Haltwhistle Partnership

Former First School

Northumberland County Council has placed the former First School building in Haltwhistle up for sale. Under the Borderlands Growth Deal, there is a valuable opportunity to secure funding for projects that deliver meaningful economic growth for the town.

In the Haltwhistle response, Partnership submitted a proposal to repurpose the building into a multiuse centre, comprising bunkhousestyle visitor accommodation, events space, and activity areas designed to support and complement **Swimming** the and Leisure Centre.

Unfortunately, our proposal was Northumberland County rejected. Council has indicated their intention to sell the site to a developer for the provision of social housing. While we acknowledge the need for affordable housing, we believe the only form of social housing appropriate for this location would be an aged care facility. However, no funding is currently available to support such a scheme.

As a result, two significant petitions are currently circulating within the Haltwhistle community, each

proposing a vision for the future of the Former First School site—both rooted in strong community values and priorities.

The first petition, initiated by the Haltwhistle Partnership, advocates for the expansion of the Haltwhistle Swimming and Leisure Centre. This initiative aligns closely with the objectives of the Borderlands Town Plan funding. Investment received substantial community support, this petition has now been formally submitted Northumberland County Council's Petitions Department, and response is awaited.

A second petition, still gathering signatures, proposes the creation of an aged care facility. Spearheaded by residents Rachel concerned Terry Christie, this initiative addresses the urgent and growing need for services that Haltwhistle's older population—an often-overlooked demographic. The Partnership Haltwhistle has expressed full support for proposal, recognising its importance for the long-term wellbeing of the community. The petition remains signing available for via Haltwhistle Matters Facebook page.

Regardless of which proposal residents may support, one message is clear: community consultation must be central to any planning decisions made by Northumberland County Council regarding the Former First School site. Ensuring that local voices are heard and respected is vital in shaping a future that truly reflects the needs and aspirations of the Haltwhistle community.


Working Man's Club - Still Awaiting Action

The Working Man's Club site continues to be a concern for the town more than two years after the devastating fire. Haltwhistle Town Council has formally requested that Northumberland County Council serve a Section 215 notice on the owners of the site. A Section 215 notice is a legal measure that can be used by local authorities to require land or buildings in a poor state to be cleaned up or repaired when they are considered to be adversely affecting the local community. We hope this action will finally prompt some progress at this long-neglected Members of the WMC site. committee have stated they are hopeful work will commence shortly.

Vandalism in Haltwhistle

There has unfortunately been an outbreak of vandalism in the town in recent weeks. Equipment in Comb Hill Park has been damaged, benches have been broken, and graffiti has appeared in several locations. We urge residents to be vigilant and to report any incidents to the police using the non-emergency number 101. By working together as a community we can help prevent further damage.

Finally, for yet another example of how this charitable community pulls together, you need look no further than the Community Shops, where both donating and bargain hunting go hand in hand. All the proceeds will go to the Town Community Fund which is now in its 2nd year, and available to help with projects which benefit our whole community.





If you wish to have both vaccinations, book via the on-line National Booking System which for bookings opens on 1st September 2025. Use 'Flu and COVID' appointment option, or telephone will take 119. Clinics place Haltwhistle Fire Station on Monday 6th October 2025 and Tuesday 14th October 2025.

September 2025

- pregnant women
- children aged 2 or 3 years on 31 August 2025
- children in clinical risk groups aged from 6 months to less than 18 years

Pregnant women and parents/guardians of children will receive a text invite to book an appointment early September. The Flu clinics will take place at Haltwhistle Medical Group from Mid-September.

October 2025

- aged 65+
- aged 18 years to under 65 years in clinical risk groups
- main carers of an elderly or disabled person(s)
- close contacts of immunocompromised individuals
- social care frontline workers

Eligible Adults with a mobile number will receive a text invite to book an appointment early September. The Flu clinics will take place at Haltwhistle Medical Group in October.

All Haltwhistle Medical Group appointments are bookable via the NHS App or call our Vaccination telephone line (01434 325900) 2pm – 4.30pm Tuesdays—Friday.

Hidden History

A Gilsland Connection to Ruth Ellis, the last woman to be hanged in Britain, Clare Andrea (Andy) Neilson Hornby (1944-1982)

Andy was born on 15th September 1944 at the Maternity Hospital, Gilsland, Northumberland. He was the son of Ruth Neilson*, later Ruth Ellis, then 17, and a married Canadian soldier, who sent money for about a year, and then stopped. Andy went to live with Ellis's mother, Berta (a Belgian war refugee) who was, in 1969, found unconscious in a gas-filled room in her flat in Hemel fully She Hempstead. never recovered and did not speak coherently ever again. His step-George Ellis, father, Johnston descended into alcoholism hanged himself in 1958. Andy, who was 10 at the time of his mother's suffered execution, irreparable psychological damage and took his own life in a Paddington bedsit on 17th June 1982. This was a most tragic and complex family. The judge presiding at the trial of his mother, Sir Cecil Havers, sent money every year for Andy's upkeep, and for Christmas.

Mr Humphreys, the prosecution counsel, paid for Andy's funeral. Ruth Ellis (1926-1955) was the last woman to be executed in Britain. Andy destroyed the marker on her grave at Amersham, St Mary's Cemetery in Buckinghamshire, and it has never been replaced.

* Ruth's father, Arthur Hornby, was a cellist from Manchester who spent much of his time playing on Atlantic cruise liners. Arthur changed his surname to Neilson after the birth of Ruth's elder sister Muriel. Ruth was born Neilson and it was as Neilson that she married George Ellis in Tonbridge, Kent in 1950 - hence Andy was given that surname.

Hidden History

The Shadow of the Swastika by Valerie M Noon

Sometimes we see our very familiar world from a very different point of view, so it looks like a different place altogether. For us, it's home. What would it look like to an enemy? How would we react to having such people nearby?

Featherstone Castle was a POW camp at the end of WW2. The inmates had come from the very different world of Nazi Germany, some were traumatised to see their homeland defeated, others very glad to see the war brought to an end, but all had scars from the conflict. Valerie's book begins in the early years of Nazi Germany, following a young couple and their struggles to get married in the face of increasing complications by the regime.

We find Manfred years later as a captive, brought to Featherstone, and working through the scars and trauma of his years on the Russian Front. The story of the camp is a fascinating reawakening of an episode of local history forgotten by many and completely unknown to most: what is now a quiet spot

nestling in the South Tyne Valley does have many memories stories to tell. While most of the characters are fictional, one is real: Herbert Sulzbach was a visitor to the camp, and his researches and memories are part of the rich treasury which Valerie has set out to explore. The book is a good read, taking us into a world we think we knew, and opening up so much recent history and so many people's stories we didn't know. Do read it.
