MERCY RESCUE TRUST NEWS FROM BARBARA

Hi Everyone,

After two U-turns for Emma, I arrived in Kenya safely.

I've now been at Mercy Rescue for 2 weeks, following a couple of nights in Nairobi with Sally's daughter Carlyn. Who just like her mum looked after me well.

The journey by coach from Nairobi to Kitale seemed never ending, (578km). lots of heavy traffic and heavy rain slowed us down. Instead of the normal 7-8 hours it should have taken it was almost ten hours. Very affordable at 17.000 Ksh (£9.87), comfortable, spacious and reclining seats.


I was met in Kitale by Aggrey, Sally's husband who took to their home where I received a great welcome and a lovely meal.



What a delight it was to be able to have a shower and then snuggle down into a cozy bed and have a good sleep. The delights of having running water didn't last long maybe 2-3 days before the water tank ran dry, waiting for the water authorities to pump the water through. I can count on one hand the number of showers I've had in the past two weeks, but don't worry I have a hot bucket shower every morning except one day when we were without electricity for over 24hours and the portable gas ran out. That morning it was cold bucket showers all around, for me it was a very quick one at that. The men collect water each day in Jerry Can's from one of the local neighbours who have their own borehole.

Thank God for water it's a very important commodity we don't miss it until we haven't got it. Not sure when we'll get running water as there is now a burst pipe further down the road and as of, yet I haven't seen any signs of work men.

Over the past weeks Mercy Rescue has been busy doing what it does best, rescuing babies. Five precious babies have been rescued in the past few weeks. Three girls and two boys. Each of the babies has their own story of struggle and hope. and now a safe place to heal, to be loved and begin again. The babies are all stable and healthy and will soon be placed with one of our foster mums, as Mercy Rescue search for their birth family or an alternative family.



him two years ago is amazing. He has gained weight, and he hasn't got that drawn sad look on his face anymore. His condition is now under control with regular medication to keep him stable. He has recently started physio. He can now turn his head from side to side and has started to take an interest in his surroundings. He still has along long way to go, but I know that Mercy Rescue will never give up on him

These three toddlers I have named the three musketeers. Always together.

Peter, Elijah and Asaf. Many of you will remember Peter from the past, the little boy with a hairlip, now it is hardly noticeable. He is such a lively little boy now. Especially since he had his hernia operation some time ago.

Elijah is a very lively little boy two and a half years. He has difficulties with his swallowing and speech. He must take his food liquidised. Both Peter and Elijah go to a special class twice a



week to help them with their dexterity and speech.

Asaf is a lively two years old and likes to be involved everything, very inquisitive. Hopefully he will be found a permanent family soon.



Mick arrived a very poorly baby, and it soon became clear he faced some long-term health challenges, including cerebral palsy. But Micky is a true fighter. Over the years, he has grown into an incredibly kind, clever, and resilient young man.

Micky our miracle baby turned 13. We are so proud of him and so grateful to have you in our lives. Happy 13th birthday!!!

Jeremiah arrived late afternoon today. I don't know his story yet. He looks between 6-9 months and healthy, tomorrow he will be taken to clinic to be checked over.

NEWS FROM ANDREW FANSTONE



Back in Fortaleza it is always good to see God continuing to bless the boys we helped leave the life on the streets and gangs over the years.

On the left you can see Francisco with his wife. I shared about him in a previous letter a couple of years ago. We helped him start a small business which started with him finding used coca cola bottles, cleaning them and filling them with cleaning products and then selling them door to door. He started with two 100 litre barrels where he

would make his own detergent product. Now he has a building with thirty 1000 litre containers and has

machines to make and mix the cleaning products, fill automatically and put labels on the containers. He now supports some of the missionaries financially from his profits.

The other photo is of Davi speaking to a group of people. Davi used to be involved in drugs and gangs; I have known him for a long time now and seen him go through so much. I remember one day he was so badly beaten up by the police and his face so swollen and disfigured it was difficult to even recognize him. Now he is married, has built his own house, has won many people to Jesus and comes with me to share and talk about the Jesus who changed his life

It's Autumn!! The leaves are falling. The Harvest is gathered in. It may be the end of the growing season. BUT it is also the start of the Academic Year both here in the UK and in Sierra Leone. Miriam, the Country Director of Educaid I Sierra Leone has sent us a few notes at the pupils and students start their next year of studies.

Miriam writes "Last week a new school year began, and educated schools are filled once again with the energy and excitement of learning. From the morning lineup to the first lessons, it is inspiring to see our pupils returning with focus and enthusiasm spent space-space despite the heavy rains in Freetown and the grey skies in Port Loko.



The headteacher of the Maronka primary school said, "The first week back has been great. We had a great turnout of attendance, teachers engage students throughout the day on activity based learning and pupils were excited to be back in school safe and learning.

Over the summer educate schools were a little quieter with fewer pupils, but the educate team were hard at work



preparing for the new school year. Summertime is a busy time as teams develop and test data collection and instructional tools, hold training sessions, facilitate collaboration meetings with education stakeholders, organise departmental learning workshops and create new templates for the upcoming year. We also carried out essential bike vehicle and ICT maintenance to ensure our staff can reach and connect with remote partner schools. My favourite thing about working in educate is that you are always exposed

to new initiatives and skills. Educate is a learning ground and is always giving staff members the opportunity to improve themselves. This comment was from Hassan the site coordinator at educate Rolal secondary school
