OCTOBER

From the Rector's Desk

I am snuggled in the office, with a very dark, rich, coffee, having returned from have a 30 strong class of school children at Clawton St Leonard church, and churchyard, in the driving rain. I have had a quick meeting with a college and now in the afternoon half-light I sit and write this. Henry has pushed off to be with Sarah in protest at being excluded from the school/churchyard event.

This is a rare chance to catch up on admin, review recent events and get my diary in some sort of order. Someone recently told me they like to know what I am involved in month to month, so I will take this chance to share what is passing over my desk today...

Chapter meetings have begun again following a temporary suspension due to family illness in one of the Team, so working on an agenda. I have to update the Archdeacon on some Deanery vacancies that have been filled, and on the new treasurers in Black Torrington and Tetcott and new safeguarding officers in Tetcott, Ashwater & Beaworthy. I also need to follow up on Elizabeth Anderson, (Parish Support Officer) visit to help get our treasurers submission for the council aligned, and to publish the date (18th November) when a new e-package for treasurers is being presented. (David our Churchwarden from St Mary's is very much lead on this). Thus, things (admin) are moving along nicely. So, I turn at the other events for review or planning...

Highlights.

- Today's school based on-going project at Clawton Churchyard looking at Mortality, historical/census records, and local history from our year 6 Clawton Primary school, is part of a new multi-disciplinary community approach. There are two more events to book yet but is an excellent school package.
- Ashwater Agricultural show went well with a very active Parish tent from the church coupled with the Farming Community Network, with splendid competitions and a book stall as well; a really lovely day. The PCC also ran a splendid community/church pilgrimage to Brentor Church on Dartmoor, in very mixed weather two days ago with some splendid photographs to prove they made it!
- Ruby Benefice has little over 2000 people spread over 50 square miles, therefore support services are limited if they exist at all. It has become increasingly obvious that we have a real issue with Child bereavement and failed IVF. We have therefore created a small group of three Community Chaplains, all trained in bereavement, to work with me on a 'Light a Candle' child loss evening in the future at St Peter & James. More on this important event later.
- I am co-leading a national Anna Chaplaincy Training Day in October and booking in the planning time now, starting this evening.
- Having taken a strong lead from our Chaplain (and editor) Kay, who has identified a socially marginalised set of parents with Neuro-diverse children, worshipping or visiting our churches, who need more structure and targeted activities, and working with the school SENCO, and multiple Diocesan Children's and Disability advisor(s) meetings; we have received a significant Mustard seed grant to provide 'Fidget toys' (200 a box), fidget cushions and bespoke boxes, for deployment in the children's areas of St Leonard, St Mary, St Peter & James and St Peter (other churches will receive the same if bespoke children's areas are developed). I am awaiting delivery now, but am also seeking funding now for noise cancelling headphones.

- Our new MAP (Mission Action Plan) for Ruby is taking shape and forming a simpler 'Priorities for Mission' focused approach, and will sharply focus on community chaplaincy, young families and 'telling our stories' outreach program but there is much more to do on this, but 'little and often' are the rule of the day.

We are halfway into the 'Harvest season with a lovely 'Lammas day, at Beaworthy, two really well attended Harvest at St Leonard and St Mary, but I sadly could not attend the CT together evening at Halwill. More to come



There is so much happening and most of it happily driven by you. At the heart of what we do though, matching the wonderful busyness and achievement, are quite people at prayer. It all starts and ends with us talking to, listening to, and being, in our Lord's presence. Thank you. Paul.

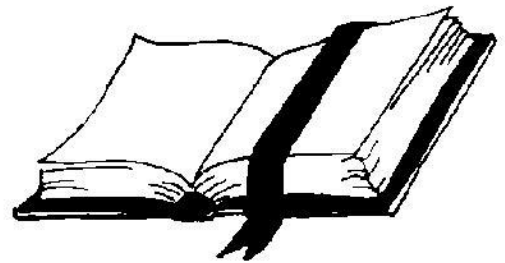

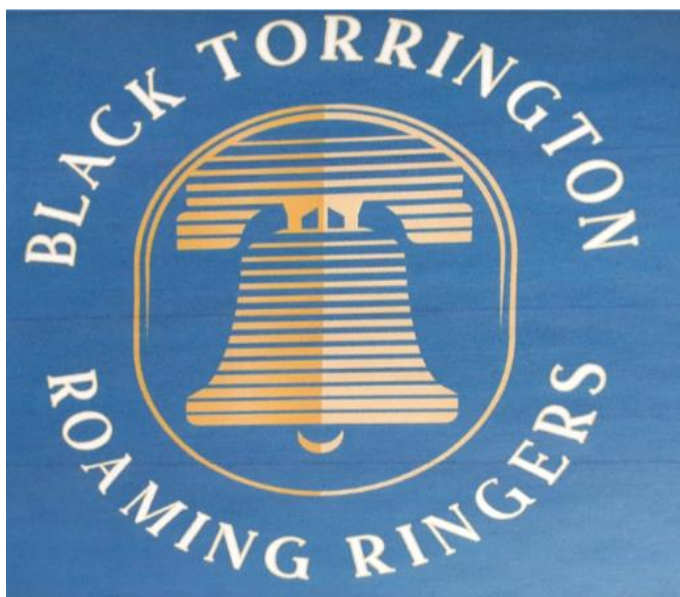

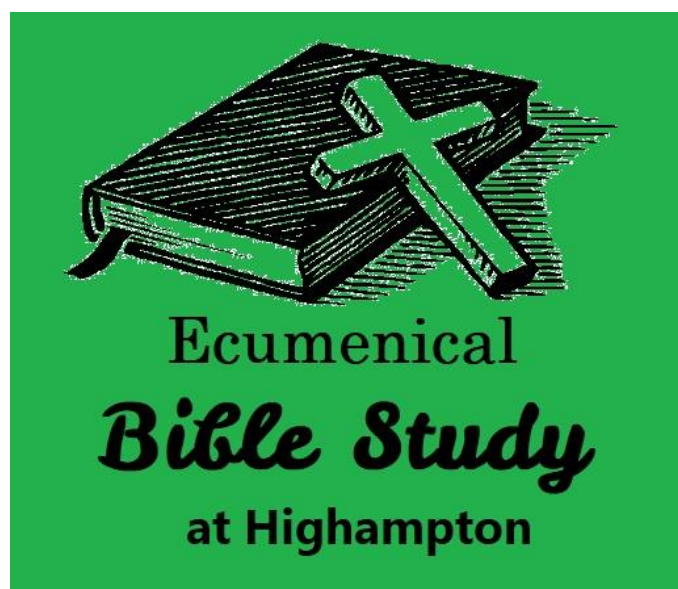

The Tailors of Ashwater

I initially picked out a grave of a young man who died aged 37, but in doing so, I stumbled across someone else, so this is a little bit of a two-for-the-price-of-one, but not as in depth as I would hope.



William WILCOCK
1821 – 1858

The first burial at St. Peter ad Vincula we encounter is William WILCOCK, who, at the time of his death, was a master tailor at Ashwater.

William was born around 1821 as the son of tailor Walter WILCOCK the younger and his wife Mary BEARE, and was baptised at Ashwater on 20th May 1821. He appears to be the middle of three children of the marriage, having an older brother, Richard Seccombe WILCOCK born around 1819 and a younger sister Ann, born in 1824.

At the time of the 1841 census, Ann was living with their parents Walter and Mary, while brothers William and Richard were living with their grandfather, Walter WILLCOCK [sic] the elder, alongside 20-year-old Thomas Clifton.

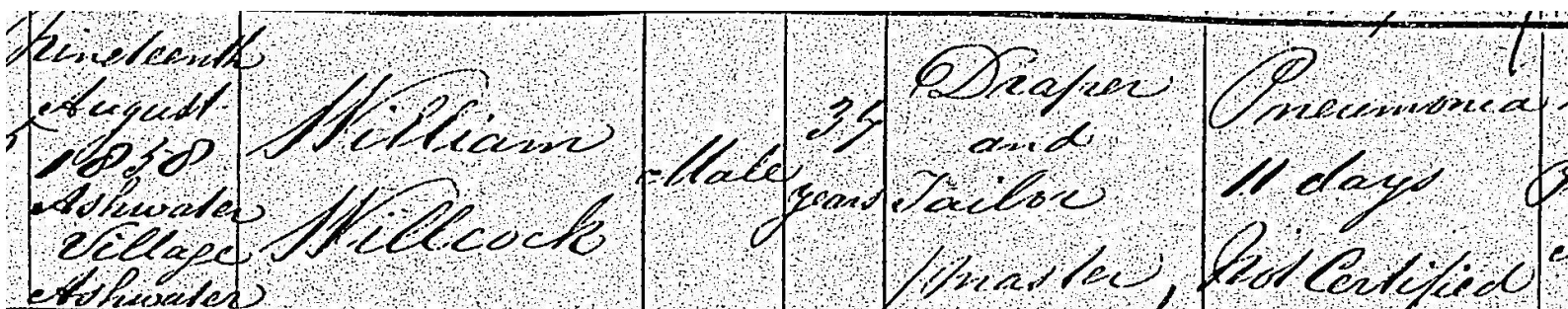
One theory for this could be that the trade of tailoring went back several generations; the boys William and Richard being trained by their grandfather. To support this theory, Thomas CLIFTON appears at Cliftons Cottage, Ashwater in 1851 with the occupation of “tailor”, which could plausibly be that all three boys were in training. Sadly, by the time of the 1851 census, both Walter senior and Richard had died – both are buried in the graveyard of St. Peter’s.

In 1851, it seems Ashwater was the place to be if you needed a tailor; Walter WILLCOCK, Thomas CLIFTON and William WILLCOCK were all registered tailors in the village, and William was training up some more.

At Crosspark Cottage, Ashwater William the master tailor was living alongside his 26-year-old wife, Tetcott-born Elizabeth BASSETT, who he had married the year previously.

Living with them were 13-year-old apprentice tailors Josiah PARKHOUSE and Joseph PARSONS.

On 8th August 1858, William WILLCOCK would start suffering with the symptoms of pneumonia and would die 11 days later on the 19th. His death was registered the next day, and he was laid to rest at Ashwater the day after that.

Having lost two sons, Walter WILLCOCK is no longer a tailor at the time of the 1861 census, instead he is working as a grocer.

Widow Elizabeth is the head of the family, now living at Clifton House alongside 24-year-old boarder James DOCKETT, also a tailor, and 13-year-old visitor Mary BASSETT. However, James would not remain as merely a boarder, as in 1863, James and Elizabeth marry.

By the time of the 1871 census, Walter and Mary WILCOCK are still living in Ashwater village as grocers, Thomas CLIFTON is still a tailor but there's a new guy on the scene; James DOCKETT, aged 34, tailor and mercer (dealer in fabrics). He is married to 43-year-old Elizabeth (William WILLCOCK's widow) and their two children, 5-year-old Eber and 3-year-old Laura.

By 1881, her former father-in-law Walter WILCOCK has passed

away, and the family of four have taken in 19-year-old Thomas ALLIN of Marstow as a tailor's apprentice. Still at Ashwater, they are now living at Village Cottage.

Despite several members of the WILCOCK family being buried at St Peter's, Ashwater, William WILCOCK's gravestone is the only one known today.

In the 1891 census, the family of four DOCKETTs is still intact, and their son Eber John DOCKETT is listed as a tailor and outfitter too, alongside his father, with daughter Laura working as an assistant to their enterprise.

By the census of 1901, both children have married and gone their own ways; daughter Laura has married Samuel CHAPMAN, assistant warder of Bodmin Jail and gone to live in Bodmin, while Eber has married milliner Fanny Brown FRY, and they are living and working together in Ashwater village, bringing up their two children, Cyril and Gwendoline.

On 29th January 1904, Elizabeth DOCKETT passed away aged 80 years old. She was buried at St. Peter ad Vincula, Ashwater. Just five months later, her son Eber John DOCKETT died on 14th June. He was, however, buried at the Methodist Churchyard on the outskirts of Ashwater. It seems that both Eber and Laura were brought up as Bible Christian Methodists.

Eber's wife Fanny would remarry – marrying John Thomas VEALE in 1923, just four years before her death. She is also buried at the Methodist churchyard. But before our final tangent to the Methodist church for Eber's family, we need to quickly revisit James DOCKETT.

James DOCKETT, 1837- 1912

James DOCKETT, renowned tailor of Ashwater for over thirty years, died on 11th December 1912 and was buried next to his wife in the churchyard of St. Peter's, Ashwater. Such was the regard of James as a tailor, he was mentioned 25 years after his death in his daughter Laura CHAPMAN's death notice when she was buried at the methodist cemetery Ashwater in October 1937.

But back to Eber DOCKETT's family for one final set of tragedies. As, his wife Fanny would live long enough to bury all of her children.

First of all, she sent Cyril off to fight in the First World War. Private Cyril James Fry DOCKETT, aged 23 of the Prince of Wales' Own Civil Service Rifles would be killed in action on 21st February 1918. He is buried in the Jerusalem War Cemetery, but commemorated also on his father's grave at Ashwater Methodist Cemetery and, as you prepare to commemorate Armistice Day, see if you can spot him on Ashwater's Village War Memorial.

Five years later, there was some happier news, as daughter Gwendoline Elizabeth Fry DOCKETT married her husband, farmer Charles ELLACOTT in 1923. This joy was to be short lived, as by the end of 1924, Gwendoline had begun to suffer the effects of pulmonary tuberculosis. There were no children of the marriage, and she died at Ashwater on 6th May 1926. She is buried at St. Peter's Ashwater.

Her husband remarried Alfreda SLEE in 1935 and both are buried at St. Peter's also.

I've barely touched on the DOCKETT tree, as there are more DOCKETTs in Ashwater, including John and Charlotte, James' parents. But that's more for another day.

I started this article with a handful of tailors, found lost generations of WILCOCKs, and ended up at the Methodist Cemetery with a story of a VEALE/DOCKETT/FRY who buried both her children through war and a disease we've visited here before.

This is a story of less intrigue and scandal than previous, but still relevant and important in its own way. Both the Methodist cemetery and ours hold many DOCKETTs, their descendants, their wider family through the ELLACOTTs and VEALEs – so many names intertwined with our own modern families, and yet – who truly recalls them?

Our not-so-distant relatives may have had clothes made or mended by DOCKETT or WILCOCK, CLIFTON or one of their apprentices. They would have bought groceries from their ancestors. And to us, they are just, if they are lucky, a group of faceless stones. But not today. They are us, just a century or so ahead.
