CHRISTMAS GIVING CATALOGUE RAISES £5K IN FIRST MONTH

BISHOP HUGH FAREWELL

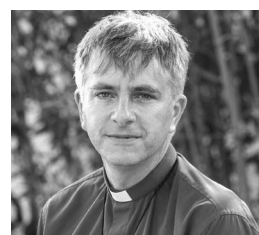

JOIN THE CAMPAIGN

The Diocese of Truro has joined with organisations around the world in shining a spotlight on domestic abuse through the United Nations' 16 Days of Activism Against Gender-Based Violence Campaign.

The campaign, which runs until December 10 (Human Rights Day), is an annual opportunity to raise awareness of the challenges faced by women and girls and calls for global solidarity to end violence against women and girls everywhere.

Violence against women is a major public health and human rights crisis, affecting almost one in three women in their lifetime. Yet, violence against women is preventable.

Truro Cathedral are again hosting the LOUD Fence during the 16 Days. Pop in and add your message to the fence.

The Truro branch of Mother's Union is encouraging churches to join in with the Red Chair Project. This asks churches to reserve one chair draped in red fabric with a sign highlighting facts about domestic violence. The empty chair serves as a powerful reminder that every 11 minutes globally a woman or girl dies at the hands of an intimate partner or family member.

Lora Prynn, Assistant Diocesan Safeguarding Officer for the diocese, said: "We are proud to be supporting 16 Days of Action this year alongside Truro Cathedral. There are some amazing training opportunities running throughout the 16 days; we would encourage people to take a look at the Safer Cornwall website to see what's available. There are also a number of resources which we would encourage parishes to display and circulate amongst their networks."

ADVENT ADVENTURES OFFERED

Churches have been provided with resources to help them welcome children into their buildings this Christmas.

The Advent Adventures resources have been put on Diocese of Truro's **website** to help people run workshops for schoolchildren in churches.

During the summer months, more than 1,000 children from schools across the diocese signed up to take part in Christian-themed Creation Care workshops in church yards during the summer months. Now the days are getting colder, children are being invited inside churches to learn how people prepare for Christmas.

The Advent package of resources, developed jointly by Tina Venton and Jane Wheeler from Carnmarth South Deanery and Clare Green, Diocese of Truro's Schools' Creation Care Officer, fit in perfectly with the required primary school curriculum and cover a number of objectives detailed in the Cornwall RE Syllabus followed by all Cornish Primary schools.

Titled Advent Adventures, the workshop is for those in Years 1 and 2 and can also be adapted for early years or lower juniors.

The workshop explores the Christmas story, discusses advent as a time



of preparation and invites children to take part in practical activities involving craft, drama and storytelling.

Clare Green said: "These workshops tell the Christmas story and how people prepare for it with Advent.

"They are a simple and practical way for churches to link with their local schools and for children to enjoy a church visit with a purpose."

2026 BUDGET ACCEPTED BY DIOCESAN SYNOD

At a meeting of Diocesan Synod, members voted (47 to 9 with one abstention) to accept the 2026 budget. It had been formally approved at a meeting of the Bishop's Diocesan Council in early November.

The Truro Diocesan Board of Finance (TDBF) anticipated a planned deficit of £4.476 million for 2026, driven by support for local plans, use of reserves, and a focus on communities facing deprivation. Changes in income recognition following auditor findings have also contributed to the deficit, as income is now recognised when received rather than when spent.

The budget is deemed affordable, based on an increase in the Ministry and Mission Fund (MMF) contributions. The budget also aligns with the deanery plans which emphasises mission and ministry.

Sophie Eddy, Director of Finance and Assets, said: "The budget deficit is planned and affordable. This deficit arises from the continuing conscious decision to support local deanery plans, from the decisions to use reserves to support parishes rather than further grow the Balance Sheet and from a rebalancing of the shared resources towards communities that are experiencing deprivation."

Speaking after synod, Revd Canon Simon Cade, Diocesan Secretary, said: "The budget reflects a commitment to supporting local communities, enhancing ministry, and addressing environmental responsibilities while managing financial risks effectively."

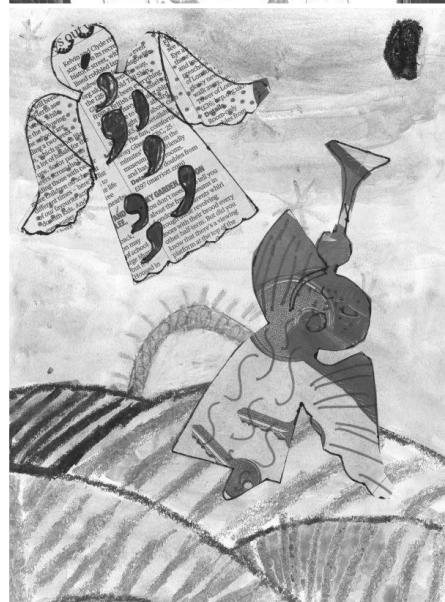
More than 500 designs were sent in by children aged four years to 11 years old from 14 schools across the diocese.

"Our schools never fail to respond to exciting opportunities like this. I want to thank each school or family that sent in entries – it was an absolute joy to look at them. Having them displayed for all to see at our offices in Truro created a real buzz of excitement."





YEW TREES 'A LIVING LINK' FROM CHRIST

A special ceremony took place in St Columb Major when cuttings from a Millennium Yew tree were planted in the church yard – creating a 'living link' from Christ to future generations.

The young trees were sourced and donated by Jacqueline Dow who had cuttings from the Millennium Yew in St Mawgan-in-Meneage.

During the event, Bishop Hugh read Isaiah 55:12-13. He then helped shovel the final soil to the bases of the saplings which were blessed before a final prayer.

He said: "Planting a tree is always an act of hope. To plant a yew tree – which will grow for centuries, long beyond our own lifetimes – is a particularly profound expression of that hope.

"I pray they will stand as an enduring

witness to faith and hope long into the future."

Those attending also included the Mayor, Deputy Mayor, councillors, members of the Parochial Church Council (PCC) and Jacqueline Dow.

Councillor Scot Taylor, Mayor, said: "The town council was honoured and delighted to welcome Bishop Hugh to the parish. We are particularly grateful that he blessed the yew trees, which are a living link from the time of Christ to future generations."
