From our Rector, the Revd Jeremy Brading

October is often the month when Harvest festival is celebrated. Reflecting this, 3 out of the 4 parishes that make up the benefice, are celebrating harvest in October.

Throughout the past twenty years of post-curacy ministry, my experience of harvest has predominantly been in rural parishes. Consequently, I feel some link to where a high percentage of the harvest comes from - the hard work of the farming community. Over the past year or so, I have chatted with a number of local farmers about their work and heard their thoughts about Jeremy Clarkson's most recent venture. I have also read Clarkson's book: Diddly Squat - a Year on the Farm. The book narrates the first year of Clarkson's time as a novice farmer, conveying too why the farm is called Diddly Squat. Putting aside Clarkson's marmite appeal, essentially this is the place of sheer hard graft, unpredictable challenges and the occasional joy of UK farming. All these sometimes conflicting experiences make the essential task of making a living, particularly challenging for our farmers. Therefore, at harvest, we should express our gratitude to the farming community for producing the food that we eat, and for the mental cost that many farmers battle with.

In the Christian tradition, farming and the harvest have been closely connected. The history of monastic communities, witnesses to this connection. As they do today, monastic communities sought to work closely with nature. Many continue to choose to leave in a sustainable manner, working in partnership with nature. Indeed the discipline of daily prayer that sustains monastic communities, is punctuated by work in the fields.

Nationally, the Church of England has played its part, reflecting the farming year in prayers and services. Plough Sunday at the beginning of January, marked the occasion when the fields were first ploughed. In May the Church reshaped the pagan tradition: Robigalia. The canine world was a very happy beneficiary of the Christian changes, because until then, dogs were sacrificed to propitiate Robigus - the deity of agricultural disease. Refashioned by the church as 'rogationtide', this period anticipated the Feast of the Ascension and where fields and crops were prayed for, in hope of a decent harvest.

These prays for a successful harvest carried spiritually importance too. Familiarity with Jesus parables concerning the harvest, calls to mind God's judgement on us all. Matthew 24 conveys the Jesus' parable of the wheat and tares. This parable tells that God will harvest us well, by sifting what to keep and what to destroy (the weeds). The parable of the sheep and the goats conveys similar meaning, in respect to which direction God will sift you. At harvest we think of God sifting us, and we note that is wise to seek his mercy.



Church Bat talk and walk evening

On Wednesday 18th September evening visitors to the church were treated to a special event led by Kelly Hopkins of Staffordshire Bat Group. Suitably fortified by a hot drink, cake and even bat shortbread we started with Kelly's talk which introduced us to the fascinating world of bats. They are nocturnal hunters, living for up to 45 years of age who use different roosts through the year according to stages in their life cycle -



summer maternal roosts populated purely by females who care for their own and each other's 'pup' giving birth to just one a year, males roost alone or in small groups and use different locations through the summer and autumn until winter when bats return to hibernation roosts. All roosts are protected by law. (All UK bats are insectivorous but the only Vampire bats are found in South America. These live in large colonies where any injured bat unable to hunt will be fed by the colony and those who don't help might be evicted!)

As dusk fell, we walked through the churchyard using the Group's bat detectors which identified the hunting echo-location of several species - Brown long-eared, Common Pipistrelle, Soprano Pipistrelle and Noctule Bats (the largest in the UK).

A truly mesmerising evening!

Event ticket sales supported both the Bat Group and the church.

Winter Programme 2025/2026



Monday 6 October: AGM followed by David Robbie - **Great Haywood, Past and Present, People and Places.**

David is a retired teacher from Fair Oak School and local historian with more than a passing interest in R R Tolkien. His most recent publication represents over 50 years of research and over 30 years of writing. He will endeavour to condense all this knowledge into a lively, informative talk with some humour and poetry thrown in. Great Haywood, he says was founded by Angles in the sixth century and recorded in the Domesday Book of 1086. With its manor that included the adjacent estate of Shugborough and the ancient Forest of Cank, it became an important political, religious and commercial centre in the Middle Ages. He will speak of its' involvement in the tumultuous events surrounding the overthrow of Richard II in the 14th century, the Wars of the Roses of the 15th century, Tudor intrigues in the 16th century, the English Civil War of the 17th century and the Jacobite Rebellion of the 18th century. He discusses the transport revolutions of the 18th and 19th centuries and Great Haywood's location on four great highways of travel and trade. He will talk about the powerful nobles, influential politicians, fine artists and writers, a serial killer, Nazi war criminals and a large tropical reptile who all have had links to this village.

Monday 3 November: Berenice Wilson: Anglo Saxon Women

Berry's research is on Anglo-Saxon women 1050-1150ish. Using mostly the Domesday Book as her main source she is able to piece together the life stories, vignettes as it were, of the English women who managed to ride out the vicissitudes of the Norman Conquest with their landholdings still intact. Staffordshire exemplars include Godgifu of Madeley who held a quite substantial group of holdings around Moddershall; Aki's sister, who may have been a hermit or a nun at Stone; and last but not least to Lady Godiva who may have spent time in Kings Bromley.

Monday 1 December: Ann Featherstone: **Fools and Horses the Victorian Circus**This talk provides a fascinating insight into the history of the Victorian circus: the buildings and tents, the feats and performances and the lives of the men and women who rode, tumbled and clowned in them.

A history of the hey-day of circus, in the Victorian era is one of high success and dreadful failure, of fires, falls and fabulous feats. Of horses, equilibrists, aerial acts and clowns, and the men (and women) who rode, tumbled, swung and gagged. Of 'Lord' George Sanger whose circus was pitched at Windsor Castle to perform for Queen Victoria. And Charlie Keith who invented the first iron circus. This talk provides a fascinating insight into this little known aspect of Victorian entertainment.

Monday January 12: Kent Parson: One man's journey into the past; A tale of persecution, romance, massacre and shipwreck.

Handsacre resident and keen family history researcher, Kent will share fascinating research into his 19th century ancestor, the Reverand his 3x great grandfather Joseph Parson. It starts when the Rev. sails to India to take up a chaplaincy... It covers the Rev sailing to India to take up a chaplaincy and covers persecution, romance, massacre and shipwreck! He shares his discovery of an intriguing DNA discrepancy in the family. Kent will also provide a list of websites (in a handout) which might prove useful in members' research.

Monday 2 February: Vanessa Morgan - 'How to do Family History'

Vanessa worked as a genealogist for many years. Working for people as far afield as Australia and Canada, but also doing a bit of heir hunting. Also, a writer, she has written seven books for The History Press, local history and how-to family history books as well as true nineteenth century murder cases. Her talk will give some handy pointers for beginners researching family history and for those more advanced researchers. She will try to answer queries you may have. If anyone already has a specific question in mind, let me know and I will pass it on in advance of her talk.

Monday 2 March: Sally Roberts – Mary Adela Blagg – Cheadle's Pioneering Astronomer.

Sally, a member of the Cheadle Discovery Group became interested in one of the earliest female astronomers when she learned that she was living in Mary Blagg's house.

Mary was one of the first women to be admitted as a fellow of the royal astronomical society. A crater on the moon is named after her. A minor moon was named after her only a couple of years ago. She collated a lot of mapping, references, drawings etc to create one 'map' of the moon which was used for many years. She developed an improved formula for calculating the distance between a star and its planets (this was used until the1960's) She lived her whole life in Cheadle, an unassuming woman who did not court celebrity but was nevertheless respected by her (male) colleagues and, surprisingly for the time, given due credit.

As there was no meeting in August Members met on Saturday August 9th together with Mothers' Union members from around the diocese in Lichfield

Cathedral for a service to commemorate Mary Sumner, we were joined online by members from our link dioceses around the world. Members throughout the world in 84 countries remember this date which is officially recognised in the Christian calendar.

The service was led by Canon Andrew who spoke warmly of the tremendous impact that the work of MU is having worldwide. Firstly, practical projects such as Literacy and Financial Development which has seen many thousands of women and girls, who would not normally receive an education, becoming literate and which has since morphed into Financial Development helping many of these same women start businesses which enable them to earn an income to support their families. He then spoke of the campaigning arm where members are working to bring about change in society for women who are affected by harmful situations. Domestic abuse is an ongoing campaign as is the fight against female genital mutilation, a practice still being performed in many countries. Supporting refugees and Church and Community Development enables people to take on responsibility for their own life journeys.

In Lichfield work takes place in many of the nine prisons in our diocese. Garments are knitted for premature babies and delivered to local hospitals. Families unable to afford a holiday are given breaks through AFIA – the Away from it all scheme - financed by members. We also have been knitting hats for farmers in collaboration with the Farming Community Network – the reason for this was a response to the huge number of mental health issues among farmers – each hat has a label sewn into it giving contact details for them to obtain help. Every branch often has its own local project involving working with families in their own parish.

Mary Sumner founded MU in 1876 and next year we shall be celebrating our 150th Anniversary. It is often said that the Mothers' Union is the churche's best kept secret, as members continue to work quietly without making much fuss. However, this may change in 2026 as we gear up for a big celebration supported by our Patron, Sophie, Duchess of Edinburgh who took on this role earlier this year following on from Queen Elizabeth.

At the conclusion of the service we joined together for a picnic lunch outside the Cathedral, joining the many families and children enjoying the Beach in glorious sunshine.

At our meeting in September we discussed our plans for our own celebration in 2026 and also for a family friendly Advent event which we hope will take place on Advent Sunday.

Water and Wells was the subject of a Quiet Day which some of our members took part in, held at St. Chad's Church, Lichfield in September. A wonderful relaxing and reflective day.

They started the Food bank 14 years ago in the Community Church in Rugeley, when a lady attended to see if there was any excess food that could be given to families in need on the Springfields Estate. So many families were in need that they needed bigger premises in Rugeley and the Trussell Trust gave Dave all the



information that was needed to help them set up the Rugeley Food Bank

Dave & Marie work with around 15 volunteers who weigh and date all the food that is donated. A food parcel is made up to last around 3 days. Each family is given a time slot, and Marie gives the food that suits their needs.

During the Pandemic they had lots of food donated so Rugeley donated to other food banks. They get donations from various supermarkets. Tesco Rugeley is their main supplier. They appreciate all of the donations from Ridware WI. They also work alongside the Police, Prison officers and a Neighbourhood officer to help people in need. Rugeley food bank gave out 872 vouchers which fed around 2044 people. They also appreciate cash donations as sometimes they have to buy certain foods and other products in.

They gave us a few examples of what had happened to people and why they were using the Food bank, and how people end up in hotels with only a kettle in the room. They have also supported families with rent and debt issues.



Rugeley food bank also help families with furniture and other household items if needed.

It's not always people who are off work who use them. They've had working families that have fallen on hard times. It's such a shame in this day and age that these things happen, but thankfully, there are people like Dave & Marie and volunteers helping people in need.

WI members did not have a competition this month; instead, we donated items to the food bank, some of which came from our allotment.






