## The Passing of Time

At this time of year, a lot of people are thinking about the year ahead. It could be that they are doing this because of the 'resolutions' they made on New Year's Eve, as their TVs showered them with images of people enjoying themselves around the world, under the fireworks.... or it might be because, simply trying to remember that this is '2026', every time you write the date, makes you sense the passing of time. Whichever it is..... I think it is natural, in January and on into February, to think of the past, and to 'ponder'... hopefully without too much trepidation... what the future might hold.

If you are a Christian, amongst the first stories which the church gives you to think about in January, is the one about the three kings, or wise men, and their search for a new type of King. This story is actually great for the start of the year, because it reminds us that life is a journey. Famously, the kings, or wise men, left behind everything they knew at home, which (if you think about it) was a very risky thing to do! Somehow, these people found the faith to walk off west, in search of a better future. They were full of hope! And their hope was 'realised' in the most unlikely place, wasn't it? They found God's love, lying in a cave, on the wrong side of Bethlehem. But the journey did not stop there for the wise men. Their faith, and new found love, changed them forever, gave them hope, and propelled them forward, into a dangerous future... but full of courage.

In our community, as we look forward into the new year, most of us cannot forget the events which have dominated recent months. So many people in so many places are suffering as 2026 begins. It has felt like a fairly dark time. It has been challenging. I guess that the people directly affected could tell anyone, quite clearly, that life is not a holiday!

Just recently, I heard a very good talk by a vicar from Carlisle. In it, he said, that it is by looking back on our experiences, that we can become aware of the things that can be trusted. If these things bear the marks of love, then we can put our faith in them. So... looking back is a good plan, if we are to face the new year with hope..... and find the courage we need, especially when life is tough, to journey on hopefully.

Looking back over the last month and a half, we can see the things that have provided a firm foundation for those affected by violence and warfare. In the midst of it all we have seen compassion, kindness, selflessness and real community spirit growing in the midst of the toughest settings. Of course it was there before, but so many people have wanted to give, and help....and simply bless those who have had

their lives turned upside down. To look back and 'see' it all through this lens, is enough to restore our faith in human nature. There is always a lot of love around, one way or another! As we think about travelling into the future there is plenty to give thanks for, and to be hopeful about, right here....on our doorstep.

New Year's Eve does, sometimes, feel like 'Ground Hog Day' to me. When I see the fireworks go off on Sydney Bridge I admit that I do feel as if the years have merged together, and I wonder what is going on.... on so many levels! But, of course, the 'real year' ahead will be different, because life in God's world is a journey that has to be travelled, one way or another. We are not here to simply 'pass the time', or be on an endless holiday. We are here to change...to be softened where we have become hard. We are here to be transformed.

By looking back over the last year, faith can be found; by looking around, 'on our doorstep', and engaging with it, love can be experienced...and by joining both together, we can discover hope, and a real appetite for the future. I probably need to remember this more than many people. I think that is what the kings, or wise men, did. They were up for the journey.... I hope you find that you are too. May God bless you as you travel on into 2026!

# *St Olaf's Wasdale Head*

## *faith in the fells*

### **FEBRUARY SERVICES AT ST OLAF'S**

Sunday 8<sup>th</sup> – 11am Morning Praise

Sunday 22<sup>nd</sup> – 11am Celtic Praise\*

All our services are followed by refreshments in the Wasdale Head Inn.

*The February service at Nether Wasdale Church is Holy Communion at 9.30am on Sunday 1<sup>st</sup> February.*

**YEAR OF GROWTH** – St Olaf's continued to progress in 2025. Visitor and pilgrim numbers topped 31,000, an average of 85 daily, with income increasing to £33,393 for the year. 39 services were held in St Olaf's in 2025, with an average attendance of 17. Carols in the Wasdale Head Inn, and the Festival Communion on Christmas Day, both led by Philip, provided a joyful end to the year, with large attendances at both.

**RESTORATION** – the restoration of St Olaf's is starting next month. The church will close after the service on the 22<sup>nd</sup> February\*. The aim is to complete the restoration in August and reopen in September. St Olaf's is Wasdale's oldest building and England's smallest parish church, a special sacred place; the architect and contractor appointed are experts in the conservation of ancient buildings, and its complete and careful restoration will equip it to face the next century. Make a note to visit in the autumn! In the meantime we will keep you updated with progress and photographs in this magazine and on St Olaf's website [www.wasdalehead.church](http://www.wasdalehead.church)

While the restoration is underway, the pipe organ and all furnishings will be removed, with the organ being rebuilt and revoiced in Carlisle and Durham, and the furnishings carefully renovated, by volunteers we hope.

If funds allow we will also improve the churchyard - new paths and gates, the removal of steps, an additional stone bench and improved drainage. Accordingly donations to the restoration fund are still very welcome - via JustGiving on the website, or by cheque payable to Wasdale Head PCMC.

## **NORMA'S BISCUIT RECIPE (I still measure in lbs. and ozs.!)**

Several people have asked me for my biscuit recipe, so here it is!

### **Basic recipe:**

8 oz. soft margarine

6 oz. caster sugar

Cream these together and add 2 tablesp. syrup; 12 oz. SR flour and 2 level teasp. bicarb. soda, and mix well.

Now you can add **either**: 2oz desiccated coconut /  
2oz almonds (ground or flaked) / or other nuts / 2 oz sultanas /  
2 rounded dessertsp. ginger + chopped crystallised ginger /  
2 oz porridge oats / or anything else you think might work well, and mix together.

Roll into small balls and flatten with the back of a fork.

Place on baking tray and bake at 160 C for 10-15 mins. **Enjoy!**

## BECKERMET COMMUNITY NEWS

I hope that you all had a great time over Christmas and on New Years Eve, hopefully receiving the gifts you all wished for from Santa, but more importantly being able to spend good quality time with your friends and family. Christmas has become too commercialised and the pressure on families of young children has greatly increased over the years. The reason for celebrating this special time is all too often forgotten unfortunately. With the turning of the year the days will slowly begin to get longer, around two minutes per day/an hour per month. The new shoots of life are already pushing through with snowdrops and daffodils eagerly reaching out skywards to eventually brighten up our days in the months ahead. Although we are certainly not out of the problems associated with winter, we do know that slowly but surely the days will get warmer as they grow longer and that big yellow ball will give us more warmth as it climbs higher in the sky. ### Reading Rooms

### Coffee Cake & Chat (supported by the GDF)

These sessions have been ongoing now for over three years and often attract visitors from other local communities, walkers, passing cyclists and visitors to the area on holiday. In recent months we have also had visits from the local village nursery who have enjoyed their time especially with a cup of juice and a biscuit. We hope to develop these visits further in the months ahead. All refreshments, cakes and biscuits are free of charge but if you would like to leave a donation that would be gratefully received. The sessions are a great way of meeting up with

other members of the village with many making new friendship links beyond the Reading Rooms. Recently around 40-50 people have attended over the two sessions which is great to see that they value the opportunity to have a catch up with friends. If you have never been before then why not come along as you will be made most welcome.

### **Cumbria / Britain-in-Bloom**

As many of you will be aware Beckermat has entered Cumbria-in-Bloom for the past two years. In 2024 they gained the Silver Award while in 2025 they went one better receiving the Gold Award for all their efforts. Recently the organisers contacted the group to ask if the village would represent Cumbria in Britain-in-Bloom. This is a great achievement in such a short time but with it comes even greater focus on improving our local environment by our band of volunteers. To understand what will be needed a number of meetings have been organised for volunteers to attend to enlighten them of the criteria required. The first meeting took place on the 13<sup>th</sup> January with the next two on the **10<sup>th</sup> February & 10<sup>th</sup> March** in the Reading Rooms from **6-7pm**. Our village choir had several performances over the festive period. The first of these was on Wednesday 17<sup>th</sup> December with a Christmas performance of songs and carols, some with audience participation. This was held in the Reading Rooms. Everyone had to bring a tin to get in. With the sale of raffle tickets together with a bucket collection raising £148.35 in total plus two large boxes full of tins. Then two days later on Friday 19<sup>th</sup> December they gave another performance in the Whitmare pub where the bucket collection raised another £109.10. This enabled them to donate over £250 as well as the tins collected to North Lakes Foodbank in time for distribution to needy families at Christmas. A great effort much appreciated by the foodbank who are always in need of donations to help those in greatest need. Please remember that this need for help has not gone away so if you are able to donate there is always a box at the front entrance to the Reading Rooms which again is taken to the foodbank in Egremont.

The café which is open on some Saturdays has been a great success with lots of people making the most of the wonderful cakes and sausage rolls all freshly baked by Tina. ## **Beckermert Village 50/50 Lottery**

Our village lottery with 175 members has had four monthly draws in this its third year. This will allow us to give around 100 prizes during the year ranging from £10 to £50 each month, in total just over £2,100 with the same amount available to help youngsters or village groups who need financial support with their project. Each draw takes place in the Reading Rooms at around 10am on the first Tuesday of each month during our Coffee Cake & Chat session. 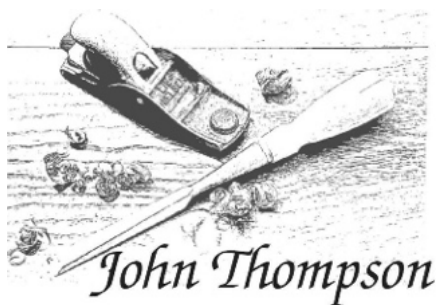

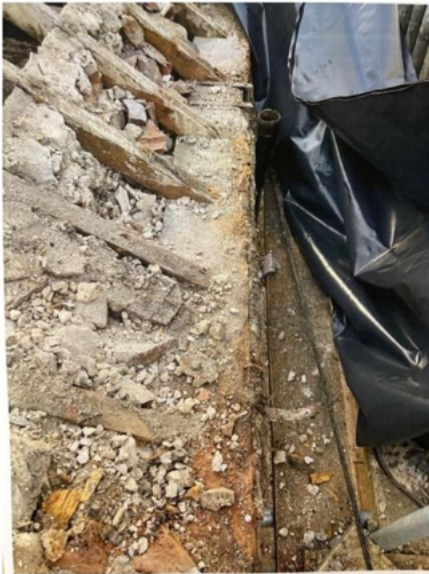




## UPDATE GOSFORTH PUBLIC HALL REFURBISHMENT PROJECT

With a major grant from Historic England and the Copeland Community Fund, work has progressed significantly with new roof timbers and lintels. The cast iron gutters need replacing and a new staircase to the upper room before plastering can begin. While some tasks have been completed more quickly (and at lower cost) than expected, others have needed more work (= time & money). Overall, the work is progressing to both time and budget plans. The internal work is due to complete end March 2026 with external render being applied in May / June. ## SAINTS FOR FEBRUARY



There are three primary schools in England named for Gilbert of Sempringham. Two are in Lincolnshire, where Sempringham is, and one is Greater Manchester. Gilbert lived in the twelfth century and is remembered only by the Church of England on the 4<sup>th</sup> of February. He founded the order of 'Gilbertines' which consisted of male regular canons and female nuns, living separately in one establishment. This proved popular with over twenty houses at one time, but none survived the reformation. He is therefore remembered today, and not just for the schools called after him.
