

TUNNELS

Back in the 'days of yore', I had a couple of 'run ins' with tunnels I will never forget. When I say 'tunnels', I do not mean the little ones that we tend to have in the UK.... or even the Channel Tunnel, where I once interviewed for a job, long before they even started building it. I mean the long tunnels that you get in mountainous regions in Europe, which are normally built on a curve, so that when you enter them you cannot, at first, see the other end... let alone guess at what might be on the other side!

I encountered the first of these memorable tunnels, at the age of eighteen, whilst cycling over the Grimsel Pass between Obergoms and Meringen in the Swiss Alps. All day long we climbed, for mile after mile, up through the hay meadows, and then on, further up the switch-backs, which led into the glaciers near the sky. By the evening, we were on top, exhausted, but thrilled at the idea of rolling downhill for over 30 miles. Faster and faster I tore downwards, into the gathering gloom of the valley, until round a sharp bend, I was met by the sight of a tunnel entrance, and the lights went out. With the wind continuing to blow in my face, I could see nothing at all... not even the edge of the road. Blindly, I hung on, trying to 'sense' the rightward bend. Then, there in the distance, a window of light appeared. I shot out of the tunnel... and stopped. Seconds later I looked at my friend in silence. Our wheel rims began to cool. Silently, we agreed - in future the bike lights would go 'on' before setting off downhill.

In the summer of 1999, I visited Italy. I was there, on my own, in order to travel the 'Blue Walk', or 'Sentiero Azzura', a route which runs along the shoulder of the mountainous coastline near Pisa. The walk should not have been a drama – simply 15 km of beautiful coastal scenery - except it was hot... and I had not packed enough water. A couple of kilometres north of Corniglia, I turned right, off the path, down the 1000ft slope which led to what looked like a hostelry on the beach. The hillside was covered in brambles and gorse, so the going was tough. When I arrived at the establishment and ordered a drink, something seemed wrong. No one had any clothes on! Inadvertently, I had strayed into a nudist colony. Focusing on his face, I asked the barman how to 'get away'. He pointed to a tunnel entrance in the hillside, and spoke to me quickly in Italian. With no understanding at all, I nodded, and made my way towards the gaping hole that was the entrance. Pitch dark. No torch. Feeling my way along the wall. Not knowing if a pit lay open ahead of me. Several times trains thundered by, barely ten feet away. What seemed like an hour later, a sliver of light appeared at the other end of the tunnel... but it was

not what I expected. The light I had seen was 'seeping' in to the tunnel through the cracks surrounding a crude iron door, which was fitted with a magnetic lock. My path was blocked. It is surprising how strong you can be, if you are determined not to retrace your steps! Blinking in the sunshine, I never looked back.

I always think that the season of Advent is like a tunnel. We step over the threshold and travel, in our various ways, towards 'the light' at the other end. Some years, we can see it all the way. Other times, it explodes upon us suddenly, as we come around the final bend. Some years, it can be so hard just to get to the manger's side.

To every traveller this Advent, to everyone of us, Jesus says, "I am the light of the world. If you follow me, you won't have to walk in darkness, because you will have the light that leads to life." (John Ch 8vs 12. New Living Translation.) In this very dark time of the year, and at this point in our Nation's history, when there is a good deal of uncertainty around, may that same Lord Jesus be with us all, by his Spirit, present to scatter the darkness from beneath our feet, as we move steadily through the tunnel of Advent, and on to the pooled light of Christmas.... and the starlit clarity of Epiphany. Travel safely as you go...

GOSFORTH PARISH CHURCH MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE

The last meeting of the Management Committee was held on Thursday 6th November. All members of the committee were in attendance.

The Treasurer reported the projected annual income as at 30/9/25 was £28,198 which, taking into account inflation, means a 14% reduction in real terms in projected income. The extra amount we would need for our annual income to match the 2020 level in real terms is approximately £4,500.

The Committee formed a sub-group to prioritise and action maintenance work for the Church. There are several roofing issues and John Miller Roofing have been contacted regarding these. Concerning the Bier House, temporary steps are being taken to stabilise the building until a more permanent repair can be made for which funding will need to be sought.

Fundraising is still a major concern for the committee and we continue to look for new ways to achieve this. Day to day running costs, e.g. grass cutting, continue to increase and we will be looking for increased contributions towards these costs.

Steps are currently being taken to purchase and install a contactless card reader for donations. It is hoped to install this in the very near future.

The Committee are working on the Worship Review alongside introducing the new Audio-Visual equipment into our weekly services. It is hoped that we will have news on these matters in due course.


do come and join us. Donations will go to The Children's Society along with the money from the school Christingle Service.



UPDATE GOSFORTH PUBLIC HALL REFURBISHMENT PROJECT

Work is progressing to plan with no major issues reported. This has focused on stripping out, removing plaster to expose brick and stonework, and exposing structural elements to assess integrity and replacement or repair needs. We're delighted with feedback received that the builders, Roland Hill, have been very understanding of the inconvenience the work may cause and have been helpful in working with neighbours and Hall users to limit any inconvenience.

The major risk this month is the extent of replacement and repair needed to lintels and roof trusses. There is budget for 'unexpected discoveries' which are inevitable in a building of this age.

The Hall is still open for use as usual. While the Library, Supper Room and Kitchen are no longer available, a temporary sink has been installed near the toilets which provides drinking water and waste water disposal. The hall has kettles and crockery for those wanting to make light refreshments. We are delighted that most of our regular users are still able to undertake their usual activities in the hall. All U3A exercise classes, craft classes, dance classes, speaker classes and Chatty Lunch, indoor Bowling and Youth Theatre activities ae still taking place in the public hall as usual. The builders are happy to provide vehicle access for dropping off and collecting items at the rear doors. If you'd like to book the hall, please contact GPHbooking@gmail.com.
