

We are also hoping to have another Winter Warmer in the New Year with homemade soup, a roll and homemade puddings.

The Spilsby Union Workhouse Project

You may have noticed that the interpretation board has installed. We are so grateful to have received funding from East Lindsey Community Fund, Shared Prosperity Fund, Spilsby Rotary Club Hundleby Parish Council. Many people also donated money to the fund and we wish to thank them all. We are planning a proper 'unveiling' soon.

A grassed area to the north of the church was left uncut over summer. It is likely that people from the workhouse were buried here, in unmarked graves. Insects and small mammals will have benefited from the longer grass. The cuttings were removed in September, reducing the fertility of the soil so hopefully next year, we will see more wildflowers.
