There were interviews with the team and with their fans. Everyone was smiling. Then within a minute the story changed to scenes of starving children in Gaza. Pictures that brought tears and made me angry. Angry that this could still be allowed to happen in our 21st century world.

We are always surrounded by stories. Some true as on the news. Stories that stir us to happiness for others and stories that stir us to look for ways to make a difference in the lives of those who are suffering. And some stories are fiction, in novels or television dramas. But we seem to have a need for stories. How many of us on long journeys have made up stories about our fellow-passengers? And our conversation often involve the recounting of anecdotes.

And then we have that greatest story ever told. The story of Jesus in the Gospels.
