What has been going on in our church communities?

As you know, the pastoral reorganisation of the former parish of Launceston was completed in May, creating three new parishes in the town, and each one attached to a rural benefice. For us, there was an outstanding question about the name of the enlarged benefice, and our acting Archdeacon took the name The Benefice of St Mary's and Upper Tamar Parishes to the diocese' Mission and Pastoral Committee last month.

In practical terms, the changes bring us together with St Mary Magdalene, and in the coming months and years we will get to know each other's church communities better and work together. Our rural churches have a long history of collaboration and shared working, and St Mary's will bring new things into the mix.

Our fifth Sunday service will be a united benefice service, our first for the enlarged benefice, at St Mary's at 1030 on Sunday 30th November. You may want to make arrangements to share transport, for those who don't drive, and to cut down on parking costs (the multi storey car park by the Town Hall is I think free on Sundays).



This was included in last month's newsletter but is worth repeating.

Bridget Pentreath at Lezant and Rose Stammer at St Thomas, both members of the deanery implementation team, are looking to capture all the children and young people activity across the deanery, to see how best

we can support and encourage that work, and how we can replicate the things that work (such as Virginstowe's Messy Church). Deanery Synod in October focussed on work with children and young people, and how each church can do "just one

thing" to engage children and young people. People involved in Messy Church, Kids Café, Sunday School and Open the Book (including Sonia Pearce who runs Virginstowe's Messy Church) talked about the work they do, and their enthusiasm and generosity in sharing experiences and ideas was infectious.



A history of bells- Part 2

During the eighteenth century the standard of behaviour got even worse with ringers smoking, cursing and having beer on tap in the tower! Many churches I have visited have a plaque on the wall "Ringers who are drunk, curse or swear will by the grace of God, pay sixpence to the Rector"

At one point the Rector at Mortenhoe in North Devon was locked out of the tower as he tried to bring the ringers under control. A vicar in Leicestershire went to court to establish his authority over the ringers, and he had them imprisoned.

In 1813 a Mr Nashe wrote, recorded on a church wall, "I hereby give fifty pounds to the above ringers to ring a muffled and doleful peal on his wedding anniversary and on my death a joyful peal to commemorate my happy release from domestic tyranny and wretchedness!

In the nineteenth century a police force was established and things improved. Ringers were employed by local squires and landowners, and they were all but ordered to attend one service a Sunday, or put their livelihoods and home at risk. Any fit and able man would learn to ring the bells.

Towers were originally built for defensive and warning purposes, most frequently probably reporting fires. Like churches, towers are all different in size, shape and construction. Mr RH Dove of Leeds (with whom I had the pleasure of ringing, on one of his tours of the

south west) writes that Cornwall has around 150 church bell towers, Devon around 370 and Somerset slightly fewer. Across the UK there are around 5,500 bell towers, but not all of them will have a ring able peal.
