Friday Prayers for Peace and Reconciliation Friday 5th December 2025

Bible Reading: Romans 15.4-13

Whatever was written in former days was written for our instruction, so that by steadfastness and by the encouragement of the scriptures we might have hope. May the God of steadfastness and encouragement grant you to live in harmony with one another, in accordance with Christ Jesus, so that together you may with one voice glorify the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ. Welcome one another, therefore, just as Christ has welcomed you, for the glory of God. For I tell you that Christ has become a servant of the circumcised on behalf of the truth of God in order that he might confirm the promises given to the patriarchs, and in order that the Gentiles might glorify God for his mercy. As it is written, "Therefore I will confess you among the Gentiles, and sing praises to your name"; and again he says, "Rejoice, O Gentiles, with his people"; and again, "Praise the Lord, all you Gentiles, and let all the peoples praise him"; and again Isaiah says, "The root of Jesse shall come, the one who rises to rule the Gentiles; in him the Gentiles shall hope." May the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace in believing, so that you may abound in hope by the power of the Holy Spirit.

Reflection

Preparations for Christmas seem to be in full flow around us, with Christmas lights decorating our streets and houses, Christmas markets, all sorts of festive food and goods in our shops, and even the sound of Christmas carols. Not that we would want to deny the pleasures of all that to people. Yet for Christians this all seems rather premature.

For us this season of Advent is rather one of quiet waiting and expectation for something far greater than what so many people are preparing for. For us this is a time to prepare both to celebrate the incarnation, the coming of God into the world as a vulnerable baby, and the coming again of our Lord Jesus Christ, however we understand that. Quite rightly we give gifts to one another. Yet, in Advent we are preparing to celebrate the greatest gift of all, the gift of God's Son for our redemption and reconciliation.

Of course Advent and especially Christmas are not for everyone a happy time. At this cold time of the year the plight of those suffering from war and conflict, from poverty, from illness, from loneliness, can become much more difficult and challenging. Seeing others able to enjoy themselves and indulge can be painful.

The season of Advent, far from cocooning us in a sense of comfort and cosiness, instead addresses the often harsh reality of the human condition and challenges us, yet in a positive way. The traditional Advent theme of judgement reminds us that God is a God of justice, that any form of injustice can never be condoned. There is a higher authority to whom those who oppress or exploit others will be called to account.

Above all the Advent message is one of hope. Our Bible reading is the New Testament reading for this coming Sunday, the Second Sunday of Advent. In it the word hope appears no fewer than four times. This hope is not some vague wishful thinking that all will be well in the end. It is hope that we are given by God, the God of hope, a promise that evil and suffering will be overcome. For in God we can fully trust. God's love, mercy and justice are absolute and one hundred percent reliable.

Looking at the state of our world it is easy to become disheartened. Advent assures us of God's love for all without distinction and for the whole of creation. We look forward in genuine anticipation to Christmas as a celebration of God's love in action, in coming amongst us and sharing both our sorrows and our joys. What better gift could we hope for.
