

Tea-Time Service

We also have a service at 4.00pm on the third Sunday. Everyone is welcome. The service is very relaxed with songs, activities, readings and prayers.

It is for everyone: families of all kinds, children, adults, young and old. Why not come along? Drinks and biscuits (and sometimes cake!) will be available before the service.

Epiphany!

You probably know from tales of Greek mythology that gods and goddesses would often appear out of nowhere in ancient Greece to beguile or trick mortals. The word for this in everyday Greek was 'epiphany': — the appearance or manifestation of a divine being on earth to humans. For Christians Epiphany is the season after the 12 days of Christmas.



Our Epiphany Bible readings tell of the 'manifestation' or 'appearance' of Jesus to a wider audience than those in Bethlehem and surrounding area. We mark this, on 6 January, by placing the Wise Men in the crib scene; they have now arrived to see the consummation of their hopes and travels in the infant Jesus. And our Epiphany readings usually continue through the season with Jesus' baptism; John the Baptist's witness to Christ; Jesus' family trying to take charge of Him because of His popularity with the crowds; and the Presentation in the Temple. In all these instances something of divine glory is being made manifest, and shown to us.

In more common parlance today, an epiphany means a

sudden or blinding realisation ('I had a sudden epiphany that John was going to marry Celia'). This modern meaning is helpful; 'Gosh, epiphanies can be part of our Christian experience today!' Remember that occasion when we were so conscious of God's love holding us? Or the time we knew the words we used to that stranger were infused with a grace we didn't know we had? These and similar experiences, which we've probably all had, can be seen as our own epiphanies – times when God appeared to us (and possibly through us) in a distinct way.

Have you ever thought of those sorts of experiences as an epiphany? Not ring-fenced to a particular time of year, but part of our everyday experience, as we seek to live out our baptism promises, and follow Jesus through the ups and downs, the humdrum and the extraordinary, the joys and sorrows of the everyday.

The promise and reality of Christmas is 'Emmanuel-God with us'. And the reality of Epiphany is that God IS with us, in the everyday realisation of how great God is, how much God loves us, and how God pours upon us grace after grace after grace.

May we have many epiphanies in 2026, and may they all bring us closer to the God who has chosen in His love to reveal Himself to us.

Why Gold, Frankincense, Myrrh?

The story of the coming of the Magi grew in the telling. By the 6th century they had acquired names: Gaspar, Melchior, and Balthasar. By medieval times they were called kings. Whoever they were, we do

know from Matthew that they brought three gifts to Jesus.

What about their gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh? One Victorian scholar offered a possible explanation as to the gifts significance. He was the Rev John Henry Hopkins, an American Episcopalian minister, who in 1857, wrote his much-loved Christmas carol: 'We Three Kings of Orient Are'.

He said Gold was a gift that would have been given to a king. Frankincense had traditionally been brought by priests as they worshipped God in the Temple. Myrrh was a spice that the ancients used in preparing bodies for burial.

If that is true, then you could say that the Wise Men, in choosing their gifts for this infant, honoured Jesus with gold because he was King of the Jews, with frankincense because he was to be worshipped as divine; and with myrrh, because he would also become a sacrifice and die for his people.

The Wise Men were the very first gentiles ever to worship Jesus. What faith they had! They travelled for months over difficult terrain. They never saw any evidence of Jesus' kingship, his divinity or his sacrificial death.

They worshipped him through faith in God's promises about him. Isaiah foresaw this response to Jesus: 'Nations will come to your light, and kings to the brightness of your dawn.' The Magi's eyes of faith saw clearly and far into the future.

Compare that with the High Priest and religious leaders whom the Wise Men saw in Jerusalem when they first arrived. These head priests knew all the prophecies of their own coming Messiah, but NOT ONE Jewish religious leader went to look for him in Bethlehem. And it is only six miles down the road!



This month I am introducing you to Robin, an 11 year-old boy from Bangladesh. He and his parents converted to Christianity from Islam, after Robin's Mum, Moly, borrowed a Bible from a neighbour. She found Matthew 7v7: "Ask and it will be given to you." She was amazed that a God would listen to her prayers. After a while they became part of small house church.

This enraged some local extremists. One day, a mob stormed their Church. Robin remembers,

"They started setting things on fire. They came to kill us."

The family escaped, but Robin's Dad decided to "reconvert" to Islam. He told Robin's Mum to renounce Christianity or face divorce. Moly and Robin were determined to keep following Jesus, so he divorced her, leaving her and Robin in poverty. The little family now struggles to afford food and school fees.

Even at school, Robin is bullied for his faith. Other children taunt him and won't play with him. "I feel sad when they treat me like this," says Robin. Every aspect of his life is affected by persecution. That's why I am asking you to pray for them.

Robin's has lost family, community and safety. His future is threatened. Yet his faith is an example to all of us. In the face of bullying, rejection and violence, he is holding on to Jesus.

Christmas is a particularly special day, when Robin gets to spend time with other children from vulnerable Christian families in Bangladesh. It's a rare opportunity to be with other believers. Robin says, "On that day, I wear new clothes and we go to church. We cut a cake for Jesus's birthday, and we eat cake and have a lot of fun. If there were more people, it would be even more joyful.

Please pray for Robin and Moly and their group of believers. The charity "Open Doors" helps them get the financial and spiritual support they need, providing food aid, support to cover school fees and encouragement to persevere for the long term.

Why not look them up? The full name is Open Doors with Brother Andrew".

What, oh what, is that person's name?


Do your New Year Resolutions include the forlorn hope that you will be better at remembering people's names in 2026?



Science and Miracles

We live in a world where we expect the sun to rise tomorrow and the milk to pour out of the bottle. But for God, these properties of matter and the natural world are simply the usual ways He works. If He chooses to do something unexpected to demonstrate something about His character, His relationship with us, and His purposes, then He will.

In 1984 14 UK-based science Professors wrote: "We gladly accept the Virgin Birth, the gospel miracles, the Resurrection of Christ as historical events. We represent many other scientists who are also Christians standing in the historical tradition of the churches." For the non-believer, I would suggest a thought experiment: if God exists, why should He be bound by the same laws of physics as us?

Breaking his own rules

Professor Christine Done, an Astrophysicist, writes: "Even when I was an atheist I got cross at discussions...on how all Jesus's miracles could be physically explained. To me, once you have believed in a God, a supernatural being, then it's obvious that supernatural stuff could happen: any God who can make the physical universe and its laws can presumably suspend those laws in any time and way He chooses."

Timing?

Some miracles appear to be just wonderful timing. The wind blew all night and the Israelites crossed the Red Sea on dry land, for example. The biblical writers don't seem interested in distinguishing between wonders that seem to break the usual rules of how things happen and those that don't.

Many in Jesus' audiences were not won over by His wonders. Most of the people who ate the food He produced out of nowhere were quite happy to turn on Him when the religious authorities decided He was dangerous. We can only make sense of something unexpected, such as an answer to prayer for healing, in the context of a growing relationship with God.

Our task as Christians

The exciting task for a Christian is to explain what this interaction looks like, and to demonstrate what 'your kingdom come' looks like in our communities.

God works through us in words, works and wonders.

Crufts now welcomes mongrels

The Royal Kennel Club, which runs Crufts, is going to admit mongrels for the first time in its 150-year history.

Crufts will become a 'year-round community', available to all dog owners, whatever kind of dog they have. Its new online platform will launch in February 2026.

Jannine Edgar, chief executive of the RKC explains: "While our initiatives in areas such as health, research and breeding have historically been focused on pedigree dogs, we now recognise that dog ownership has evolved and therefore we must too. So now our remit extends to all dogs, and we will be investing our efforts to do more for every dog and their owners through the Crufts brand, which will be much more than an annual show.

This year Crufts Dog Show takes place 5th to 8th March at the NEC in Birmingham. Crufts has also held events aimed at non-pedigree dogs since 2000, after launching the crossbreed competition 'Scruffts'.

The late Queen, who was devoted to her corgis, was patron of The Kennel Club for 70 years. Following her death, the King granted the organisation a royal prefix in 2023.


The Samaritan Room has space for up to 15 people. It costs £15 an hour.



The 7 Deadly Sins is a list compiled by Pope Gregory 1 in AD 590 to describe the nature of sin and different ways it shows itself. So each month we shall consider one of these sins.

The Seven Deadly Sins: Pride

We start by considering pride which is 'the beginning of all sin' according to Augustine.

Pride is preoccupied with self and denies the need for others or God. We see it present in the first sin, when Adam and Eve wanted to become like God (Genesis 3:5).

What does pride look like? Jesus told the story of two men, a Pharisee and a tax collector, who went to pray in the Temple (Luke 18: 9-14). The Pharisee stood by himself and prayed: 'God, I thank you that I am not like other people, robbers, evildoers, adulterers, or even like this tax collector. I fast twice a week and give a tenth of all I get.' (11,12). He illustrates how pride is essentially putting ourselves in God's place and believing we can run our own lives. It is subtle and self-deceptive and eats away our lives: 'Pride goes before destruction, a haughty spirit before a fall.' (Proverbs 16:18).

So how do we deal with pride? The answer is humility. The tax collector stood at a distance 'he would not even look up to heaven, but beat his

breast and said, 'God, have mercy on me, a sinner." (13). This man was right with God, because he acknowledged his sin and his need for forgiveness.

Humility is being realistic about ourselves, and acknowledging our total

dependence on God. We develop it by giving ourselves wholeheartedly to God and repenting of our desire to do things our way: 'Humble yourselves, therefore, under God's mighty hand, that he may lift you up.' (1 Peter 5:6).

'Humility is not in thinking less of yourself, but in thinking of yourself less' (Rick Warren).
