

FROM THE VICAR

THE SILLY SEASON



Among vicars, curates, and many others, the lead up to Christmas is known as "The Silly Season".

Originally Silly Season was during the Summer Holidays: there wasn't much political news, so the papers used frivolous or "silly" stories to fill the space. Now, Silly Season usually refers to Advent; the weeks leading up to Christmas Day.

This season is silly, because just when we are supposed to be quiet and reflective, there is so much festive cheer and business all around.

It's silly, because people do things during this time, which they don't do any other time. Think of hanging out stockings, putting letters up chimneys, day trips to Lapland, eating turkey, or pulling crackers.

It's silly, because while half of us are singing carols, drinking mulled wine and eating mince pies; others are dying because of the cold, sitting in loneliness, and suffering the mid-winter blues.

But mostly it's silly, because God, the creator and king of all, decided to be born into our human poverty.

This is the upside down, inside out nature of our faith: the "King of all creation" has no room, the "Lord of all" is placed into the hands of humans as a needy baby, and later, the "Giver of Life" will be killed.

This month, if you think it's all getting a bit silly, then you're right, and God is at the heart of it. God is in a stable, not in a palace. God is in the midst of everything in our lives: silly and serious, sacred and mundane, warm and cold, alone and with others, planned and spontaneous.

Some people laugh at my faith and think it's silly. I can laugh with them, because in many ways, in many profound ways, it is silly. And I like it that way.

Guthlac's Gang has had a full and lively term. We may be small in numbers, but we are big in every other way. The children bring energy, sharp questions, and a lot of joy to each session.

We link with the main service each week and follow the same readings. This keeps us tied to the wider church and helps the children talk about what they've learned at home.



We looked at Bible stories that show courage and kindness. We made simple crafts that match each theme, from shields to help us stand strong to lanterns that point to hope. The group has become more confident and happy to share their thoughts.

GOLCAR GUIDES

The Guide Leaders, over the summer holidays, collated lots of information and photos to put into our 100 Years of Golcar Guides exhibition at the Colne Valley Museum.

We had a trip to Wysholme to learn about the Guiding history: we learnt how to use semaphore and how to tie a friendship knot on the old-style neckties, and we had a look at all the different styles of historic uniforms on display.

We started the Skills For My Future theme and, to date, the Guides have completed several UMAs (define the abbreviation in brackets afterwards) and Skill Builders.

We also started the Eco Award this term by looking at our carbon footprint and building bug boxes, which have been taken home to put out in the Guides' gardens.

Our two Young Leaders, Charlotte and Jess, ran a session for the Music badge, where we used random objects to make sounds, wrote lyrics, and also designed some album covers. The last section, which the Guides did at home, involved listening to different genres or artists that they hadn't listened to before and describing how it made them feel. Three of our Guides have now gained their Music badges.

Sophie, one of our Patrol leaders, ran a session for the Food Critic badge. We tried different flavoured foods while blindfolded: sweet, salty, sour, bitter, and umami (savoury).

We also used different heat sources to prepare a potato in three ways: frying, mashing, and as a jacket potato. The last section, again for the Guides to do at home, is to prepare a meal from a different cuisine and critique it using what they've learnt about flavour profiles, tastes, and techniques.

We had Graham Smith from the Knot Tyers Guild visit during another meeting, who showed us how ropes are made using different strands of smaller rope. All of the Guides went home with a rope that they had made by combining 3 strands using the rope-making machine.

For the rest of the term, during the run-up to Christmas, we will be making Christmasthemed food and doing some Christmas crafts"

VISIT FROM BISHOP JOHN OF TANZANIA

News from Diocese of Leeds

The Diocese of Leeds recently welcomed the Rt Revd John Msuma, Bishop of Tarime in Tanzania, for a visit that strengthened the long standing link between the two regions. His time in the diocese offered space for shared learning, stories, and deeper friendship.

Bishop John visited churches and schools across Wakefield and Huddersfield. He spent time with pupils, joined parish teams, and took part in worship and community work. Key moments included visits to St Aidan's CE Academy in Skelmanthorpe, All Saints Batley, St Mary Magdalene Lundwood, St Peter's Barnsley, and a reflective stop at Wakefield Cathedral.

Archdeacon Cat Thatcher spoke warmly about the chance to hear about life in Tarime and to notice both the contrasts and the shared hopes in church life.

The link will continue to grow as a group from the Diocese of Leeds plans to visit Tanzania in summer 2026.


