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BISHOP HUGH TO BECOME BISHOP OF WORCESTER

The Rt Revd Hugh Nelson will be leaving his post as the Bishop of St Germans at the end of the year to become the new Bishop of Worcester.

The announcement was made by Downing Street on July 29 following approval of his nomination by HM The King.

Bishop Hugh says: "I am profoundly grateful for the opportunity I've been offered to serve the Lord and His church in the Diocese of Worcester.

"As you can imagine though, it will be a bitter-sweet move, as it means leaving all of you wonderful, faithful, brilliant people and the glory of God's creation that is Cornwall, and it means not being able to serve with Bishop David, who is such a gift to this diocese."

Bishop Hugh added: "In the Diocese of Truro, we have a clear vision for a fruitful and sustainable future, with so many faithful and godly people serving their church and their communities, often in creative and sacrificial ways. And with a new focus on children and young people, and Bishop David leading you on, you can be full of hope for the future.

"I will not be starting in Worcester until the New Year, so there's lots of time for me to say the things I want to say to you all. Please do pray for my family and I, as we certainly shall for you."

Becky Lines, TM Children's and Families' Leader from Camborne, and Hannah Levett, Youth Lead & All Age Worship Coordinator from Liskeard, were invited to Lambeth Palace in London.

The two were recognised for all the hard work they do within the diocese as part of Recognise Week, created by the Church of England to celebrate all those involved in the children's and young people ministry within the church.

Hannah, said: "It was a joy to be invited to Lambeth Palace and be recognised for my youth ministry.

"I loved getting to network with people doing the same around the country and to celebrate together, with inspiration and encouragement."

She said she will be bringing the celebration and "thank you" to the rest of her team and volunteers in all the youth, children's and families' ministries at St Martin's.

Becky has worked in the diocese for many years and has been involved in a number of initiatives including Wild



Church, Teatimes for Families, summer holiday clubs and more.

She said: "As you go through the gates of Lambeth Palace you are struck by the history that envelops you, just being there was fantastic.

"The joyous event that was laid on to celebrate children, youth and family ministry was very well named as 'Regonise'. It was not just a thank you party to acknowledge everything that is seen to be happening. It recognised what happens when we're alone. The emails, shopping, planning and preparation, risk assessments, the events that no one turns up to, the late nights and early mornings. It was this that made me emotional, they do know!"

CELEBRATE OF LAY MINISTRY AT CATHEDRAL

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RELYING ON GOD IN LOCAL LAY LEADERSHIP

The road to ministry can have many turns on the way, as Sheri Sturgess has discovered as she reflects on her own particular journey.

She has been a Christian all her life, and a worshipper at St Martin's Church in Liskeard for the last 35 years or so. It was here she became the first administrator in the newly formed church office in 1994.

She says: "Soon after that, a post came up in the Diocese of Truro – which I was encouraged to apply for. I was appointed as the Stewardship Advisor, and a few years later became the Diocesan Secretary. This was a role I held until 2010, working in the old Diocesan House at Kenwyn.

"After leaving that post, I had some more time available and decided to broaden my theological knowledge by studying for the Certificate of Theology, on a two-year course with SWMTC. I had no particular aim in mind - it was just for fun – but maybe not so much when an essay was due in."

At this time, Sheri was also a Local Worship Leader at St Martin's church, taking an active part in leading café services. When the vicar announced his retirement, she realised there was a need to fill the sermon spot and asked for permission to preach.

After undertaking Reader ministry training, in 2017 she was licensed as a Reader for Liskeard and St Keyne. She still holds this post today, taking services, preaching and teaching as well as taking occasional funerals across the benefice.

But God still had more in store for her.

SENS KERNEWEK

Sheri says: "I was at the Readers Day in February 2024, when Bishop Hugh was talking about **Sens Kernewek** course. This suddenly sparked my interest. It sounded like just the sort of course for me – I knew I would love it! But I was busy with lots of other things – did I really need to spend time on this?"

Yet the idea of joining this course carried on niggling away at her.



"Sometimes I find this is how God talks to me, how God gets my attention.

"I loved the course, it was brilliant. It is a group of people who meet and learn from each other. Bishop Hugh, Revd Jane Vaughan-Wilson and Sally Piper led the course. They are all excellent facilitators. But it was a participatory course – a group in which we were all learning and discerning together."

The aim of the Sens Kernewek course is to enable people to discern their call and hopefully lead them to be commissioned as Local Lay Leaders.

During the recent transition, Sheri had been taking regular services at Dobwalls United Church, part of the parish of Liskeard, in her role as Reader.

As Sheri was praying about where the Sens Kernewek course should take her in the future, she started to feel God was directing her to become part of the leadership team at Dobwalls, and a link between the church there and St Martins Church in Liskeard. Conversations with Revd Mark Wade confirmed this as the route to follow.

Sheri continues to trust God with what lies ahead. When she looks back at all she has done, she can see how he has always been leading her into new areas of ministry.

MEMBER SOUGHT FOR CHURCH USES COMMITTEE

This is a specialist body that considers the care and use of church buildings, mainly where they are no longer open for worship. It is a consultative body that advises the Diocesan Mission and Pastoral Committee on proposals for the wider community use of specific church buildings. Currently it oversees the care of three churches, so only meets three times a year online, for up to an hour and there is only a small amount of pre-reading required.

HALOS HELPING TO CUT CARBON IN CHURCHES

Churchgoers in Penzance won't need to worry about feeling chilly during services this autumn thanks to new Halo heaters

The Herschel Halo radiant heaters. costing more than £69,000, have been installed in St Mary's ready for the cooler months - and will help cut the church's carbon footprint too.

Church members raised £43,187 towards the cost of the halo infrared heaters and then given £36,527 from the Demonstrator Project - comprising of £21,286 Archbishop's Council and £15.241 Benefact Trust.

These halo heaters, which have candlestyle bulbs to create a chandelier effect, will help church officials make a saving on energy costs and help towards their goal of reducing carbon.

Ben Wood, Cut Carbon Support Officer (Churches), said: "It's fantastic to see such an impressive achievement from St Mary's Penzance. This has been a major undertaking both in time and resources, but they are committed both to keeping the congregation warm and ensuring the church is Net Zero in line with the Church of England's target of achieving Net Zero by 2030.
