BENEFICE FUNDRAISING EVENTS

CHASTLETON HOUSE TEAS



Around midday on Saturday 11 October a merry band of intrepid Volunteers from our Benefice, armed with enough cake to feed a large Army descended upon the tiny Church adjacent to Chastleton House, a National Trust property near the Oxfordshire border.

The House itself is a typical NT pile, dustier than most and ever-so-interesting to mooch around, except that they have NO tea room! Let's face it - we mostly visit NT properties for

the tearoom. It's a prize, earned after reading all about those people who have gone before and left their stuff to the nation. It's all about the cake!

At Chastleton however, there's a great model which works to the benefit of all involved; in a nutshell (there were plenty around the Churchyard), here's how it works:

The little church rents itself (its pews, seats, tables, chairs, mugs, urns - all that useful stuff - alongside graveyard space aplenty) out for a modest amount and volunteers from willing local 'charitable' groups provide the tea and cake to the expectant House visitors and keep the balance of the earnings. It's a win-win!

So there we were! This had all come about from an idea birthed at an early Joint PCC meeting where Benefice representatives from the 5 parishes and 2 chapels came together to exchange ideas. When the inevitable 'fundraising' agenda item was raised, Marion from Lower Slaughter spoke of recently having been a part of this opportunity (as part of another group) to raise funds. What a great idea!! We jumped on it, got in touch with the co-ordinators of this and were offered a date in October 2025.

Of course it's so weather dependant, this 'having a cup of tea outside' malarkey, in England (not something even considered in Scotland) and in October? Well, we'd give it a whirl to see if it might be worth doing

again; nothing ventured and all that ... And, as everyone knows, if it's a good bit of home baking you're after, a Church is a safe bet!

Having agreed to do this as a Benefice group, splitting our winnings 7 ways equally, we got planning; making and rechecking lists, meeting together to share tasks and baking orders. Each parish enlisted bakers and helpers.

And our God is good! The October morning dawned dry and sunny, we convened at Chastleton, set up our travelling tearoom and had a wonderful afternoon. We had a steady stream of tea-seekers, all good natured and enthusiastic about the makeshift tearooms. Those who knew how it worked were interested in who we were, and what our fundraising goals were. (We shall make more of that next time). Everyone was delighted and delightful, without exception. One said it was the best NT Tearoom experience they'd ever had, and another that it was the perfect end to a perfect day! And lots of compliments on the baking too. Folks really appreciated it!

Our takings amounted to £911 - we had served around 180 people.



We all agreed that it had been well worth the shared effort, that we had thoroughly enjoyed getting to know our Benefice siblings and we really did have fun! We are truly grateful to those who provided the baking for the day.

We've applied for a few dates for the same next year

and we'll see whether these are accommodated. It would be great to put our joint Benefice earnings towards a shared goal.

This year once again we shall support the Prison Fellowship / Angel Tree project, which coordinates and facilitates the buying of gifts for children of prisoners on their behalf. Our Act of Remembrance was very well attended on 9 November, with wreath laying at both St Andrews Church and the village War Memorial by the former Baptist Chapel, with coffees there afterwards. It's poignant to recall those names of people who made the ultimate sacrifice in conflicts, and we are proud to have acting Service personnel to represent the forces within our Village community. We are also hugely privileged to have had young Harry Delicata play the Last Post for us, followed by the Reveille. Harry was a student at Temple Guiting School and is now in his second year at the Cotswold School.

And we are very excited to learn of the imminent arrival of our recently appointed new Priest-In-Charge, Rev'd Anne Curtis, to be licensed 'early in the New Year'. We continue to pray for her as she prepares for the move and the role and we look forward to welcoming Anne and her husband Tom and their family.

The village continues to support the North Cotswold Food Bank, whose needs don't diminish and we look forward to many Festive events over the next few weeks!

Our Remembrance Service this year was especially moving. Robert Cookson told the story of a local officer in the Royal Gloucestershire Hussars who was killed in action, along with his second-in-command. It was a powerful reminder of the real people behind the names on the memorials. My great-great-uncle, Lt Col Maurice Nicoll Kennard, who was killed on the first day of the Somme was also remembered. He was awarded the Military Cross and mentioned in dispatches three times. In The Bradford Pals, there's an account of him standing upright with only a walking stick, calling his men to follow as the bullets came in from both sides. He was killed moments later. He walked forward, and they followed. It's beyond comprehension.

We've also said goodbye to two much-loved members of our community.

Jean Bird, who lived in Upper Slaughter and later in Guiting Power, died recently. She was a Lay Reader and a highly valued part of our community and church life. Jean was thoughtful, faithful, and quietly determined. She was a wise presence and a loyal friend. Many will remember her calm strength, her love of Scripture, and the quiet way she encouraged those around her. She will be deeply missed.

Tom Rucker (5 July 1941–13 November 2025). Tom and his wife Betty moved to the UK from the US in 1970 and to Upper Slaughter in the early 1990s where they quickly became part of its fabric. He was a long-serving churchwarden, involved in all aspects of village life from the fête to the PCC and everything in between. Known for his white T-shirt, shirt, jeans and battered cap, Tom was a steady, thoughtful presence who was always ready for a chat and often had a new idea to share. He spent his final years at Edwardstow Court and will be fondly remembered and much missed.

On a lighter note, thank you to Kate and Paul Trenaman, Liz Gibson and Liz Wills, who helped with baking cakes and serving teas at Chastleton House in October. It was a lovely day and there's a fuller write-up elsewhere in the newsletter, but it was good to be part of a benefice-wide effort and raise much-needed funds for our churches.

We're thrilled that Revd Anne Curtis has been appointed as our new vicar. She'll be joining us early next year and we look forward to welcoming her and beginning a new chapter.

And just a reminder that our warm space coffee mornings at Lords of the Manor are continuing through the winter. We meet at 11am on the second Tuesday of each month. Everyone is very welcome.

As we move into Advent, we hold close the memory of those no longer with us and look ahead with hope for new beginnings.


