Planning Ahead: Exclusive Rights of Burial at Haltwhistle Cemetery

Many people find comfort in making plans for the future, including choosing their final resting place in advance. Haltwhistle Town Council offers the opportunity to purchase Exclusive Rights of Burial at Haltwhistle Cemetery, allowing individuals and families to make thoughtful arrangements ahead of time.

Exclusive Rights of Burial at Haltwhistle Cemetery grant the holder the legal right to use a specific grave space for a period of 99 years. Each grave can accommodate up to two burials and up to six interments of ashes, offering space for family members who wish to be laid to rest together.

For those wishing to have ashes interred only, an Exclusive Right for an ashes plot is also available. This provides the right to a smaller plot within Haltwhistle Cemetery, reserved solely for ashes.

Planning ahead in this way can offer peace of mind and reassurance that arrangements are in place according to your wishes. It can also help to fix costs at today's rates, as fees may increase over time.

Those wishing to plan ahead are warmly invited to contact the Burial

Clerk to make an appointment, enquire further about plots and costs or select a plot within Haltwhistle Cemetery.

Frequently Asked Questions
What are Exclusive Rights of Burial?

They are a legal document giving the holder the right to be interred in a specific grave or ashes plot at Haltwhistle Cemetery for 99 years. Ownership of the land itself remains with Haltwhistle Town Council.

Can I reserve a space next to a loved one? Yes, where space allows, adjoining plots can be reserved to keep family members together.

Can Exclusive Rights be transferred?

Yes. The rights can be transferred to another person, usually a next of kin, through a formal process with the Burial Clerk.

What happens when the 99-year period ends?

The rights can usually be renewed at that time. If they are not renewed, ownership reverts to the Town Council.

Can ashes be placed in an existing grave? Yes, up to six sets of ashes can be interred in a single grave in addition to two burials.

Haltwhistle Craft Fair - Make a day of it in Western Tynedale

The 38th Annual Art & Craft Fair in Haltwhistle is one of the friendliest craft fairs around. Set in the heart of Roman Wall country you can also visit some of the many natural and historic attractions in the area.

The event takes place in the Masonic Hall on Saturday 2nd November, 10.00 a.m. until 4.00 p.m. The fair is so popular with stallholders that the hall will be full of wonderful stalls.

The fair attracts a wide range of crafts from across the northern region and southern Scotland as well as local producers. Such a wide variety offers something for everyone.





In keeping with the Fair's ethos of promoting our county, the Northumberland Wildlife Trust will also be present. There will be homemade refreshments available all day and a raffle in aid of the Hannah Lucy Stage School, based in Haltwhistle.

The fair is the longest running and one of the largest art and craft fairs to be found within Tynedale and is organised to coincide with Christmas shopping! So come along to admire the local creative talent and buy some locally produced gifts.

Out & About

New owners have vowed to preserve the 1760 Quaker Meeting House in Coanwood

The Quaker Meeting House in Coanwood has been taken over and is now managed by Friends of Friendless Churches, a national charity preserving redundant places of worship.

This historic building, constructed in 1760, is on land provided by Cuthbert Wigham, a farmer from Burn House in Coanwood. All but one of the gravestones carry the names of the Wigham family, who worshipped there for more than 200 years. It was built in a simple Quaker style and serves as a significant piece of history for the local community.

A local supporters group, Friends of Coanwood Quaker Meeting House, aims to support the new owners in maintaining the building, raising funds, and encouraging its use for cultural and social events, and as a quiet place for reflection. David Penn, the chair of the Friends, said he hoped the positive development would inspire others to join the 40 plus members.

The Meeting House is popular with walkers, local residents and those interested in historic buildings. Anyone is welcome to pop in as the

Friends aim to keep this building alive, encouraging more people to appreciate its past and significance. We can now supply a power pack for lighting, computers etc for anyone wishing to hold an event.

On 14th September, 30 Quakers gathered for their annual picnic and meeting and on the 20th the Friends of Coanwood held an open day for visitors as part of the 2025 Heritage Open Days Festival. Those who attended chatted and looked at an historic photo film show by the South Tynedale History Group. Thanks to members who provided refreshments.

Holy Cross, Haltwhistle

Remembrance Sunday comes this month – a time for remembering those who fought and lost their lives, but also a time for chivvying ourselves to fight for good in our own day. We have a service in Holy Cross church at 10am and then make our way to the memorial in the park for 10.50am so that we can be ready for the silence at 11am. You are invited to both.

Fighting for good, and building a society that they would have been proud to die for perhaps, is all very noble, but it takes work. There is an amazing heritage in the stones of many of our old buildings. Along with the Black Bull, the Holy Cross Church counts itself as being one of the oldest buildings in the area and the heritage of that building has needed the labour of dedicated folk to keep its witness standing. That comes into focus every five years when we have our five yearly inspection of the fabric and recommendations for its upkeep. We've just had delivery of the most recent inspection. Obviously, it will take some money to carry out the recommendations for the building's preservation, and you might expect me to be asking you for some, but for us, a more urgent need is for people with the patience to

make sure the work is done - to contact contractors for quotes, to coordinate with the vicar so that they don't arrive on the same day as a wedding, and to keep tabs on the paperwork so reports can come to the church committee on what is needed and what is happening. St Cuthberts, Greenhead

Remembrance Sunday, 9th November, is a poignant reminder of the costs of war, and we see in the media a lot of what happens when people don't work for peace. In Greenhead we start at the memorial opposite the village hall at 10.50am and move into our church for more prayers and a service. (At Henshaw and Haltwhistle the ceremony starts with a short service at 10am in church, and then we move to the war memorials in time for a few minutes silence there.) You are all welcome at the service.

The members of Greenhead W.I. have been working hard to make sure the poppies look just right. We are very fortunate that our village and surrounding area does seem to work for a good relationship with everyone in the community and we give thanks to God for the blessings we have with each other.

After the Service why not cross over to the Village Hall for the Farmers' Market, celebrating 20 years. Enjoy Howard's bakes, hot drinks and the range of foods and crafts available as well as some excellent conversation!



At the end of that week we have a display in our church by the Calico Hinnies, a crafting group that uses the art of quilting and patchwork to whole make a range of including quilts, wall hangings, pictures, and handbags. The group has been going for about 20 years and their display will be open on during 15th Saturday the dav (refreshments available Greenhead Tea Rooms or the hotel), and on Sunday 10am until 2pm with the church service that day being 11am with refreshments afterwards.



All Hallows, Henshaw

As Winter approaches, complaints about a cold church start to be heard. At first it's just whispers in the furtive glances at churchwarden as they rub their hands together, then as winter tightens its grip, the comments become more direct, "It's cold in here today, is the heating on?" and eventually, "Why can't we just have the heating on all the time?". Of course the church is old, it doesn't have insulation, it's got a high roof and large single glazed windows. There comes a point when the building doesn't get any warmer, no matter how long the heating is on.



It's a big space to heat and as we all know, heating is expensive. Generally speaking we have one service of an hour each week so we have to be realistic about how we spend our limited income. Henshaw church used to be heated by a coal-fired boiler that would have pumped boiling water round the pipes around the base of the walls.

Today we have an oil boiler that heats the same pipes, but it operates with a water temperature of around 70 degrees, so inevitably the heating is less effective. The boiler is old, the manufacturer is long gone, spares are a problem, but replacing it is difficult with the Church of England pursuing a 'green' agenda. After three years of looking into more ecofriendly alternatives, we think we authorising convinced have the authorities that the only way is to continue as we are, so we are on course for a boiler like the existing but more efficient. In the meantime, we are dependent on our behaving old boiler and worshippers well! wrapping up What's never in doubt at Henshaw though is the warmth of the welcome! 11am Sundays (except Remembrance Sunday 10am).

The Harvest of the Hills

Autumn brings with it sharper mornings and darker evenings and that stunning autumnal light that sets off the golden and reddish colour of the leaves in this beautiful Roman Wall landscape.

You might have noticed as Autumn approaches the increased activity from the local farmers. Early morning trips with the Landrover and Ifor Williams trailer, heading off to Hexham, or Longtown or Carlisle with a load of lambs, or cattle.

This is the Harvest of the Hills.

Unlike the low ground farmers harvesting crops in July and August, with huge expensive machines, bringing in tonnes of barley or wheat, the hill farmers on the Roman Wall rely on sheep and cattle sales in September and October to make a living, it's that load of lambs or cattle that pays the bills.

The lambs that were skipping around in April and May are now ready for market, keeping the local butcher and the supermarket shelves supplied with the best of British lamb, reared to the highest standard



by the families that farm this beautiful but rugged part of the world.

The hardy Blackface and Swaledale ewes reared across the Roman Wall and Tyne Valley are crossed with a Bluefaced Leicester ram to produce a bonny faced North of England mule lamb. The North of England mule is recognised for its hardiness and adaptability and most of all its ability to successfully rear twin lambs. Buyers flock to the local markets in the North of England from Devon and Cornwall in the South to Caithness in the North, to secure these sheep for their own flocks.

For many, attending these annual sales is like a pilgrimage, generations of farmers have consigned sheep to Lazonby, Hexham, marts like Longtown and Carlisle. after spending weeks preparing them for the sales. Clipping their necks and bellies and dipping them in coloured dip to make them look smart. And it's been a successful sales season so far, despite the lack of grazing in the East and South of the country lamb prices have remained buoyant.

The Auction marts that conduct these important annual sales are more than just a place to do business, they are a social hub, where farmers meet over a coffee and a bacon roll in the mart café and compare notes. successes and before watching disasters, their carefully nurtured lambs being sold by a well dressed but rather noisy auctioneer shouting prices like a verbal machine gun. There's nothing like it, tweed caps and jackets and flexothane waterproofs are uniform and the smell of the sheep dip sticks to you for days, but the buzz of the auction is like a drug we look forward to these days, and before you know it, it's November and they're past.



But November is when the whole cycle starts again, the rams or tups as we call them up here, have been purchased for considerable sums, and the ewes have been sorted out ready for 'tupping' time, and the new crop of lambs will begin to appear in April like they do every year.

So, when the cold weather comes and the rain is battering off your window, spare a thought for the farmer out in the elements making sure the shelves are full of the best of British produce.







Hidden History

We Remember Them

Many of us may recall the 2014 public art installation 'Blood Swept Lands and Seas of Red' featuring 888,246 ceramic poppies around the Tower of London. Each poppy represented a British or Colonial serviceman killed in the Great War, with the installation marking 100 years since the start of that conflict. The public were invited to purchase a poppy in memory of lost relatives, and we bought two, including one for my Great Uncle Edgar.



Edgar was an insurance clerk, who'd joined the London Rifle Brigade at the start of the war aged only 22. He was in France by November 1914, and then onto Belgium. His memory has lived on in our family largely due to two strips of four sepia photos, the size that you'd get in a modern photo booth.

These show scenes from the Christmas 1914. with truce in captions in Edgar's handwriting on the back, including one of him with a German soldier titled 'Fritz on the Hindenburg Line'. These photos have been used in many a school project over the years and have helped put a human face on an inhumane conflict.



The poppies from the Tower of London were removed, packed and sent out to those who'd bought them. We received ours on Jan 5th 2015 – one hundred years to the day after Edgar died after being shot through the neck at Ploegsteert, Belgium, very possibly by one of the soldiers he'd been fraternising with two weeks before. Our ceramic poppies remain as a poignant daily reminder of the sacrifice made by others, for us.

Hidden History

Kenneth Norman 1920-1945 by Stuart Norman

On the morning of Monday 23 April 1945, a young RAF pilot flew out of Leeuwarden airbase in north Netherlands on a reconnaissance mission over northern Germany. His Spitfire developed engine trouble and crash landed near the town of Cloppenburg. His body was found beside his plane. His name, Kenneth Norman, born and brought up on the family farm of Portobello, Haltwhistle. He was my uncle, the youngest of a family of 6 children.

Growing up, my brother, Geoff, and I knew very little about Kenneth, other than he had been an RAF pilot who died just days before the end of WW2 in Europe. Apart from a few photographs of a young pilot we knew little about Kenneth's war service.

However, this changed when we read an article in June's Haltwhistle Herald by Alex Knoops of the Royal Netherlands Air Force Association (RNAFA). Alex has been researching and chronicling the 18 crew members of the Dutch 322 squadron who lost their lives during WW2. Three of these airmen were British, Kenneth being one of them. Having contacted Alex we were able to provide one or two photographs but, in return, we have learnt much more about Kenneth's life during the war.

Geoff and I had talked about visiting Kenneth's grave but it was due to Alex and an invitation to visit Leeuwarden airbase that we started to plan a trip to Germany and the Netherlands. Within days our pilgrimage to Europe had been planned and in September, my wife, Helen and I set off with Geoff and his wife Béatrice on our journey.

The trip was a mixture of emotions. Kenneth is buried in a commonwealth war cemetery just outside the village of Sage near Cloppenburg. The cemetery contains 970 graves set in immaculate, tranquil gardens in a rural area of Lower Saxony. Mostly, young servicemen, some only 19. We found it sobering-each grave marking a life lost so early. A testimony to the sacrifice so many young men, on both sides, paid for world peace.

Our visit to Leeuwarden airbase was equally moving. After a period of correspondence with Alex it was lovely to meet up with him and his wife Maroel. He had arranged an extraordinary tour of the airbase for us where we were met by some of the officers. Their enthusiasm for their chosen career. helicopter rescue pilots among them, was fascinating. After a tour of the museum we were shown a restored Lockheed F 104 Starfighter and an F16 Falcon undergoing restoration. These young Dutch crewmen talked with such respect and warmth about Kenneth and the other airmen who flew for the 322 Squadron.

We then met Colonel (Ret) Anton den Drijver, retired Commander of 322 Squadron and Chairman of the RNAFA. In a long and distinguished had seen action in career he Afghanistan and the former Yugoslavia. He joined us for lunch and spent the rest of the afternoon on our tour, which included being shown the latest F-35A Lightning. Our day ended in the squadron's headquarters where we



memorial plaque to the pilots who had lost their lives serving in the squadron. Again, it was touching to see how important the lost servicemen of the squadron are to the next generation.

We have so many people to thank for this amazing experience: Alex Knoops, whose knowledge and research is nothing short of exceptional. To the officers and former Commander of 322 Squadron who gave up their time to give us such a fascinating day at Leeuwarden airbase. Finally, to the Haltwhistle Herald for putting us in touch with Alex.


The music this year has something for everything, as no matter when you were born, from 1920 all the way up to modern day, I'm sure you will hear a song that you know and want to bob along to!


