Wilder churches ... During the winter months, when the days are shorter and often cold or wet, it is easy to stay indoors. Days when going for a stroll on muddy paths are not very appealing are a perfect time to visit churchyards, they usually have some paved paths and short grass and if it does start to rain you can visit the church. The churchyard of St. Andrews at Compton Bishop is a great place to observe and enjoy the ever-changing natural world. On December 22nd (the shortest day) I saw, in bud or flower daisies, common and ivy-leaved speedwell, common sow thistle, ivy-leaved toadflax and annual meadow grass. There were also fruits ripening on the ivy, catkins on the hazel, and a collection of conkers under the horse chestnut tree. The week after Christmas sitting on the bench by the Preaching Cross I heard a woodpecker, probably Greater Spotted Woodpecker, drumming and a Green Woodpecker calling. By the following week, in spite of the cold snap, snowdrops and primroses were in full bloom and jackdaws or jays looking for something to eat had disturbed the collection of conkers. By the time you read this the days will be longer and warmer and there will be even more to see or listen to in all the churchyards in our parish.

The seven lessons were read by six members of the community with Gary Orris reading the final lesson. This was a truly joyful occasion.

The Crook Peak Special Choir: We were delighted when the choir were invited to sing for half an hour at the Weare Academy Christmas Fayre on the 10th December, another joyful occasion. We hope this collaboration with the Academy will continue. It was a privilege for the choir to sing at the funeral of Rev Alistair Forster on the 23rd December when the choir were augmented by ex-members of the Axbridge Benefice Choir.
