



Tea-Time Service

We also have a service at 4.00pm on the third Sunday. Everyone is welcome. The service is very relaxed with songs, activities, readings and prayers.

It is for everyone: families of all kinds, children, adults, young and old. Why not come along? Drinks and biscuits (and sometimes cake!) will be available before the service.

Change May Not Be Comfortable

'It'll all end in fireworks!' Not, please note, WITH fireworks. That kind of celebration draws to a close with everyone facing the same way to watch the pyrotechnic display. Ending IN fireworks is a situation very close to breakdown; the 'fireworks' people are throwing at each other are metaphorical, but the sense of discord is obvious to those who are watching, rather than taking part in, the display.

And we've seen quite a few 'firework displays' over the last few weeks; in our political party conferences; in the international deliberations over Israel and Gaza; and some of us have seen rather more sedate displays in our local areas. It seems that, whenever something new is planned, or changes are proposed to existing structures, there's always someone to oppose them.

And although it doesn't affect us directly, we've seen some—thing of this in the church over the last few weeks. As most of you will be aware, the Bishop of London, Sarah Mullally, is to become the new Archbishop of Canterbury. This has posed a problem for those, clergy and laity, whose opinion is that women should not be ordained. It's a minority view in Britain. But in, for example, Nigeria, the majority of Anglicans are opposed to the ordination of women, and the Archbishop of Canterbury is the head of the world-wide Anglican church, not just the Church of England. No doubt the firework display will be very diplomatic: we just have to hope that we don't get too much damage from the falling sky rockets!

In November we have many special occasions which celebrate different points in the life of both the Church and our society. We begin with All Saints Day. While individuals who made a special contribution to the life and work of the church have their own named festival days, on ALL Saints Day we commemorate every one of those people whose discipleship has supported and maintained the life of the church, but whose history is never recorded. Then comes Remembrance Sunday, when we give thanks for the sacrifice of those who fought in the two world wars, and in other conflicts, to defend the rights of others. The month ends with the first Sunday of Advent; the season in which we prepare for the coming of Christ into the world at Christmas.

But before Advent Sunday we celebrate the feast of Christ the King. We are invited to look back over the past year, and to ask ourselves, 'How has what I have done, and said, over the past year enabled other people to see, in my life, the love and joy Jesus gives to his followers?' And our Gospel reading for that day is Luke's record of the crucifixion. It asks us, 'How far are you willing to go to show God's love for his world?

As Christmas draws near, many of us will be asked, by family and friends, 'Is there anything you'd particularly like this year?' If you were to ask God the same question, I wonder what his answer would be?

Habakkuk asks why and where?

The book of Habakkuk the prophet reads like a conversation most of us have wanted to have with God at some point. Although it was written about 2,600 years ago, it is surprisingly relevant today. Habakkuk is full of questions about what is going on around him – Why do the wicked prosper? Why isn't justice valued? And most of all, why does God, who is righteous, allow it to go on without taking action?

Habakkuk lived when evil nations were oppressing Israel and conquering their land. He was wondering where was God? Hadn't He promised them the land forever? It's God's inaction that frustrates Habakkuk. He wants God to rise up and help His people: he's cross that God doesn't even seem to be listening.

It's no different today. Injustice, crime, bad things happening to good people, evil people prospering. Human nature doesn't really change. All of us have scars from being hurt in some way and all of us say Why, God? Where are you? Why aren't you doing something?

God makes several statements against the enemy, listing their sins – violence, pride, greed, idolatry – and promises Habakkuk that He will demand justice for this. In chapter 2 v4 Habakkuk says 'See the enemy is puffed up, his desires are not upright, but the righteous will live by faith'.

This is a very important principle. The righteous person will live and won't have to face God's judgement. Think about that. 'God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son, that whoever believes in Him will not perish but have eternal life'. Only God can make us righteous and only then if we choose to accept Him as our Lord.

Habakkuk realises that this is true. He understands that while evil seems to thrive, and God seems silent and unresponsive, in fact, He has a plan and always works out justice ... eventually. And he finishes his conversation with a prayer of praise to God: *I will be joyful in God my Saviour*.

Support in Bereavement

There is a lot about death during November - All Saints, All Souls, Guy Fawkes being burned to death, the millions who have died in wars and conflicts world wide.

Death is something we will all come to eventually, and each death is a unique experience and a unique loss. It can be very difficult for some people to cope with bereavement and grief.

A church-run bereavement course is having a "profound and wide-reaching impact on adults of all ages," according to a recent independent evaluation.

The Bereavement Journey, run by the Christian charity AtaLoss, is "addressing a national need for bereavement support", and is "ideal for the significant majority — 85-90 per cent — of bereaved people who do not require or will not benefit from a clinical intervention".

AtaLoss was founded in 2016 by the Revd Yvonne Tulloch, a former Canon for Mission at Coventry Cathedral, whose husband died suddenly in 2008. She says: "We are a society where people have grown up not expecting death and where we have lost the art of support."

The course is made up of seven sessions of films and peergroup discussion. It is currently being run by churches in more than 400 communities across the UK.

If you have been left on your own by the death of someone close to you, it can be very hard to come out and meet with people. Our Wednesday 'Drop-in' has four 'regulars' who have lost partners and find it a comfortable,



familiar place to meet with other people and just chat, or listen, over tea/coffee. Everyone is welcome.

When your prayer is not answered

In 2 Corinthians 12:8 we read: 'Three times I asked the Lord about this ...but...'

Paul is talking about one of the most mysterious and most baffling aspects of prayer – when God does not say yes.

On the face of it, Paul's prayer was very modest. For some time he had been troubled by 'a thorn in the flesh.' He doesn't tell us what the 'thorn' was and down the centuries theologians and commentators have made suggestions. Most of them have thought that the affliction was physical because Paul says it was 'in the flesh.' Some have suggested that he suffered from epileptic fits which caused him to fall down, while others have suggested that he was laid low by constant fevers or that he had very poor eyesight, the last based on his remarks in Galatians 6:11.

But in spite of this great servant of the Lord praying earnestly three times that the thorn would be removed, God did not answer as Paul expected.

A number of things in verses 7-10 are very helpful to all of us in the matter of prayer.

- 1) Although God's answer was not what Paul asked for, God did answer him. God is never indifferent to the prayers we utter from the depth of our heart. Unlike the idol Baal in the Old Testament story about Elijah, (1 Kings 18) the God and Father of our Lord Jesus is not on a journey, nor is he busy elsewhere, nor is he sleeping. He hears our prayers and our cries when we come to Him in our need and pain and distress.
- 2) Although Paul did not get the answer he wanted, God made him a wonderful promise. He said, 'My grace is sufficient for you' (v.9). This was not what Paul asked for, yet what a promise it was! God said in effect. 'I will not take the

thorn away – but my daily grace is all-sufficient.' In spite of the thorn, Paul will triumph. When God gives us all-sufficient grace, it will take care of everything in our lives.

- 3) Paul learnt that God's wonderful grace meant that in his weakness 'the power of Christ' (v.9) would be with him, the power that would make him effective and fruitful in his ministry.
- 4) This experience taught Paul that he could be 'content with weaknesses and insults' (v.10) because it was for Christ's sake, and when he is weak in himself, he is strong in Christ (v.10).

So what about unanswered prayer?

Unless our prayer was selfish and not for our good in the first place, God *does* answer our cry. When the answer is not what we expected, then it means that our loving Father has something for us even better and more important than what we asked for.

Liz Oldroyd is asking us 'How Big is your Environmental Footprint?'

Nationally

The Church of England is tackling its own carbon footprint by aiming for Net Zero Carbon by 2030. If you would like to know more, go to www.churchofengland.org where you can find their environment programme, a route map to net zero, and guidance for churches.

Personally

The 'A Rocha' Eco Church silver survey, which we undertook, encourages individuals and households to learn about their own carbon footprint and to discover how to make small steps to influence the environment and climate change at home.

It's some time since I measured my own carbon footprint so I tried the WWF (World Wildlife Fund) footprint calculator online. It only asks for the first part of my postcode to begin the questionnaire, which is based around 4 categories: home, food, travel and consumption.

My carbon footprint total is 9.5 tonnes, close to the national average of 8.4 tonnes. It was fairly evenly spread between the 4 categories. Energy and transport are big scorers for most people.

To help me reduce my score, WWF gives me two suggestions for each category to improve my lifestyle to benefit the climate. Not all are practical or cost effective just now, for me, but they are definitely thought provoking.

There are other Footprint Calculators available to use, needing different levels of information, such as Climate Stewards, Climate Hero and Take the Jump.

Our church

St John's has to calculate its own, more complicated, carbon footprint and submit the results annually. This helps us to find areas for improvement in the church building, and the ways in which we use it..


















Follow Me at Wakefield Cathedral

The Follow Me interview is 7.45pm - 9.15pm. and open to everyone, with no booking required







Welcoming the Stranger - 10 years on

Mass migration is a feature of our time. Elections are fought over it, newspaper headlines whip up hysteria, and politicians try to avoid blame and responsibility alike. Yet these people [crossing the channel in small boats] present an opportunity for Christians to shift the discussion.

The Early Church's hospitality – sharing homes, possessions, and worshiping together across social and ethnic divisions – marked them out in the culture of the day. The letter to the Hebrews reminded believers of the welcome Abraham and Sarah gave to three travellers in Genesis 18, and told them to 'not forget to show hospitality to strangers, for by doing so some people have, without knowing it, shown hospitality to angels' (Hebrews 13:2). If any person could be a messenger from God, then every person should be welcomed, valued and treated with generous hospitality.

All this, together with Jesus' own example and call to love our neighbour, makes a compelling case. We might relate to receiving people into our house, but what when borders are involved? Or when it becomes difficult to tell refugee from migrant? Christine Pohl said: "as citizens of privileged nations and members of comfortable churches, it is easy for western Christians to be wary of large numbers of refugees and migrants. We are fearful of refugee flows that might overwhelm limited resources and interrupt our valued ways of life."

Yet throughout Exodus, Leviticus and Deuteronomy, we see God regularly telling his people that they should 'not mistreat or oppress a foreigner', for they themselves 'know how it feels to be foreigners, because [they] were foreigners in Egypt.' Passages like these mean that making room for 'strangers' has always been a key part of the Judeo-Christian tradition.

This was actually an article from 2015 - and in 10 years we don't seem to have moved on very far. Perhaps we should all pray more and also try to act more effectively and positively.
