Children of light

WE'VE probably noticed already the days starting to get darker more quickly as well as a change in temperature. All of which means that another British summer is pretty much over, as the longer colder nights of autumn and winter draw ever nearer.

Now although I think it's wonderful that we get to experience the full range of seasons in this country, admittedly it doesn't take me long before I find myself pining for the brighter warmer months of spring and summer again!

Moreover, when we look at the state of our world, the ongoing conflict between Russia and Ukraine (now in its fourth year), the turmoil and suffering in the

Middle East, the ethical questions and concerns surrounding our digital age and technologies like AI, not to mention the growing unrest in this country around issues like immigration, it might seem, in many ways, like the darkness is closing in fast and the shadows are here to stay.

During such times, it can be easy for us to lose sight of the hope that things will get any better, to look at the darkness outside and, as we might do on a cold dark morning, hit the snooze button and go back to sleep on account that change isn't going to come anytime soon and what can we do about it anyway?

And yet we would do well to heed these words that Paul says in Romans 13: "The hour has al-



ready come for you to wake up from your slumber, because our salvation is nearer now than when we first believed. The night is nearly over; the day is almost here" (Romans 13:11–12a, NIV).

Here Paul is using the language of "waking up" and opening our eyes as a metaphor for walking in Christ's ways of love for one another. And Paul is saying that for him, there is an urgency about this as Christ's return - that climactic moment at the end of the age, when all that is broken and wrong is made whole and right is nearer than ever before. Yet if we're being honest, it's easy to read Paul's words and feel a bit disheartened given that two thousand years

Children of light

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later we are still here and the world remains as it is. However, whether or not that event comes in our lifetime, with each passing second, the reality is that each one of us edges closer to that moment when we will meet Christ face to face.

So the question remains: how are we living now in preparation for that moment? Are we living alert and ready for that glorious tomorrow, or has the light of Christ's love been slightly dimmed or obscured by other things?

Interestingly, Paul goes on to say that it's not enough for us as Christians to simply be awake and alert — we also need to get dressed too. Paul writes in Romans 13: "So let us put aside the deeds of darkness and put on the armour of light" (Romans 13:12b, NIV). Notice here that there is a "putting off" and a "putting on" as one would put off their night clothes in order to put on that which is suitable for being out and about in the daytime.

But what does it mean to put on the "armour of light"? Well, Paul later describes this as "clothing ourselves with Christ" (Romans 13:14) — allowing Christ's ways to become part of who we are, giving us warmth, strength and protection amid the perils of these present times.

Practically speaking, it means putting aside time every day to fix our eyes on him — whether that be through worship, prayer, or the reading of Scripture — and allowing those moments to shape the way we think, speak, and act through the power of the Holy Spirit.

But finally it means remembering that in a dark world where it's easy to feel discouraged or helpless, God has called us to be children of light. And because of that, we can make a difference. You only need to light a match in a dark room to see the dramatic effect that light has, or look up on a clear night to see the beautiful radiance of a million stars. And whether we feel like it or not, God has set us apart to be his lights in this world, and we shine brighter the more we are willing to allow his love to transform us from the inside out.

So as the shadows draw in and the nights get longer, may this darker season be a reminder to us that even when the world grows darker, we have been called to shine brighter — displaying his love in our homes, communities, and even the far reaches of this world. Amen.

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

In the steps of St Paul - a pilgrimage to Greece

COME and walk in the steps of St Paul in one of the most amazing journeys ever made! Paul's second missionary journey, described in the Bible in Acts 16-18, brought the good news of Jesus Christ to mainland Europe for the first time and involved times of extraordinary encounter and personal challenge.

Philip Plyming, Dean of Durham, will be leading a pilgrimage to Greece from 7-16 October 2026, and is inviting people from across Durham Diocese to join him. Pilgrims will be tracing Paul's steps, from his arrival in the port of Neapolis through the trials of Philippi, his famous sermon in Athens, ending at cosmopolitan Corinth where Paul made his home for eighteen months. Travelling the length of Greece, pilgrims will travel through stunning scenery and take in some unforgettable sights, including the Meteora monasteries, the Acropolis in Athens and the Corinth canal.
