families. We are open every Tuesday morning between 9.30-11.30am and run a café alongside the shop for members to relax and socialise. Members often arrive early and stay after their shop, as the support and friendships between them grows.

Members pay £6 for their shopping each time which is equivalent to around £20-25 in a supermarket. They can choose to join the Foodsavers scheme which invests £1 per week in Leeds Credit Union for them.

The shop supplies come from a weekly Fareshare delivery which is excess food from the food industry, supermarkets etc, as well as donations. Thank you to those who have donated groceries. These are very much appreciated.

We have a team of volunteers that run the pantry and make it a success but if anyone is interested in helping, please speak to Ruth or Jonathan.

Over the last few months some PCC members have been working with a company to upgrade the church website so that it is easier to navigate. We are also considering training some first aiders to support people attending church events, and making improvements to the Parish Centre through the replacement of the door to the car park and arranging the installation of a new kitchen, which has arrived and will be fitted by Pete and some helpers over the summer. Many thanks to David, Pete and those who have helped organise these improvements.



We have also been planning the Heritage Day event and considering holding a “Bible in a Day” course in October., as well as looking into the possibility of holding another church family weekend in 2026. All this alongside ongoing development of the Masterplan.

The Church Masterplan – update and funding

Progress is being made in respect of the Masterplan: planning permission from Leeds City Council has been sought for solar panels on the south-facing roofs of the church, and we have also applied for a Faculty to this effect from the Diocese. The Diocesan Advisory Committee will consider this in detail at their September meeting, once our application has been fine-tuned and relevant organisations have had time to consider it too. We intend to replace the roof, after a report suggested it was near the end of its life, and want to have the building waterproof before considering interior re-ordering. Fitting the solar panels at the same time will save money on scaffolding and move towards our net zero goals.



We have also applied for funding to commission a local community impact assessment of our plans. This will investigate how we can broaden the use of the church building and churchyard, identifying groups and activities and fine tuning what we need for our interior re-ordering. This will strengthen the case for our future plans.

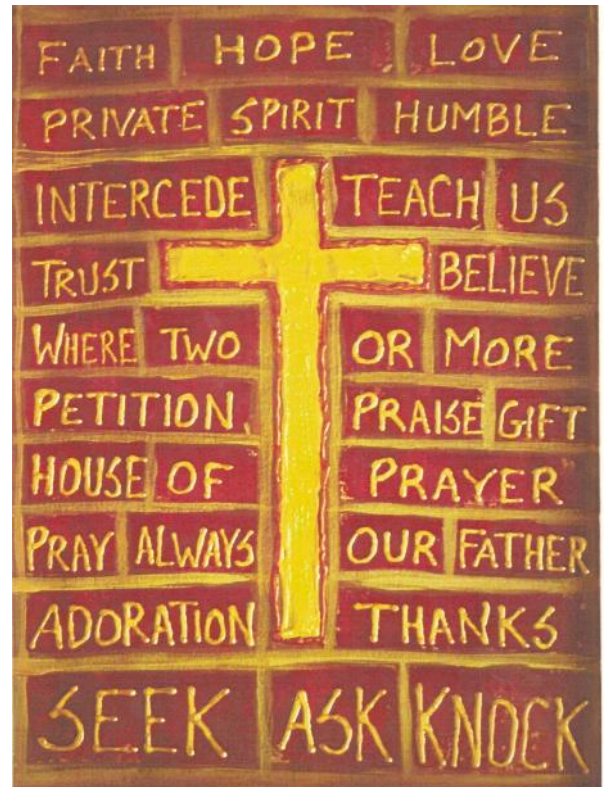

Stewardship Campaign

Our last Stewardship Campaign was in Autumn 2023 – and much has changed since then, so time for another!

I'm aware this isn't the most popular item in our calendar. But I continue to be amazed and delighted that folk at St James *want* to give to God's work, and do so generously. We aim to raise enough money through our giving to fund regular church costs (i.e. excluding the Parish Centre, the Food Pantry and the Redevelopment Project – the latter *is* church, but *isn't* regular).

In recent years, our collective giving has met this goal. *Thank you, Everyone!*

We have 72 individuals or couples on our Electoral Role – Jonathan and I wrote to all of them, plus a few other regulars. As I write in late July, we have had replies from well over 70% of regular attenders at St James, as well as a handful of those who have moved away or are unable to attend due to ill health. Most people have been able to raise their giving. Some need to hold it steady. A few need to reduce or cancel it. I thank all of you who *considered* how much they can afford, and who were *willing* to be generous – whether you raised or reduced your monthly gift: Thank you very much.

My preferred method of giving is via the Parish Giving Scheme, www.parishgiving.org.uk because it's confidential, reliable and competent. It can be set up online or by post. If you prefer post, then ask me for a form. You'll need to identify St James Woodside by recognizing our picture or the address. Update from Rev Dr George Otieno, who worshipped with us whilst studying for his PhD

Exciting News—I am writing to let you know that, by God's grace, the House of Bishops of the Anglican Church of Tanzania appointed your brother and friend in Christ, the Revd Canon Dr George Otieno Lawi to be the new General Secretary (GS) of the Anglican Church of Tanzania. The GS's role is to oversee all aspects of Church life. This includes maintaining good relationships with external partners and mobilising resources for the church at national level. It is a challenging task. Being entrusted by the House of Bishops to this top position in the executive branch of the Anglican Church of Tanzania has been the greatest honour of my life. I am a child of a poor single mother who never expected nor deserved to be even a catechist. I believe that God, who can turn the desert into pools of water, can call anybody to serve him as Prophet Isaiah puts it (41:9-10): "I brought you from the ends of the earth; I called you from its farthest corners and said to you, 'You are my

servant.' I did not reject you, but chose you. Do not be afraid—I am with you! I am your God—let nothing terrify you. I will make you strong and help you; I will protect you and save you”.

The Vision and mission

The Anglican Church in Tanzania (ACT), endeavours to grow of the Kingdom of God through prayer, worship, preaching, teaching, pastoral care, and social services. The ACT's overall mission is to proclaim the Kingdom of God through spiritual and social economic transformation and the empowerment of individuals and communities to experience life in its fulness.

Drawing on the ACT vision and mission and having read through various documents, my vision is to promote discipleship, unity across the Anglican communion and ensure that partnerships with our mission partners are enhanced. I am determined to focus on sustainable practices and community engagement as a means of empowering ACT programs and institutions; that means, to identify our local needs and opportunities. One challenge is to mobilise funds for integral mission and sustainability initiatives. Extending on the good work done by my predecessors, I am keen to work with my team and partners to complete the ACT Hotel Complex project (which is 65% complete) and upgrade the Archbishop's Lodge into a commercial centre.

Challenges and opportunities

One of the lasting challenges facing the ACT Headquarters since its establishment in the 1970s is insufficient sources of funding. In the past, the ACT used to receive major grants from missionary agencies and other faith-based organizations, but there has been a decline and paradigm shift in the world of mission. As a result those employed at ACT Headquarters often do not receive their salaries. Another potential source of income for the ACT Headquarters is the share from the local dioceses, but many dioceses are not paying their share due to similar economic difficulties.

Apart from these challenges, there are also opportunities for mission. We have 28 diocese providing a wider platform for mission and innovation. We have young men and women in our churches who can be empowered and transformed to become the changed change agents. Indeed, we are blessed with strategic opportunities ranging from urban mission to mission real estate development projects. Dodoma is growing so fast and the church has a potential of tapping economic, spiritual and social opportunities that are embedded. We have a number of plots that are waiting to be developed.

Recipe Corner: Rhubarb and Strawberry Cake

For the streusel top:

5½oz / 160g plain flour

8oz / 225g granulated sugar

6oz / 175g unsalted butter, softened

For the filling:

16oz / 450g rhubarb, in 1in dice

16oz / 450g strawberries, roughly chopped

4fl oz / 120ml water or orange juice

8oz / 225g granulated sugar

4 tbsp cornflour

For the batter:

16oz / 450g plain flour

8oz / 225g granulated sugar

1 tsp each of baking powder, bicarbonate of soda and salt

8oz / 225g cold unsalted butter, diced

8fl oz / 240ml buttermilk

2 large eggs

You will need a 12 x 9 x 2in/30 x 23 x 5cm cake tin and an electric mixer.

Method

Preheat the oven to 180°C/350°F/gas mark 4. Butter a pan, 12 x 9 x 2in/30 x 23 x 5cm, and line the bottom with baking parchment. Dust the sides with flour and tap out any excess.

First make the streusel top. Combine the flour, sugar and butter in the bowl of an electric mixer. Mix until you have pea-sized crumb. Cover, chill and set aside.

Place the rhubarb, strawberries and liquid in a heavy-bottomed pan over medium heat for about 5 minutes, until the fruit begins to soften. Combine the sugar and cornflour and add to the pan. Stir and continue heating for 5 to 10 minutes, until bubbly and thick. Watch carefully – this sticks to the bottom of the pan, so make sure to stir continuously with a flat, wood or rubber spatula. Set aside to cool.

For the batter, measure the dry ingredients into the bowl of an electric mixer and stir it all together on low speed. Add the butter bit by bit until the mixture gets crumbly, as it would for scones. Combine the wet ingredients in a separate bowl, then slowly add to the mixer just until everything is consistently moist.

Spread half the batter in the prepared pan, followed by the rhubarb filling. If desired, sprinkle with sliced almonds to cover the rhubarb mixture. Dollop the remaining batter over the filling and smooth as best you can. Sprinkle the streusel over the batter in various-sized clumps.

Bake for 40 to 50 minutes, until firmish. The filling will stick to a tester knife, so check the batter for doneness as best you can. Leave to cool completely in the tin. Because of the rhubarb filling, this needs to set longer than most cakes before cutting.



Magic Moments Memory Support Drop In Café

Magic Moments Memory Café meets on the 4th Wednesday of each month, from 1.30-3.30pm in the Small Hall at the Grove Centre. We have a different topic each month. In August we are having Briony from the M&S archive come to us with her "Travelling Suitcase". The suitcase will contain items sold in the M&S shops since the 1940s to the 1980s. It will be a brilliantly nostalgic step back in time.

I provide a simple wordsearch for each café. We sing Perry Como's 'Magic Moments' song at every café. We have hot drinks and biscuits. We find time to reminisce as well. There is usually a memory support worker there if carers need support/advice.

The only time we won't run the café is in December because the fourth Wednesday is during Christmas week.

Anyone with memory issues is welcome to join us. You don't have to have an official diagnosis to attend the café, but we can help those wanting to seek that diagnosis via the memory support worker.

Northern Soul — Art Exhibition

You are invited to 'Northern Soul,' A solo art exhibition of paintings, drawings and prints based around the theme of a 'Northern Identity' by Chris Eastham (Christine Barraclough).

Venue 'Left Bank', Cardigan Road, Burley, Leeds LS6 1JL

Dates- Wednesday 3rd September to Friday 10th October.

Over the last year I have been exploring my own 'Northern Identity' through a series of paintings and mono prints in which I have used archive photography of the people and places which form part of my Yorkshire heritage. For example, I have used photographs of Norman Hartnell models on the top of the Queens Hotel in Leeds through to three Yorkshire Tykes in front of Victorian buildings on Kirkgate, which is Leeds's oldest street. I even attended a Northern Soul dance weekend in Bridlington recently to inform the biggest painting of the exhibition. It is inspired by the Northern Soul dance movement of the 1970s made famous by 'Wigan Casino'. 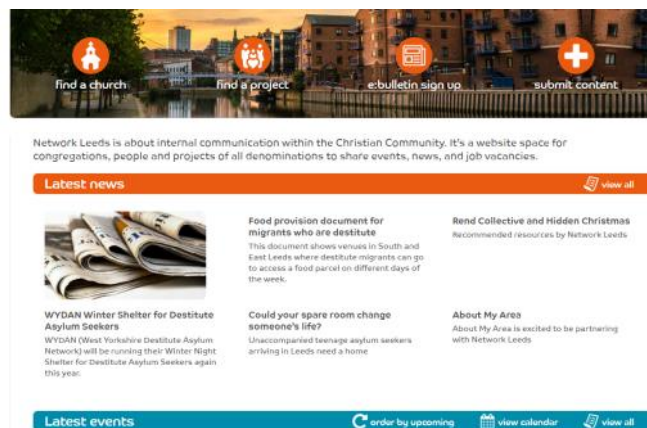
