Gospel Reflection – Luke 14:25-33

This Sunday's Gospel (Luke 14:25–33) contains hard words from Jesus: "If anyone comes to me without hating father, mother, wife, children, brothers, sisters — yes, even life itself — he cannot be my disciple." Surely Jesus isn't calling us to despise those we're commanded to love?

St Augustine clarifies that in Scripture, "hate" can mean to love less. Christ is reordering our affections, not abolishing them. As he says, "He who prefers father or mother to Christ, loves not father or mother as he ought." When Christ comes first, our love for family is purified and strengthened. St John Chrysostom adds that prioritizing Christ makes every trial dishonor, poverty, even death bearable. Origen notes that "hating our own life" means rejecting the false self tied to sin and pride, allowing a new life of grace to rise.

Jesus illustrates this with two parables: a builder calculating the cost before laying a foundation, and a king assessing his strength before battle. Discipleship demands deliberate commitment. You must count the cost and be ready to carry the cross.

We see this principle in action. In 1997, Steve Jobs saved Apple from bankruptcy by cutting projects from 350 to 50, focusing on what mattered. That discipline led to the iMac, iPod, and iPhone. James Dyson, after 5,127 prototypes, created a revolutionary vacuum by persevering through setbacks. Contrast this with Woolworths. which collapsed after spreading too thin, or WeWork, whose reckless expansion led to its downfall. They failed to count the cost

Counting the cost in everyday life means putting Christ first in practical decisions. In family life, it might mean prioritizing prayer or church attendance despite busy schedules, or forgiving a loved one when resentment feels easier. At work, it could mean choosing integrity—refusing to lie on a report, even if it risks a promotion—or setting boundaries to preserve time for faith and family. For personal goals, it might mean pursuing a path aligned with God's call, like volunteering at a shelter instead of chasing personal ambitions.

These choices require discernment and courage to align daily life with Christ.

St Thomas Aquinas speaks of the *ordo amoris*—the ordering of love. When God is first, we love others more truly. When He is second, everything unravels. Here lies a vital distinction. It is one thing to say that loyalty to family must not trump duty to God; it is another to treat rejecting one's family as a test of loyalty.

In destructive groups, people may be pressured into giving up a friendship, a hobby, or even a pet, thinking that this proves devotion to God. In truth, such tests serve only to measure devotion to the group itself. By contrast, Christ's call is never coercive. He calls us into freedom — to follow Him willingly, to carry the cross with open eyes and open hearts.

The Gospel's paradox is that loss becomes gain. Renouncing possessions leads to heavenly treasure. Carrying the cross brings resurrection. Losing the false self reveals the true self. This is not joyless sacrifice but life in its fullness.

This Gospel is demanding. Jesus seeks disciples who know the cost, choose it willingly, and walk with Him to the cross—where life, joy, and an unshakable Kingdom await.

The cost is real. The joy is greater.
