It feels as if we're living in a very strange time. Or perhaps 'strange' is the wrong word. It feels as if we're living in a hateful, divided time, when everything seems to be mixed up and confused. We see the news coming in, of events in our own country, and from overseas, and we wonder what on earth is going on. Have people changed so much? When did people stop valuing peace? When did they stop caring about human lives? When did empathy become a negative attribute? It can make us feel lost. It can even make us feel despairing – because what is the right path in the midst of so much awful strangeness?

The words of our scriptures this Sunday, especially in Jeremiah, and Jesus in Luke's gospel, may initially feel discomforting. They speak of conflict and division and hardship, and that feels at odds of what we so often want to hear from Jesus – words of peace and salvation. Not today. "Do you think that I have come to bring peace to the earth?" Jesus demands. "No, I tell you, but rather division!"

But as we reflect upon God's words, I find that there is a message for us there that might not promise smoothness and ease, but which instead leads us to something far better. Jeremiah's time, Jesus' time, and the time of all those heroes of the faith named in Hebrews, are times of conflict and decision, and their call is a call to faith. Yes there is division. Yes there is hate. Yes, there are people who claim to be speaking truth who we know in our hearts cannot be doing so. God never calls us to hate, only to love, and holding on to that requires courage. It requires faith, and a willingness to face the challenge of division firmly anchored to our rock and cornerstone, Jesus Christ.

Are we told that to empathise is to be weak? We know better. We know, because Christ shows that to us. Are we told that to love every human being is foolishness? We know better, because Jesus tells us to love as he loved us – with sacrifice, with strength, and with a willingness not to count the cost. We are led to courage and steadfastness, measuring our steps alongside that 'great cloud of witnesses' that have gone before us.

We look around and we can interpret the present time. We know that it is a time to turn to Christ, and hold fast, in his strength.

Torches in Churchyard

Whilst the work is continuing in the Church Porch it is advisable to take a torch with you if you are going to a late service or a concert as the walk to the West Door is not very well lit and the path is uneven in parts. Do be extra careful.

St Mary's Church, Fairford Glass doors update

The picture shows the newly laid floor, mat well (under preparation) and the oak frame which has been fitted to carry the doors.



The glass doors have been collected by the contractors from the London Studio where Tracey Sheppard did the engraving - detailed work which was completed some weeks ago.

It appears that the mechanism boxes (which will be set into the floor under the doors) and the controls are now imminently available, so assuming the preparation of the floor is in order for the boxes, we have a new date for receiving the doors at the church and starting the installation - namely Thursday, 14th August.

Given that there is no further delay, fitting the doors will obviously take some days, with connecting up to the power supply thereafter.

This annual event invites people across Gloucestershire and North Bristol to visit churches by walking, cycling, horse-riding or using public transport, all while raising money to support their upkeep. Funds raised are split between the participant's chosen church and GHCT, which provides grants for vital repair and improvement work.

Ray Singleton, Ride+Stride Co-ordinator, said:

"Ride+Stride is a great way for people to come together, enjoy our local area and support these important buildings so they can continue to serve their communities. It's not just about worship. Many churches host school events, local clubs and charities that rely on the space.

We're already hearing that some fascinating routes are being planned and many churches will be putting on special events for participants to enjoy on the day. In past years, we've seen everything from tower tours and heritage open days to organ recitals and bake sales. There's always something exciting happening along the way."

Get a taster before the weekend by coming to see some of the steam engines and exhibits in Fairford Market Place GL7 4AF for the Steam in the Square free event on Friday August 15 from 5pm-10pm.

The Bull Hotel's bar will be open, as well as an outside bar in the Market Place where you can order drinks and food.

This is Fairford Steam's third year back and organiser, Steve Evans said: "I'm thrilled to say that exhibitor numbers are well up on previous years. We are now at full capacity! I think we must be doing something right and giving people in and around Fairford an annual Steam show to look forward to."

Many favourites will be returning including Ken Fox's Wall of Death and there'll be lots of new exhibits and things to do for all ages as well as live music on the Saturday night.

The popular free bus service will also be running all weekend in and out of Fairford to the Show at Lake Field GL7 4BT and return.

The Churchyard was Buzzing!

St Mary's Churchyard was literally buzzing on the morning of Tuesday 5th August, and it wasn't just the resident insects! The bike rack near the gate was full as over 54 children, all with accompanying adults, enjoyed the activities which had been planned and set up by members of St Mary's Eco Church Group, along with other church and community volunteers, led and organised by Rosannah (Rosy) Bruce-Gardner using her nannying and childcare skills to great effect.

Children, parents and carers joined in, with magnifying glasses, activity sheets for different age groups and five different craft activities, laid out on the grass and tables. There were picnic rugs and cushions where groups sat and chatted or looked at nature books whilst enjoying some of the delicious refreshments provided. Others just enjoyed exploring and running around. Information boards showed hundreds of different types of insects, including many that mimicked each other for their own benefit. These were provided by Sarah Lovatt, who has encyclopaedic knowledge of insects and will be giving a talk entitled 'Small Creature Magic in Fairford' on Wednesday 20th August, in the Community Centre at 7pm.

It was an opportunity to learn new facts, for instance, I learnt that the collective noun for ladybirds is a 'loveliness'! It was a place to be creative, with a choice of craft activities including insect masks (butterflies were popular), pictures using pressed dried flowers and leaves, a natural collage and leaf rubbings. It was a chance for children and adults to socialise and to enjoy being outside in a beautiful space, surrounded by nature and members of our community. The sun shone and it felt like Fairford at its best.

Then do come along - brilliant disguises by interesting small creatures will be shown together with some familiar favourites and possible seasonal sightings.








