Lest We ForgetBy Kenneth Prideaux-Brune

The number of people who lost their lives in two world wars and all the conflicts since is just too large to contemplate, so on Remembrance Sunday I prefer to think instead of a few specific people. This year I will be thinking of three people whose graves I have visited on many occasions.

Nurse Nellie Spindler



Nellie Spindler was born in Wakefield, Yorkshire in 1891. She trained as a nurse in Leeds and joined Queen Alexandra's Military Nursing Service in 1915 and by 1917 she was working at the large field hospital near Poperinge. On August 21 she completed her night duty and went to her tent to rest when a German shell fell on the tent. Some of her colleagues rushed immediately to the tent to find a scene of total devastation. Nellie lay among the shattered fragments of her possessions. She died 20 minutes later, having never regained consciousness. She is buried in the large military cemetery of Lijssenthoek, the only woman buried in a military cemetery in Flanders (though others are buried in France) and hers is the most visited grave of the more than 10,000 in this cemetery. More than 30 countries are represented here, including a section of Chinese graves. It was indeed a world

Captain Noel Chavasse.

Noel Chavasse was the only man to win the VC twice during World War One

(around half a dozen others have won

the VC twice but in other conflicts). A gifted athlete both he and his twin brother Christopher represented Britain in the 400 metres



at the 1908 Olympic Games. He trained as a doctor and joined the Royal Army Medical Corps in 1913. He was posted to the Liverpool Scottish regiment as their medical officer. He won his first VC in 1916 during the Battle of the Somme, treating wounded men in no man's land under German fire. At one point he was within 25 yards of the German trench. His father, who was the Bishop of Liverpool, said to him: "Up to now you have been the son of the Bishop of Liverpool; now I will be known as the father of Noel Chavasse VC". His second VC was won in similar fashion in August 1917, in the early days of the Battle of Passchendaele. Though wounded himself he continued to treat others in no man's land until eventually the stretcher bearers insisted on taking him away. He died on night to recover the body. When the way to the field hospital and his much-visited grave is in Brandhoek cemetery.

Gilbert Talbot



Gilbert Talbot was educated at Winchester and Christ Church, Oxford.

While at university he was successively secretary, treasurer and president of the Oxford Union. At the outbreak of war, he joined the Rifle Brigade. Commissioned as an officer he had his first stint in the front-line trenches at Hooge in July 1915. When his platoon was relieved, they started to march back for rest and recreation, dreaming no doubt of a hot bath and a proper night's sleep. After about an hour they stopped to brew up a cup of tea and while they were sitting by the roadside a message arrived telling them the trench they had occupied had been overrun and they were to return and try to recapture it. Giving up those dreams, they marched back the way they had come. And then they received the order to launch an attack across open ground in the face of German machine gun fire. They must have known such an attack was suicidal but they obeyed the order, nonetheless. Gilbert was among those killed. That night his older brother, Neville Talbot, a senior chaplain, accompanied by the platoon sergeant, 'Appy Nash, crept into no man's land to try to identify the body. By the time they had done so the first glimmers of dawn were appearing and they had to return the following Neville and Tubby Clayton launched Talbot House they named it in memory of Gilbert, who stood for all the young subalterns killed within weeks, or in some cases days, of reaching the front. His story seems to underline both the courage of the soldiers and the futility of so many of the deaths.

Just three very different individuals but thinking of them rather than the hundreds of thousands whose lives have been cut short by war seems to me to bring a sharp reality to the remembrance.
