

Blackwater Benefice Ministry Team Message



It is the middle of October as I sit down to write this Christmas message. Strangely, Advent calendars have been in our supermarkets since about 1st September. We have also started to see Christmas advertisements on TV.

For those of us who are Christians, Christmas Day is preceded by a time we know as Advent. This year, Advent Sunday was on 30th of November, when we celebrated together as a Benefice.

Advent means 'coming 'or 'arrival.' There are many ways in which we can count down the days of Advent. Some people use Advent calendars to count down the time before Christmas, and there is a very wide selection on offer to us. Others may choose to count down the Sundays during Advent, of which there are four. However we choose to use this time, it is up to each one of us.

Whether you are aware of it or not, every year during Advent, we pause to reflect on the life of Jesus Christ by slowing down, listening, and anticipating, so we are better prepared to appreciate and enjoy our celebrations of Christmas.

As we all know, Christmas provides a rich tapestry for us to think about as we recall how God revealed Himself to us. The name of God has always been held sacred, not to be used lightly; it is a means of God's self-revelation to his people. Christmas is a time for rejoicing, remembering, and celebrating once again the birth of Jesus Christ, the Son of God. A human being like no other, fully human and fully divine.

God sent his messenger, Gabriel, to a young woman called Mary. Gabriel's announcement was that she would have a baby, who would be called the Son of God, and his name would be Jesus.

Mary understood that this was God's plan to bring us back to God, and she said yes, 'Let it be with me according to your word.' Mary prepared the way for Jesus to come into the world.

Are we able to say yes to God in our lives?

Jesus was the Word of God, from the very beginning, the light of the world that could never be put out.

News from the Belfry

I sometimes despair when I see Christmas cards for sale at the beginning of September. It is as if the true meaning of Christmas has been hijacked by commercialism. We all have activities that we enjoy the most over the Christmas season. It may be going to church on Christmas morning, decorating the tree or meeting up with friends and family members. My husband particularly enjoyed ringing the bells on Christmas morning, but sadly this year he will be unable to do so as he has, in bell parlance, hung up his sally. He would like to thank the members of the band for their friendship, support and encouragement throughout what has been a difficult and challenging time for him, especially Janice, our Tower Captain, for her patience and understanding.

I particularly enjoy singing Christmas carols and never tire of the traditional ones so beloved of church congregations. There are, however, many beautiful carols generally not sung in church, as their arrangements are not suitable. One of these is "The Carol of the Bells" based on the Ukrainian folk song "Shchedryk", traditionally sung at New Year and, translated, means "Little Swallow". The music for the song was written by Ukrainian composer Mykola Leontovych in 1916. First performed by the students at Kyiv University and introduced to western audiences by the Ukrainian National Chorus during its concert tour of Europe in 1919, the song was then premiered on 5th October 1922 to a sellout audience at the USA's Carnegie Hall. The original work was intended to be sung in four parts a Capella, that is, without accompaniment. The English language version was written in 1936 by Peter Wilhousky, also of Ukrainian descent. The carol gained popularity when it was featured in the films "Home Alone" and "Harry Potter". If you are unfamiliar with the carol, you can hear it on YouTube.

The lyrics are set to a catchy four note repetitive rhythm reminiscent of the pealing of bells:

Hark! how the bells, sweet silver bells, All seem to say, throw cares away. Christmas is here, bringing good cheer To young and old, meek and the bold. Ding, dong, ding, dong, that is their song With joyful ring, all carolling. One seems to hear, words of good cheer From everywhere, filling the air. Oh, how they pound, raising the sound O'er hill and dale, telling their tale Gaily they ring, while people they sing Songs of good cheer, Christmas is here. Merry, merry, merry, merry Christmas Merry, merry, merry, merry Christmas. On, on they send, on without end Their joyful tone, to every home.







Year 2 Visit to Call of the Wild Zoo

We also found different insects and fish by dropping a net into the stream and using magnifying glasses to look at them...some of us got a bit wet! We learnt about the history of Daws Hall and walked between two counties! It was so much fun and we were all very tired by the end of the day.

Year 5 First Aid

Year 5 recently went to do First Aid training. We were taught how to do CPR and work with a defibrillator. Did you know that your heart beats 120 times a minute?

Firstly, we were taught about what to do if you see an unconscious casualty—call for help as soon as you can! We were taught about the rules of slicer which means service, location, injury, casualties, emergency and repeat location. Next, we went over to the floor and practised putting people into the recovery position which is surprisingly easy.

After that we learnt about CPR. The mannequins that we were practising on made a click if you pushed hard enough. The CPR was probably one of the hardest bits as you had to push very hard for it to do a click. We also had to do mouth to mouth which was unsurprisingly disgusting.

Next, we focused on working on how to use a defibrillator. We had to get the machine out of the bag and turn it on which was quite easy but putting the pads on was harder. You had to smooth the pads down so that they were extremely flat which was challenging. Next, we had to follow the instructions that the de-fib gave us and although it was only a training de-fib it still wasn't the easiest.

We finished by watching a couple of videos and talking about what to do in different emergencies. Overall, we all had a great day and enjoyed it very much.

Then, we uncovered what the owl had eaten by looking at the bones

of the previous creature; there was a mixture of rodents, moles and small birds. Afterwards, we created a chart to identify different leaves including ivy, lambs ears, oak and holly. I really enjoyed that one.

Our final activity was painting with watercolours at the pond. We sat on tarps and painted a picture of what we could see. Most people chose the bridge or the reeds as their subject. Overall, I really enjoyed our outdoor learning day!

A Bear and A Beatle (sort of)

This January marks the 100th anniversary of the birth of two famous people, although both are probably more famous for their association with others. Firstly, on 13th January 1926, Thomas Michael Bond was born in Newbury in Berkshire. However, as Michael Bond, he is celebrated for his creation of Paddington Bear.

Michael Bond created Paddington in 1958 as a refugee from deepest, darkest Peru, who was taken under the wing of the Brown family, and featured in 29 books telling of his adventures. It should also be noted that Michael Bond wrote many other books, including the Olga Da Polga series and the Monsieur Pamplemousse series, as well as other books, picture books, and television scripts. He died aged 91 in 2017 and is buried in Paddington Old Cemetery with an epitaph on his gravestone reading "Please look after this bear. Thank you".

The other famous man more associated with others born 100 years ago was George Martin. Born on 3rd January 1926, he was best known for his production work with The Beatles. He was also a musician, composer, and conductor in his own right. He joined EMI in 1950 and eventually became head of the company's Parlophone label, where he produced numerous comedy records, including recordings by such artists as The Goons, Peter Sellers, and the cast of Beyond the Fringe.

George Martin also formed a working relationship with Brian Epstein, the manager of a number of Liverpool acts, which ultimately led to Parlophone signing the likes of Gerry and the Pacemakers, Billy J Kramer and The Dakotas, The Fourmost, Cilla Black and, of course, The Beatles, The signing of The Beatles was not straight forward but that is a different story!

George Martin was known for his innovative and experimental recording techniques and produced all of The Beatles' original albums. He was also famed for many other productions, from film scores to television work, but it was his unofficial position as "the fifth Beatle" for which he is most remembered. He passed away aged 90 in 2016.

A Brief History of the Christmas Tree



Long before the advent of Christianity, plants and trees that remained green all year had a special meaning for people in the winter. Tree worship was common among the pagan Europeans, who believed that decorating the house and barn with evergreens at the New Year would keep illness and the Devil away. The modern Christmas tree, though, originated in western Germany and was first recorded to be used by German Lutherans. The Germans set up a paradise tree in their homes on 24th December, the religious feast day of Adam and Eve, "a fir tree hung with apples", that represented the Garden of Eden. The triangular shape reminded humanity of

the Trinity and how it points to heaven. They hung wafers on it symbolising the Christian eucharistic host. These wafers were later replaced by cookies of

various shapes. An angel or star might be placed at the top of the tree to represent the Angel Gabriel or the Star of Bethlehem. In the same room was the "Christmas Pyramid", a construction of wood that had shelves to hold Christmas figurines. The Protestant Christian reformer, Martin Luther, is said to have first added lighted candles symbolic of Christ as light of the world. By the 16th century, the Christmas



pyramid and paradise tree had merged, becoming the Christmas tree. After the Protestant Reformation, such trees were seen in the houses of upper-class Protestant families as a counterpart to the Catholic Christmas cribs. The custom became popular among the nobility and spread to royal courts as far as Russia. Under the Marxist-Leninist doctrine of state atheism in the Soviet Union, Christmas celebrations, along with other religious holidays including Easter, were prohibited. School children were encouraged to campaign against Christmas traditions, among them being the Christmas tree. In 1935, however,





Introduced into England in the early 19th century, the Christmas tree was popularised by German-born Prince Albert, husband of Queen Victoria. It's hard to imagine now, but at the beginning of the 19th century Christmas was hardly celebrated. However, by the end of the century it had become the biggest annual celebration and took on the form that we recognise today. Gift giving had traditionally been at New Year but moved as Christmas became more important to the Victorians.

In the Western Christian tradition, Christmas trees are erected on days such as the first day of Advent or even as late as Christmas Eve, depending on the country. Customs of the same faith hold that it is unlucky to remove Christmas decorations, such as the Christmas tree, before Twelfth Night and, if they are not taken down on that day, it is appropriate to do so at Candlemas. In Norway, many families decorate their trees on 23rd December, "Little Christmas Eve". The Victorians transformed the idea of Christmas so that it became centred around the family; they considered carols to be a delightful form of musical entertainment. A Norwegian ritual known as "circling the Christmas tree" encourages everyone to join hands to form a ring around the tree and then walk round it whilst singing carols.

In the 1930s, artificial trees made of brush bristles were developed in the United States and the 1950s and '60s saw the mass production of aluminium and PVC plastic trees. Artificial trees gained significant popularity, particularly in countries where fresh trees were hard to grow.





Renters Reform Act

All private tenants and landlords need to be aware of their rights and responsibilities under the Act. It has now received Royal Assent and will be rolled out over coming months and years. It is hoped that this long-awaited legislation will help level the private renting playing field, so people can have security in their homes and the confidence to challenge landlords without fear of retaliation.

Key elements include:

- Abolish section 21 evictions and move to a simpler tenancy structure
 where all assured tenancies are periodic, providing more security for tenants and empowering them to challenge poor practice and unfair rent increases without fear of eviction.
- Ensure possession grounds are fair to both parties, giving tenants more security, while ensuring landlords can recover their property when reasonable.
- Provide stronger protections against backdoor eviction by ensuring tenants are able to appeal excessive above-market rents which are purely designed to force them out. As now, landlords will still be able to increase rents to market price for their properties and an independent tribunal will make a judgement on this, if needed.
- Introduce a new Private Rented Sector Landlord Ombudsman that will
 provide quick, fair, impartial and binding resolution for tenants' complaints
 about their landlord.
- Create a Private Rented Sector Database to help landlords understand their legal obligations and demonstrate compliance (giving good landlords confidence in their position), alongside providing better information to tenants to make informed decisions when entering into a tenancy agreement.
- Give tenants strengthened rights to request a pet in the property, which the landlord must consider and cannot unreasonably refuse.
- Apply the Decent Homes Standard to the private rented sector to give renters safer, better value homes and remove the blight of poor-quality homes in local communities.
- Apply 'Awaab's Law' to the sector, setting clear legal expectations about the timeframes within which landlords in the private rented sector must take action to make homes safe where they contain serious hazards.
- Make it illegal for landlords and agents to discriminate against prospective tenants in receipt of benefits or with children helping to ensure everyone is treated fairly when looking for a place to live.

• End the practice of rental bidding by prohibiting landlords and agents from asking for or accepting offers above the advertised rent. Landlords and agents will be required to publish an asking rent for their property and it will be illegal to accept offers made above this rate.

We are expanding flexible plastic recycling to all properties, including flats, to the rest of the District over a rolling five month programme by March 2026. This is one year earlier than the government deadline of March 2027. Stickers will be applied to refuse bins promoting the expansion. We can be really proud of this cooperation between residents, the Council and our contractor which makes us the best waste collection in the county and one of the best in the country. I know from my own experience the difference this makes to the amount



of waste going into the black bin. You can also now put this type of plastic into pink sacks.

A Parish review is being conducted on the Great Totham and Heybridge Parishes. This is due to the large number of homes being built at Westcombe Park, which are currently in the Totham parish, and perhaps should be in the Heybridge parish. Free car parking sessions are returning in the run-up to Christmas. This initiative aims to support local businesses and make it easier for residents and visitors to enjoy the town centre during the festive season. The first free session will be **from 4pm** on **Thursday 27th November** to support Maldon Town Council's annual 'Light Up Maldon' Christmas event which runs from **5pm – 9pm**. This includes a high street market, entertainment and the Christmas lights switch-on in the High Street at **6pm**. For the 'Light Up Maldon' event, free parking will be available in Butt Lane, White Horse Lane, Friary Fields, and Promenade Park Car Park. In addition, free parking will be provided in **Maldon's Town Centre car parks (not Promenade Park)**, from **2pm** on **Thursdays 4th**, **11th**, **18th** December, and **all day** on Christmas Eve.

We are upgrading the skatepark at Maldon Promenade Park. This exciting project is the final phase of the Council's Section 106 Youth Facilities Programme, which will see the current skatepark replaced with a larger modern

facility. Last year, a public survey was conducted to gather views from users on the skateparks in Promenade Park and Riverside Park. The feedback received was instrumental in shaping the new designs for these facilities and saw the first phase completed with the construction of new skateparks at West Maldon Community Centre, and Riverside Park in Burnham-on-Crouch. The works will be carried out by Bendcrete Skateparks Ltd, and are scheduled to begin in December, with an expected completion date of spring 2026.

The Council is reviewing all of the open spaces and play sites which it owns across the District, how we can invest in them and improve the facilities.

Maldon District Council is delighted to announce that it received a 'Highly Commended' award at the Essex Housing Awards. These celebrate the best housing work across the county, from new builds and refurbishments to services that support residents. Maldon District Council was recognised in the 'Meeting Housing Need - Homelessness' category, which highlights projects that make a real difference to people facing homelessness. The award follows the successful refurbishment and occupation of emergency accommodation facilities within the District. This vital project has already helped individuals and families facing homelessness by providing safe, secure, and adapted temporary housing whilst longer-term solutions are found. It also ensures that provision is allocated in the District which avoids placements out of the area. The project was funded through a mix of Section 106 contributions, Local Authority Housing Fund grants, and capital borrowing. It supports the Council's goals to improve access to housing, reduce isolation, and promote health and wellbeing, whilst also backing its climate action work. We are developing the other prospects in housing, which will enable similar projects.





Great Totham Parish Council Report for November



Continuing my ploy of reusing areas of my 'old' computer (because I am still rather nervous of my 'new' one), I discovered that I was overtyping the Parish Council Report for November 2021. It was interesting to see what has changed and what has remained the same! County Councillor Mark Durham reported that 'due to delays, attributed to Covid', some of the LHP budget remained unspent and additional schemes could be considered. This year, he again mentioned the availability of modest funding for small local projects but, currently, County Council news is dominated by preparations for the proposed local government reorganisation and the devolution agenda. A mayor will be elected for Greater Essex in May 2026 and will preside over an interim combined authority, comprised of Essex County Council, Southend and Thurrock authorities, until 2028 when the new unitary councils will take over and the current district, city and borough councils will be abolished. Neither Parish nor Town councils were included in the Government's devolution paper, but I suspect we will be impacted. Watch this space!

Sadly, criminal damage to the Jubilee Recreation facilities was causing concern in 2021, necessitating, over the years, items of equipment to be refurbished and moved to Bull Green where children can once again enjoy them safely. New pieces have been added and the older, tired pieces still in 'The Pit' have been monitored and kept going by members of the Council. Ultimately it would, of course, be more pleasing to return The Pit to its original purpose. Meanwhile, the three playing fields are regularly inspected by independent agencies and their recommendations followed up.

It might be appropriate to mention at this point that the Jubilee Recreation Ground also suffers from that most frequently reported of all anti-social behaviour, dog fouling. Perhaps it is because the area is not overlooked and people think they can 'get away with it', perhaps it is just laziness on behalf of some dog owners or walkers, or perhaps it seems that such a natural function can't be harmful but, of course, canine faeces contain parasites which can cause illness in people and other animals, making places where children play most unsuitable locations for them. Admittedly, clearing up after an animal is not the most pleasurable of activities. Nor, indeed, is nappy changing, but parents accept responsibility for it because a baby can't, and those with whom the child shares space need to be respected! Local byelaws also require dogs to be kept on leads in children's playgrounds and any fouling to be cleared up so that 'the law-abiding majority can use and enjoy public amenities'; it is not much to ask.

Neither, of course, is keeping to the speed limit when travelling through the village, but results from the Protection Officers indicate that, with only slight monthly variations, there is little change in the habits of motorists using the B1022. Although the focus of the Officers' attentions can be varied, currently they have been asked to concentrate their surveillance on the Jubilee Recreation Ground. Questions have been raised as to the viability and benefits of the service and this will be discussed more fully in the New Year, together with proposals for future projects and their funding.

Despite the frustrations of some of the Parish matters, the November meeting was very lively and productive. Earlier in the month, many of the Councillors attended the Remembrance Service at St Peter's Church and it is pleasing to see the clearance made to the overgrown areas around the memorial bus shelter at Totham South, prior to replanting. We are as ever grateful to those residents who freely contribute their time and efforts for the benefit of all, undertaking such activities as litter picking and generally caring for our village. If you would like to offer your services or, indeed, if you know of some 'unsung hero' please let us know.


