We remember before God all

those in our communities who are vulnerable or struggling: the isolated and lonely; single parents, young adults and children, those who are ill or depressed, the s tressed and anxious; the poor and needy; those facing financial pressures; those grieving the loss of a loved one. We pray that they may know God's presence with them and be comforted.

During this Season of Harvest, we give thanks for the sheer abundance of fruit and crops we've received this year! We give thanks for all those who work the land and sea, who produce the food we eat, the milk we drink, and the fodder to see live-stock through another winter. We give thanks for their labour and commitment, that takes them out into the worst of Manx weather. And we give thanks for their stewardship of land for the sustainability of soil, wild life and future generations!

As we have focused prayers on the suffering in Gaza and Ukraine, the "worst humanitarian disaster in human history" is developing in Sudan..... Over 150,000 people have been killed by war and genocidal violence. This has triggered mass displacement, famine is spreading, and 8 million people are in danger of starvation. The crisis has deepened in recent weeks, a genocidal army is preparing for massacre in North Darfur. A war between rival armies has engulfed the entire country, triggering waves of mass murder & torture, Families have lost everything trying to escape violence and famine. We hold before God the 30 million people who now need immediate help.

Seeing with our hearts

At times all of us seem to have the innate ability to look but not to see. Maybe it's our brains' natural protection, screening us from the deluge of stimulus that bombards us? The visual equivalent to conceptual thought. We have the ability to focus on what we're interested in, and focus out what disturbs, bores, or doesn't seem relevant to us. In our teaching today, in the story of the rich man and Lazarus, Jesus tells a parable about just that : how we can live our daily lives not noticing the discrepancy of wealth; the haves and have nots, those on the fringes of our society. Not noticing the impact our life styles have on the rest of the world. It's frightening to think that to others, we may seem like the rich man in the parable. It's only when we start to see with our hearts that we start to see the world through the eyes of Jesus. The eyes that see pain, injustice, poverty and suffering, as separate from the desire of God's heart for His creation. The eyes that see with compassion and empathy, with longing for Earth's Wholeness in Him.

Thoughts to ponder....

Genuine compassion is based on the recognition that others have the right to happiness just like yourself, and therefore even your enemy is a human being with the same wish for happiness as you, and the same right to happiness as you. A sense of concern developed on this basis is what we call compassion; it extends to everyone, irrespective of whether the person's attitude toward you is hostile or friendly.
