# We have a 10.00am service of Holy Communion each Sunday

We provide hand gel as you come into church and at the entrance to the prayer chapel.

There are candle, shell and leaf prayer stations in the side chapel.

At the communion we offer bread and wine. If you do not wish to use the common cup you may just partake of the bread.

Refreshments are available after the service.

On the 4<sup>th</sup> Sunday of the month we offer prayer for healing with the laying on of hands, in the side chapel.

#### **Tea-Time Service**

We also have a service at 4.00pm on the third Sunday. Everyone is welcome. The service is very relaxed with songs, activities, readings and prayers.

It is for everyone: families of all kinds, children, adults, young and old. Why not come along? Drinks and biscuits (and sometimes cake!) will be available before the service.



September is one of those funny times that brings things to an end but also signals new beginnings. The leaves will soon begin to turn, yet harvest time is just around the corner. Summer is over, school is beginning, and students return to

their studies in tidy uniforms yet to be stained with mud and paint.

As I write this, I am taking a break from painting water-colour trees that have roots mirroring the lush canopy above. These paintings will form part of a gift for the new ordinands (deacons and priests in training) coming to study at my college, to welcome them on their first residential.

Written at the bottom of the paintings are the words from Colossians 2:6-10. And now, just as you accepted Christ Jesus as your Lord, you must continue to follow him. Let your roots grow down into him, and let your lives be built on him. Then your faith will grow strong in the truth you were taught, and you will overflow with thankfulness.'

These words from Paul's letter to the Church in Colossae have occupied my mind for some time. 'Let your roots grow down into him...' The Bible is filled with rich imagery of trees, from the tree of life in Eden, to the trees of the

field that clap their hands in praise, to the mustard seed that becomes a tree for all the birds of the air. We are likened to trees planted by streams of living water, bearing fruit when the season comes. From a tree, the cross upon which Christ was glorified was formed. And here, in his letter to the Colossians, Paul picks up the image again of a tree, with roots that reach deeply down into Christ.

What does it mean to grow our roots down into Him? Well, we know most roots do not grow quickly. They develop slowly but persistently, anchoring the tree. Roots provide nourishment and they enable growth above the ground, even in seasons of drought and adversity. Without strong roots, a tree has no stability, no strength, and no lasting fruit.

To root ourselves in Christ is to ground ourselves in His presence, His Word, His love. It means allowing His story to shape ours. It means drawing our nourishment not from the shifting soil of what society considers success, but from the unchanging character of God. It is to practise prayer, read our Bibles, worship, and serve others.


Paul writes that when our roots grow down into Christ, our lives will be built upon Him, our faith will grow strong, and we will overflow with thankfulness. We will become living signs of God's abundance and grace. So perhaps at this turn in the season we may take time to consider our roots. Where are we planted? What are we nourished by? What helps us to grow? How can we grow roots deeper down into Him?

St John's church has a story to tell. It is a 'treasure house' of heritage, history & community.

Inside the church and in the churchyard are carvings in stone and marble from the late 18th century. There are old wall paintings, monuments, tombs and stained glass to discover.

St John's was not all built in the same period style, so you can trace its architectural history from 1795 to today.

# **Changes at Communion**



For the 5 years since Covid hit, we have been administering the bread and wine at Holy Communion using intincture: the wafer of bread is dipped in the wine and then handed to the communicant. We did this to avoid the risk of any infection being passed between communicants.

It is now a requirement for all Church of England Churches to administer the wine from a common cup and intinction is no longer permitted at all. The Staff Team only became aware of this in July, when Bishop Nick sent a letter to all the clergy in the diocese. Over the summer we have returned to giving the bread and the wine separately and we no longer intinct.

Now, when you now come up to receive communion, the celebrant will give you the wafer of bread. You are then invited to move to one side or the other to be offered the chalice Or you may simply choose not to receive wine, and just take the bread.

#### An important practical note.

There is not a lot of room on the dais. Please go to receive the wine from the person who is free, regardless of whether they are standing on the side of the church where your seat is or not. We appreciate that many people wish to go to the side chapel after they have received communion. If you need to cross to the other side of the dais for the chapel, please go BEHIND the altar. If you need to get back to your seat on the 'other side' of church, if possible please go via the side aisles and the back of church.

## **Marking Generosity Week**

#### **PRAYING**

Individually, and as a congregation, we have regularly used the St John's Prayer for Growth. (see page 9. It is always included in the magazine, and the weekly news sheet ) God has answered that prayer in many ways, not least in sending so many wonderful people to join us. Some have brought specific gifts in music; office and technical skills; welcoming and pastoral care. But all have brought their love of God, and willingness to share in the work and worship of God in this place. Which brings us to:


Our vision is underpinned by the values of: 'nurture, learn, succeed, together'.



# Learning to Pray by Example

Luke 11:1: 'Lord, teach us to pray.'

Luke tells us that the disciples asked Jesus to teach them how to pray after He had just prayed. This is very important. In His preaching Jesus had spoken about prayer; e.g. Matt. 6:5-8. He had also included prayer in His teaching; e.g. Luke 18:1. But it was neither His preaching nor teaching on prayer that inspired this request from His disciples; it was His *example* in prayer. Also, Jesus had sent His disciples out to preach, yet their request was not, 'Lord, teach us to preach.' They had witnessed the mighty miracles that He performed and saw the astonishment of the crowds (Luke 9:43), but they did not ask Him, 'Lord, teach us to perform miracles.' No, they asked instead, 'Lord, teach us to pray.'

The disciples were beginning to learn that there was a direct link between the prayer life of Jesus and His Spirit-anointed ministry. We need go no further than what we find here in Luke's Gospel to see the consistent prayer life of Jesus. As news of His mighty ministry spread far and wide, 'great multitudes gathered to hear and be healed' (Luke. 5:15). This was 'high noon' in the ministry of our Lord and as the crowds gathered to hear Him, 'He withdrew to the wilderness and prayed' (v.16).

The next chapter tells us that Jesus made a habit of having whole nights of prayer. 'In those days He went out into the hills to pray, and He continued all night' (6:12). A little later the evangelist records that immediately following the feeding of the five thousand, the disciples were with Jesus – and He was praying (9:18). When Luke recounts the Transfiguration of Jesus, he says the Lord took Peter, John and James up the mountain 'to pray' (9:28).

Luke wants his readers to know about the prayer life of Jesus. At every step of His ministry we see Jesus praying. He prayed early in the morning before the day began; He prayed late in the evening after hours of demanding ministry; He prayed in secret; He prayed with His disciples, and He often prayed all night. He prayed in homes; He prayed by the roadside; He prayed on mountains; He prayed in boats; He prayed in the wilderness; He prayed in the synagogue; He prayed in the Garden of Gethsemane; He prayed on the Cross.

No wonder that Jesus' example in praying prompted His disciples to ask, 'Lord, teach us to pray.' As we read and study the life and ministry of our Lord, we will be likewise moved to ask Him, 'Lord, teach *us* to pray.'

# **Community Use of St John's Church**



Our fully equipped kitchen opens onto café area 6 tables + 24 chairs.



The tables can be removed to make a larger, more flexible, meeting space. The café area costs £18 an hour, including the kitchen. The kitchen costs £15 per session (half day or evening) when hiring the nave or Samaritan room.

# **New Beginnings**

September is the time of year when we get back to our routines after the summer break. As whole-life disciples (lit: *learners*) we are all called to learn from Jesus and live like Him. God wants us to make a difference in our workplaces and schools, and with family and friends. As Paul writes:

'And whatever you do, whether in word or deed, do it all in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through Him.' (Colossians 3:17).

#### 'WHATEVER you do':

God is at work in every aspect of our lives. He can use whatever we do to make a difference to those around. Do we believe this? Our lives shouldn't be like an orange, segmented into the sacred and secular, but more like an apple, in which all of our lives are available to Him.

#### 'Whatever YOU do':

God wants to use us to share God's love as we serve others around us, wherever we spend time. We can trust Him for the resources we need hour by hour, day by day, year by year. What do we need from Him?

#### 'Whatever you DO':

We work for God alone, in responding to God's love for us. How does this perspective make a difference when what we do is hard, unrewarding, or even unappreciated by others?

A man standing on a train platform was asked one day: 'Who are you?' He replied, 'I am a Christian thinly disguised as an accountant.'

If we were asked the same question, how would we respond?

As disciples of Jesus Christ, our identity is rooted in God and His call upon our lives. For each of us, September means learning from Jesus about how we might live for Him in the different places we find ourselves.
