#### Calling All Young People aged between 13 and 18

Bishop Rachel has launched an online survey for young people in Gloucestershire aged 13-18 on their views of the criminal justice system. She wants to hear what young people think about what prison is for and what would make society a better place.

Bishop Rachel says: "As Anglican Bishop for Prisons, I go into lots of prisons and speak to Ministers in Parliament. We hear a lot about what would make society better and thinking about how our criminal justice system fits in is crucial.

I'm taking time this year to listen to young people about what they think. They are the future and it's important we include their voices in policymaking. As well as this online survey, I'm speaking to groups of young people and holding a one-day conference in the autumn where I want to hear all their original thoughts and opinions."

The findings of the survey will inform Bishop Rachel's work in the House of Lords as she speaks to Government Ministers and as Anglican Bishop for Prisons.

#### **FARMCOTE**

I only hope when

we do get some proper rain it doesn't go on for weeks, just when combines and balers are poised to go full swing into harvest.

We are now well into the summer season of fetes and holidays, with plenty of visitors from all over the world, including a Canadian lady I met recently, who was painting the view across to the Malverns. She had returned to the Cotswolds after her previous visit some 20 years ago and commented on how little had changed at Farmcote and elsewhere. This made me think back to how different things were then. No fast fibre broadband — dial-up if you were lucky - no Airbnb, no electric cars, no Netflix or Amazon Prime. The list goes on. But we did have a vicar!

I understand applications have closed and let us hope we are soon able to welcome someone to fill Katrina's big shoes and give Sue and her team the support they deserve. They have done sterling work, keeping our churches open and functioning as usual, and let us all be grateful for the job Simon Wallis and his team have done in drawing up an attractive profile for the benefice and we hope it will have the desired effect.

#### **CUTSDEAN**

We have all been experiencing the heat of recent weeks, even on the high Cotswold hills the heat has been insufferable, occasionally tempered by a drying wind which blows the petals off the roses, desiccates tender leaves and dries the already parched soil. The farmers are facing reduced crop yields due to the prolonged lack of rain and we gardeners are facing a hosepipe ban from 22<sup>nd</sup> July and the water butts are empty.

Over the last 6 weeks or so, St James' Church has undergone redecoration as well as repairs to the crumbling plasterwork on the north wall and elsewhere; the gutters are newly painted and cleared. As a scaffolding tower was erected in the church for repointing the stonework, all the unsightly, very old, dust covered cobwebs have been removed. They have been a source of irritation for ages! So the warm, dry weather has been to our benefit in allowing the new plaster to dry (with the help of electric fans) quicker than had it been a wet summer as last year. We were very grateful that Caleb and Alex left the church so clean and tidy when the job was completed with the minimum of builders' dust. The



cleaning team had a 'mega session' mopping floors, polishing the pews, dusting the hymn prayer books, cleaning the brass. hoovering the carpets etc etc. Our little church is now sparkling! At the same time, the 'chaps' tackled the hedge adjacent to the path leading to the church,

cleared debris and weeds from around the church, cut back overhanging shrubs, cleared everything away and had a bonfire! As Chapel Warden, I am most grateful for everyone's help making the church and surrounds presentable for our first service after redecoration.



As a small community, fund raising is always an issue. However, has Stanway Fete become an annual fund-raising major event for both the church and the Community Orchard. This year, we excelled ourselves and despite the blistering heat on

Saturday 12<sup>th</sup> July, we had plenty to sell on our stall and plenty of buyers. The Bric-a-Brac was selling well even before the fete opened; we sold all the cakes which had been generously donated as well as jams, preserves, Cutsdean honey and apple juice. We had a huge variety of plants which created a lot of interest and sold well and even better when towards the end of the afternoon, they were half price! But it was a hot afternoon and, not surprisingly, the attendance was down on last year, but our takings were more this year than last. Good news! All the 'workers'

relaxed together in the evening with an Indian takeaway and cold beer or two and enjoyed the cool of the evening after a long, hot but satisfying day.

As we progress through the vacancy, we are enjoying meeting the visiting priests who take our services and are forever thankful to Katrina for going above and beyond her duty before she left, organising the rota of priests to cover the services up to Christmas. We are all praying for a suitable applicant to come to our very special Benefice in the North Cotswolds.
