Friday Prayers for Peace and Reconciliation Friday 15th August 2025

Bible Reading: Ephesians 4.1-7, 11-13

I therefore, the prisoner in the Lord, beg you to lead a life worthy of the calling to which you have been called, with all humility and gentleness, with patience, bearing with one another in love, making every effort to maintain the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace. There is one body and one Spirit, just as you were called to the one hope of your calling, one Lord, one faith, one baptism, one God and Father of all, who is above all and through all and in all. But each of us was given grace according to the measure of Christ's gift. The gifts he gave were that some would be apostles, some prophets, some evangelists, some pastors and teachers, to equip the saints for the work of ministry, for building up the body of Christ, until all of us come to the unity of the faith and of the knowledge of the Son of God, to maturity, to the measure of the full stature of Christ.

Reflection

Tuesday, 12th August, was marked by the United Nations, as it is each year, as International Youth Day. This provides an opportunity to celebrate and encourage the work of young people throughout the world. The UN provides the following interesting statistics:

Half of the people on our planet are 30 or younger, and this is expected to reach 57% by the end of 2030; a survey shows that 67% of people believe in a better future, with 15 to 17 year-olds being the most optimistic about this; by 2050, the people who are under 25 today will compose more than 90% of the prime-age workforce; 13% of the young labour force is unemployed.

This does not mean that they all have a voice or are given the opportunities they need, though. It is sometimes said that children are our future, but in fact they are very much our present too.

It is easy to compartmentalize different groups, such as young people, ignoring what we all share in common. This includes concern for issues of peace and justice, and not least for environmental issues. The future of our planet is of concern to us all but young people will be affected particularly. It is so encouraging that young people are at the forefront of calling for action in the face of climate change and of the detrimental effects human activities are having on the natural world.

This year the Secretary-General announced the 14 young leaders appointed to the third cohort of his Youth Advisory Group on Climate Change who will bring their expertise and recommendations to guide the UN's effort on climate action.

Our Bible reading relates specifically to unity within the Church. All are equal members and are to be valued as such. All have individual gifts which contribute to the life of the Church. Those gifts are all equally important and needed.

The same is true of the wider world. Both young and old have much to contribute to the well-being of our world and they need to have the opportunity to contribute in a real way. Sadly that is not always the case. That is why educational opportunities are so important. In many parts of the world the Church still has a significant role in education.

As just one example of the continuing role of the Church, last Saturday the Church of England remembered Mary Sumner, founder of the Mothers' Union. This movement continues to support families and communities throughout the world motivated by a commitment to end violence, poverty and injustice.

Our prayer is for all, young and old, as we work together for the well-being of all in God's world.
