Eco Corner: Caring for God's Creation.:

What we can do to help maintain biodiversity:

Sprinkling some rocks: of the world's more

than 20,000 bee species between 64% and 83% nest in the ground. Researchers conducted an experiment to find how native bees responded to different nest materials, and found that sprinkling rocks and gravel over the soil resulted in the greatest increase in nests. Different bee species need different environments to survive.

Sprinkling some seeds: sometime all a vacant plot or empty lot needs to boost its biodiversity value is seeds! Researchers recently found that patches of wildflowers in cities can be just as good for insects as natural meadows. Collect and dry seeds from wild flowers that already grow in your garden, or buy native seeds or packets of seeds of plants that naturally grow in your area. A good sprinkling system is to use an old spice shaker for sowing flowering species in neglected spots!
