# Editor's Note



Change has been on my mind a lot recently. Not just the kind that comes with new school terms, shorter evenings, and the turn of the seasons, but personal change too.

For much of my working life, my focus was always on the next step. I would measure success by promotions and deadlines, always asking, "How quickly can I climb the ladder?" I thrived on being busy and often judged myself by how much I was achieving. But the truth is, that way of living can become exhausting, and it left little space to pause and notice what really mattered. Over the past months, I've found my priorities shifting.

Becoming more involved in church life has opened my eyes and my heart in ways I didn't expect. Instead of chasing the next rung, I've begun to ask different questions. Not "what's next for me?" but "how can I serve?" Not "what will help me get ahead?" but "how can I help share the good news?"

This issue carries that same spirit. We look back with thanks on the events that have brought our church family together, and we look forward with hope to what's ahead, harvest celebrations, the upcoming panto, and more chances to share fellowship and welcome.

So as autumn arrives, with all its fresh starts and challenges, I wonder what change might look like for you too. For me, it means looking less to my own ambition and more to the hope we carry as a church — to be people who help, who share, who welcome, and who spread the good news.

# TIME MARCHES ON

The canal towpath from Slaithwaite to Marsden has now been tarmacked. It is much more pleasant for walkers, runners and cyclists. I must admit to having mixed feelings about this, because I have lovely memories from when the children were young, of catching the train from Slawit to Marsden, and splashing through the mud and puddles in our wellies as we walked back along the canal, pausing at the floating Moonraker Café Boat for a hot chocolate or ice-cream for an occasional treat.

As I grow older, I admit to appreciating a nice tarmac path more, and muddy puddles less.

For some reason the new path has numbers all the way along. Starting at "0" near Tunnel End, they measure the distance in metres all the way to the guillotine lock at Slaithwaite, where the numbers finish on "4440".

The numbers go up in 10s or 20s, and as I walk or run along, I find it's a bit like travelling through time.

"0" about when Jesus was born. "30" when he began his ministry. "500" the start of the Middle Ages. "1060-1070" the last time we were conquered. "1500" the end of the Middle Ages. "1830" when St John's was dedicated. "1970" near enough when I was born. "1980" and "1990" school days and growing up. "2000" the new millennium. "2020-2030" the present.

Moving along the numbers like this gives a sense of scale. It feels a very long time since Jesus was born, and a relatively short time since St John's was built. My life-time is just the blink of an eye.

The events of the Old Testament are even further back: if the numbering system went back into the negatives, Abraham, Moses and Jonah would be somewhere inside the Standedge Tunnel, or in Diggle on the other side.

In the present, and looking back, we can see that science, technology and medicine are evolving at an astonishing speed, faster than I can keep up – like many others I ask my children to do things on my phone which have me stumped.

The numbers on the canal don't stop at "2020" or "2030". When I'm walking or running along, they take me from the past to the present and then into the future.

What will the world look like next year, or next century and beyond?

At "4440", the Guillotine Lock is even further in the future than Jesus' birth is in the past (back at Tunnel End).

In the future, I hope the planet will be alive and cared for, that there will be world peace, that greater knowledge will lead to greater compassion.

Through it all, I do know that our faith and beliefs will still be relevant and poignant. That the message of love and salvation will always be needed. That forgiveness, mercy and peace will win through.

Of course, the towpath doesn't stop in Slawit (although the numbers do). It carriers on through our parishes of Golcar and Longwood, and beyond to Huddersfield.

Through the years, and along the way, the Christian Faith is received and lived and handed on, as we all play our part in God's great plan.

We give thanks for the joy and energy that Guthlac's Gang bring each week and look forward to all that this new term holds.




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## Open the Book

# ST WILFRID'S HARROGATE LIGHTING THE WAY TO NET ZERO

News from Diocese of Leeds

Thanks to a Diocesan Net Zero Carbon Quick Wins Fund grant, St Wilfrid's Harrogate have been able to make big the historic building more welcoming. improvements to their lighting as part of their journey to net zero.

centre has replaced hundreds of halogen and fluorescent bulbs with efficient LEDs, added movement sensors in busy areas. and upgraded exterior floodlights to more suitable fittings.

These changes have reduced electricity use, improved lighting quality, and made

Facilities Manager Rebecca Oliver said: "There are still areas to tackle, but we are The Grade I listed church and parish aiming to have replaced 100% of the old inefficient bulbs and fittings by the end of 2025, a milestone on our pathway to net zero."

Grants are still available through the diocesan scheme to help churches with small-scale decarbonisation projects such as lighting, heating, insulation and more.

# KIRKHEATON CHURCH BECOMES MORE ACCESSIBLE THANKS TO PARISH GRANTS SCHEME



Kirkheaton Parish Church has made a simple but important improvement to their Parish Centre thanks to the Parish Grants Scheme. With a grant of £4,500, the church was able to extend their handrails right up to the front door, making access much easier for older members and those with mobility concerns.

Parish Administrator Cathy Howarth said: "Since the work has been done our centre users have been delighted with the improvements, especially those who lacked confidence to come on their own in case they couldn't manage."

The Parish Grants Scheme supports small projects of up to £5,000 that improve accessibility. It is part of the Church of England Disability Project (2024-26), which aims to remove barriers faced by Deaf, disabled and neurodivergent people in church life.





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
