



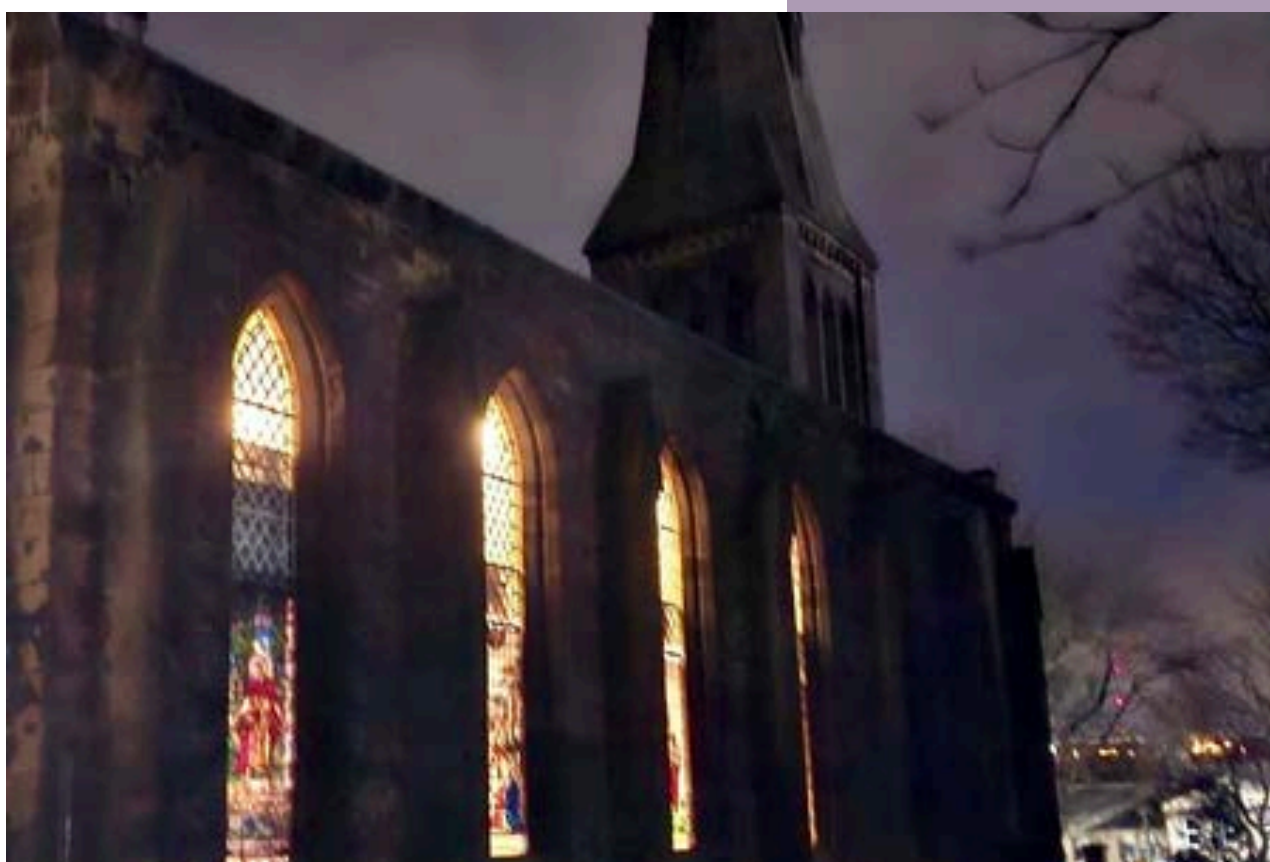

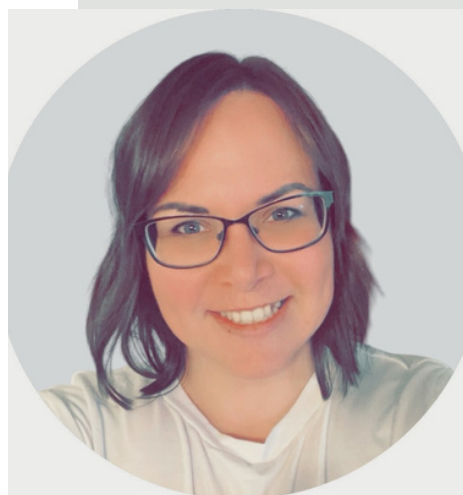

FROM THE VICAR

Fr Simon Crook - Vicar, St John's Church Golcar

THE COMPOST BIN

In the garden I enjoy mowing the lawn, cutting back branches, and making compost. Sam does most of the weeding and planting.

I make compost partly to use it, but more as an environmental task. The kitchen waste and garden cuttings that are composted are kept out of landfill, and so create less carbon dioxide and methane.

The compost heap is a living entity. It needs feeding and occasional turning. It changes from season to season and year to year. It always gives me joy when I go to put something in, and lifting up the lid, see a swarming mass of red worms. The slugs are less joyful, but they do an essential job too.

It is astonishing how much material goes into the compost. It's like a magic trick: you keep adding things in, and it keeps making more space—until that moment when you have to admit it's full.

My system then is to empty out the older batch of compost, which is in a second bin and just about ready to use. I turn the contents of the full bin into the second one, leaving the first bin nearly empty and ready to start again. I always leave a bit of the old compost and some worms behind to get the next load going. This is sometimes called a starter culture.

My compost bins have made me think of Lent, which seems to begin all too soon after Christmas. Each year it starts on Ash Wednesday, the day after Pancake Day. Ash Wednesday this year is the 18th of February.



Lent is a good time to consider our lives. I wonder if it might help to think of our lives as compost bins:

•After months of cramming everything in, is it time to take stock? Where is your life too full, and where do you want to create space?

•Do you need turning over? Compost benefits from being stirred up. Are there parts of your life that need bringing into focus?

•Can you see the end goal? Compost is created in the dark but is used by plants in the light. Can you appreciate the joy of life and set your sights on the hope of the resurrection?

•Can you offer yourself to the church? We want to grow in many ways, and your gifts might help us. Every gift is precious – lowly compost can help to produce the most beautiful rose.

We can reflect on these things personally, but there is a communal element as well, which we might think of as the worms, bacteria, gardeners, starter cultures—and even slugs. These things can represent coming to church, prayer, reading (of all sorts), and Lent groups. Maybe the slugs represent the people we find less easy, but are still essential for our communal life and growth!

Lent ends with Good Friday, Jesus is buried in the earth. The parallel in the garden is the scraps are thrown in the compost bin and the lid is closed.

But after that comes Easter, the resurrection, the tomb is opened. In the garden the lid of the compost bin is flung back, and if the conditions are right, the compost will be mature, enabling new life to grow.

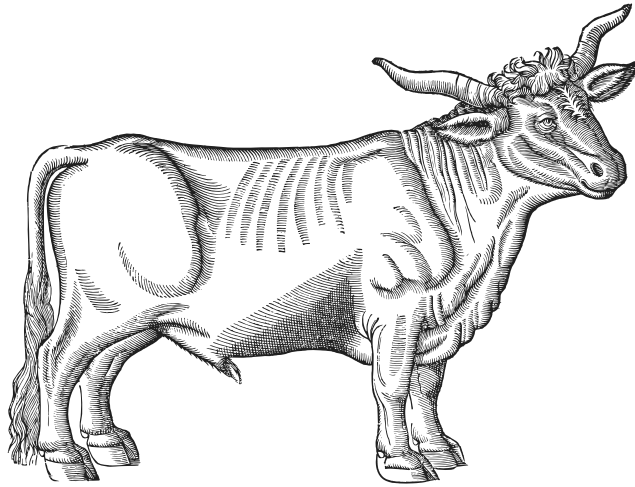
THESE IMAGES SHOW WHAT CHRISTMAS LOOKED LIKE IN OUR CHURCH.

Bible Study Group Study

St. Luke



St Luke is traditionally shown with the ox, a sign of service and sacrifice.

The Monday study group has been taking a fresh look at St, Luke's gospel and discovering new things. We would like to share with you something of what we have been discovering.

Over the years the gospel writers have been assigned an emblem that describes their idea of our Lord. Luke's emblem is the ox. Now in our culture we would dismiss this animal as big, clumsy, stupid and dull but in ancient times it was anything but. Oxen were the David Brown tractors of their time! They were strong, dependable, adaptable and, treated well, gave long service to their masters. They were even status symbols, the more you had the richer you were and in the culture of the time they were the ultimate sacrifice for sin.

Luke, as a gentile, an educated man and a convert, was writing somewhat later than Matthew and Mark and had much written material to draw from. He also sought out eye witnesses and those with personal experience of our Lord's life.

As a gentile he was writing for gentiles and especially for someone named Theophilus, for whom he had a high regard. He begins his gospel by saying it is an ordered account of the life death and resurrection of the life of the Messiah.

All through our study of Luke we have encountered the qualities of the ox in our Lord's life. At his baptism he is publicly picked out and then tested in the desert. Recognising that difficult jobs require team work we see Jesus picking a team to train and teach. His patience and persistence is evident in all his teaching. He was accommodating when met with incomprehension and unyielding in difficult situations. We learned that at his transfiguration, meeting with Moses and Elijah, representing the Law and the Prophets, his future was sealed and thereafter his face was set stoically towards Jerusalem to be the ultimate sacrifice for the sins of the whole world! Thankfully that was not the end.

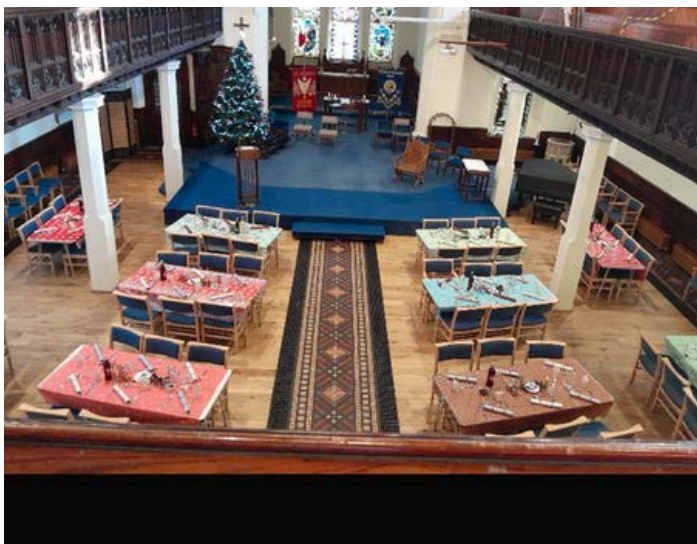
There's the table decorations, wrapping paper (It takes a while to wrap 50 presents) and the big one the food. The week of the party we start making trifles.... 72 of them!

Users of British Sign Language were able to take part in Christmas services and events throughout December 2025 thanks to the Diocese of Leeds Deaf Ministry Team.

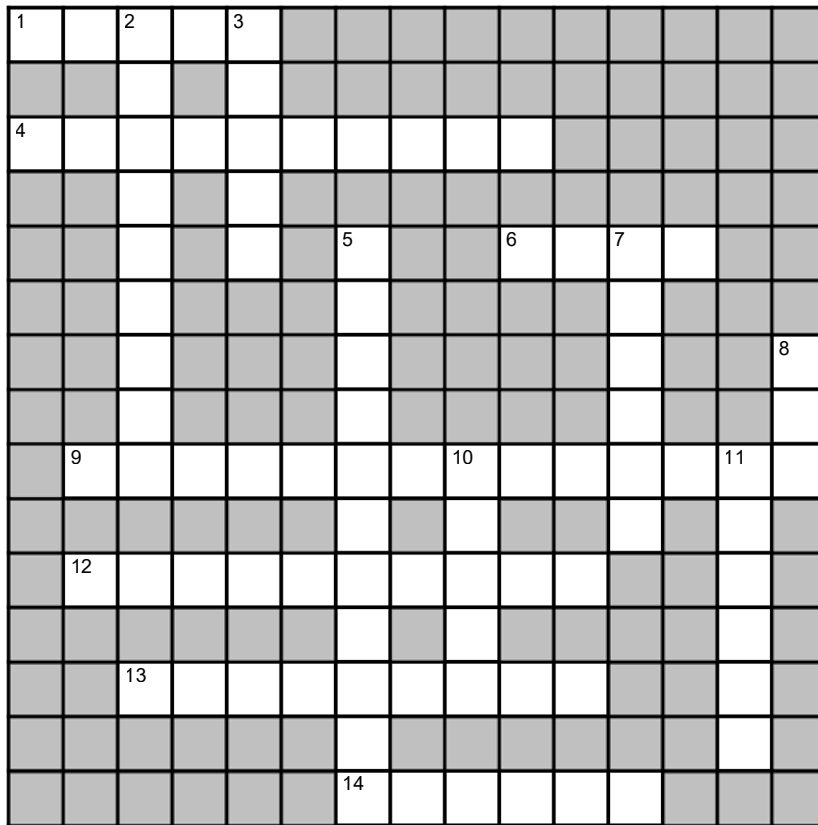

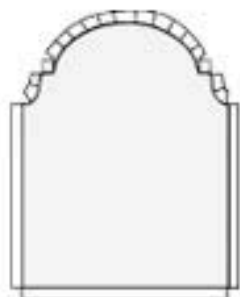
