

FROM THE VICAR

IS LIFE A BLIZZARD?

It's that time of year again: the shops are filling up with Christmas gifts, food and decorations. In a certain budget shop I saw a batch of snow globes, each with a little landscape inside. Having been sitting a while on the shelf, all the snow had settled down to the bottom. Not able to resist, I picked one of them up and gave it a good shake. The scene within filled with snow suspended in whatever liquid is inside. At first it whirled around, then slowed to a general blizzard, and then began to settle back down again. On the shelf, the pretend snow would all end up back on the floor of the globe.

Modern life often feels like this to me. The snow represents all the thousand and one things which crowd around and demand attention, some of them good and joyful, some demanding and onerous. But altogether a bit too much, and constantly filling up our lives and taking over.

Just as each snowflake is tiny and almost invisible, so are each of the things which compete for space in our lives. Put them all together and there is an impenetrable blizzard, blocking out all else.

The good news is that back on the shelf, the snow settles and clears, and once more you can see.

Sometimes we can wear ourselves out trying to juggle the millions of flakes which float into our lives, or battling our way through them. Over time, this can wear us out.

Is it time to let it settle? Is it time for a rest and a reset? Time to go back on the shelf for a while and let the air clear and things to settle down, so that once more we can see enough to make sense of things.

A retreat can help with this process of slowing and stopping, letting things settle and finding a new perspective.



Whether a retreat or in other ways, if you need space for the air to clear and time to breathe and see, then start making a plan for it to happen. Stop telling yourself it's only snow, stop saying you should be able to cope, or that you simply have to try harder.

Find a way to step aside for a while and let the snow fall to the ground. The air after the snow has settled is beautifully clear, it's like a whole new world.

St John's School Harvest Celebration

We were delighted to welcome St John's School for their Harvest Service, led by Rev Kevin Partington. The children filled the church with joyful singing and heartfelt prayers, reminding us how much we have to be thankful for.

Rev Kevin spoke about how Harvest can also spell Have, Eat, Starve, and Share — a simple reminder to think about others and share what we have.

It was a lovely morning of thanks, joy, and community.

LAUNCH OF THE SHOEBOX APPEAL

The church would like say a huge thank you to those who have already committed to giving to the Christmas Shoebox Appeal. Many of you have donated for several years, showing your support and kindness. The Appeal supports the work of One Big Family who help local homeless and impoverished people in Huddersfield and Halifax. One Big Family tells us they see an increase in people needing their support, year on year.

Sadly, according to Shelter, homelessness has increased in the UK by 14% in the last year, following a 12% increase the year before. Government figures report a 20% increase in rough sleeping in the UK since 2023. One Big Family supports over 100 rough sleepers across Huddersfield and Halifax.

It is a complex picture as many rough sleepers are single men, but also, statistically, children are the group most affected by poverty as it can seriously impact on their life outcomes.

For the men, our donations of men's socks, boxer shorts, deodorant, joggers and sleeping bags provide much needed comfort and dignity.

For children, more than a quarter of children in Yorkshire are below the poverty line.

Around 440 Huddersfield families are in temporary accommodation, such as B&Bs. In 2024, Kirklees Council said the number of homeless households needing temporary accommodation has risen by a massive 168 per cent since 2019.

as well as homeless and vulnerably housed people, our appeal also helps provide a food bank.

One Big Family don't donate toys directly but pass them on to children in Social Services, who are grateful for them as people don't often donate to Social Services.

So, the St Johns Christmas Shoebox Appeal is more vital than ever. We do make a difference to all those who receive a shoebox or any other kind of donation.

Last Christmas, we spoke with a man who had been homeless, living in a tent in the woods. He told us the effect of receiving a gift from an unknown stranger, in the form of the shoebox. He said it was so important - he knew someone cared and loved him. This man is fine now and part of the Golcar community. The shoeboxes don't just contain essential items; they are compassion in a box.



Also last Christmas, some children had newly arrived in Kirklees Social Services and had very little with them. The toys we gave provided Christmas gifts, including a toy pram for a 3-year-old girl who was delighted with it.

Items can be handed into church by Friday 28 November, but money can be donated any time after this date. The church is open on Sunday mornings and Thursday mornings.

If you would like to help us with the wrapping and packing of the shoeboxes before they are blessed and delivered, this will take place on the morning of Saturday 29 November.

So, if you are blessed enough to be able to give, however much or little, it is very appreciated. Thank you again for all your support.

Diocese News



WORKING TOGETHER TO CARE FOR OUR CHURCHES

News from Diocese of Leeds

Churches across the Diocese of Leeds are finding new ways to care for their buildings through Maintenance Collectives a project focused on collaboration and shared expertise.

Supported by a grant from the Church of England's Church Buildings Management Partnerships programme, the Diocese has launched two pilot schemes: one in a rural area (Wensley Deanery, Ripon) and one soon to begin in an urban setting.

The Wensley pilot has funded an architect to help churches develop maintenance plans, training sessions for staff and Feedback was overwhelmingly positive, volunteers, and

administrative support to ease the workload on clergy and wardens.

The aim is simple — make building care easier and free up more time for mission. Regular upkeep also prevents costly repairs later. To support this, participants attended the Society for the Protection of Ancient Buildings' Faith in Maintenance course at St Alkelda and St Mary's, Middleham. Attendees enjoyed practical and training, walkarounds, shared experiences, leaving encouraged and better equipped to care for their churches.

one churchwarden saying the day was "informative, enjoyable, and full practical advice."

The Diocese will soon launch its urban pilot and build on lessons learned to help more churches maintain their buildings well into the future.

BUBBLE CHURCH LAUNCHES IN MIRFIELD



St Mary the Virgin, Mirfield has launched a new family-friendly service called Bubble Church, designed to welcome young children and families.

The first service on Sunday 5 October drew around 25 people who enjoyed songs, puppets, Bible stories, and fun activities in a relaxed café-style setting.

Revd Graeme Blackwell, Assistant Curate in the Mirfield Team Parish, led the launch as part of the church's Year of Mission 2025. He said it was "wonderful to see so many families join us and share the joy of worshipping together."

Bubble Church will run at 4pm on the first Sunday of each month, offering a lively, welcoming way for families to explore faith together.

A New Chapter for the Church - Sarah Mullally Becomes Archbishop of Canterbury



History has been made. For the first time in nearly 1,400 years, the Church of England has chosen a woman as Archbishop of Canterbury. Sarah Mullally's appointment marks a turning point not just for the national church, but for parishes like ours too.

Her journey has been unusual. Before ordination, she worked in healthcare and rose to become England's Chief Nursing Officer, the youngest ever in that role. She was made a Dame for her service to nursing, then answered a later call to ministry. In 2017 she became Bishop of London, one of the most senior posts in the Church.

Now, she takes on the role of Archbishop at a time of difficulty. The Church is still facing the pain of safeguarding failures and the loss of public trust. There are deep divisions about inclusion, marriage, and how the Church should respond to the challenges of our society.

Mullally has not avoided difficult issues. She has spoken plainly about abuse, describing it as "shocking" and admitting the Church's failures. She supported blessings for same-sex couples, though not a change in the marriage rules. She has also spoken against assisted dying, warning of risks to the most vulnerable.

Her appointment as the first woman in this role will be celebrated by many and questioned by others. But whatever our view, this is a moment of change. She cannot lead by tradition alone. The Church needs wisdom, courage, and honesty.

For us here in Golcar, her appointment is not just a headline. It is a reminder that the wider Church is on a journey of renewal, and that we play a part too. How we welcome people, how we listen, how we hold each other accountable, all of this matters in the life of the Church.

Let us pray for Sarah Mullally as she begins her ministry as Archbishop of Canterbury. And let us also pray for our own church family here and that we may be shaped by honesty, justice, and love in all we do.

From the Parish Kitchen – celebrating the fruits of generosity and community.

This month, we've been blessed with an abundance of apples — kindly donated by friends of the church in return for donations to our gardening fund. What better way to celebrate this generosity than by turning some of those apples into something comforting and delicious to share?

INGREDIENTS

- 4 large cooking apples (peeled, cored, and sliced)
- 2 tbsp caster sugar (plus a little extra for sprinkling)
- 1 tsp cinnamon (optional but lovely)
- 175g plain flour
- 100g butter
- 75g light brown sugar

METHOD

- 1.Preheat the oven to 180°C (160°C fan).
- 2. Place the apple slices in an ovenproof dish and sprinkle with caster sugar and cinnamon.
- 3. Rub the butter into the flour with your fingertips until the mixture looks like breadcrumbs.
- 4. Stir in the brown sugar, then sprinkle evenly over the apples.
- 5. Bake for 30–35 minutes until golden and bubbling.
- 6. Serve warm with custard, cream, or ice cream and a thankful heart.

A little thought:

Just as our gardens flourish when tended with care, so too does our community when kindness is shared.

Thank you to everyone who donated apples and supported the gardening fund — your generosity continues to bear fruit in more ways than one!




