



Festive refreshments including mulled wine and mince pies were served following the service - a joyful celebration of the season in the beautifully decorated church.



A Letter from Fiona

As a New Year starts, one can't help but look back on the old year. It's important, though, to find a balance between remembering the past and looking forward to the future. There are times in all our lives when the past was difficult, and this can cloud our vision of the future. So, living in the here and now, and making the best of the moment we're in, is so important. 2025 was not the best of years for me, but by no means was it the worst. And when I look at the state of the world – the wars, destruction and the human suffering this brings and the poverty, the loneliness, the illness, and all manner of hardship, I truly do count my blessings each and every day. So looking forward into 2026 I pray for a better world for everyone.

When I look at what the coming year looks like for me, already Beaulieu is featuring in my plans. Tony and I lived longer in Beaulieu than we'd lived anywhere in our married life, and so naturally St Michael's remains important to me, though from afar, most of the time. However, I've been very lucky to have had several visits to Beaulieu this last year, the most special one being the visit I made in late November. I had already brought a memorial stone down on a previous visit, which had been carefully placed in 'Tony's Garden' behind the church.



But on this last visit, Fr Hugh came over from Monaco to conduct a very intimate service, remembering Tony and dedicating the stone. It was a short service during which Fr Hugh read a section from the *Ordinal of Responsibilities of a Priest*, responsibilities which Tony fulfilled with absolute dedication and humility, and this, together with his words about Tony and what made him the man he was, Fr Hugh painted a vivid picture of him, and thus reminded us all of just what a truly special priest St Michael's had had in Tony.

The service was short, but hugely moving. I was incredibly touched that so many of St Michael's congregation came along to witness this final act. Tony is talked about with such affection, and that day was no different, which is so incredibly comforting.

My grief has become a constant companion, and the gap left by Tony will always be there, but I also recognise that you, the St Michael's congregation, are still grieving your loss, and this was very clear on that chilly Sunday afternoon as we all stood in the garden and remembered the humble servant that Tony was, both as a priest and as a man.

Our faith tells us that we will be reunited, and this is what helps me to put one foot in front of the other each day. So, as we go into the New Year, my prayer is that whilst putting that one foot in front of the other. I will dedicate each step to the memory of Tony by remaining humble, never looking for glory and always endeavouring to do my best to effect change, I'll try to do this by following Tony's example of always speaking up and walking with love.

And so, to my friends at St Michael's, wherever in the world you are, until we meet again, be that in Beaulieu, in Newcastle, somewhere else, or in spirit, I wish you all health, happiness, love and peace in 2026.

From the churchwardens

Concerning the new priest, there are still administrative matters to be concluded on the Diocese level. As soon as we have more details, we will share them.

30 people attended services at the church on Christmas Eve and 25 on Christmas Day. Thanks to everyone who celebrated Christmas at St Michael's in 2025. **Christmas decorations will come down on Monday, 5 January starting at 10am**. Please stop by to help if you can.

And a reminder to **please look at the sign-up sheets** at the back of the church to put your name down for readings and refreshments.

How is St Michael's doing at the start of 2026?

Spiritually, we are thriving.

We have a healthy congregation, with new people joining regularly. Worship is joyful and vibrant. Our church building is classed as a national *monument historique* and is in good condition, thanks to recent maintenance and upgrades.

What about finances?

This is where we face challenges.

For many years, we covered our running costs comfortably. Today, income only just meets expenses.

Why?

- Costs have risen: rent on the priest's accommodation (up 50% since 2010), health insurance coverage for the priest, car expenses and building maintenance.
- Regular giving has fallen: down about 30%. Despite a growing congregation (now over 200 people and 2,000 visits a year), fewer people give regularly. Sunday plate offerings have not kept pace with inflation and while very much needed, are not enough to offset operating costs.
- No recent large bequests: while we are grateful for generous one-off gifts, there have been no major legacy donations to the church in recent years.

What does this mean for the future?

If income and expenses continue on this path, we will have to use our emergency reserves to cover basic costs.

Common questions

Does the Church of England pay our priest?

No. We pay the priest's salary ourselves and also pay a fee to the Diocese. At present, we cannot afford a full-time priest.

Does the French state pay for the church or priest?

No. The commune has no responsibility for the building, gardens, or clergy salary. All costs are borne by us.

How do Nice and Monaco manage?

Both have received large bequests in the past and own property, including housing for clergy. This income allows them to employ staff. St Michael's relies entirely on volunteers and pays rent for clergy housing.

How can you help?

Regular giving (pledges)

- Helps secure the church's future.
- Can be very tax-efficient:
- French residents: up to 66% tax credit.
- UK residents: Gift Aid adds 20% to donations.

Leaving a bequest in your will

- A legacy gift, carefully invested, can support St Michael's for generations.
- Tax advantages depend on residency and assets:
- Gifts of French property to a charity can avoid up to 60% inheritance tax.
- Most cash bequests are tax-free.

Tax benefit seminars

- In 2026 we will offer seminars on the tax benefits of giving. More information to come.
