**Friday Prayers for Peace and Reconciliation
Friday 13th March 2026**

Bible Reading: Isaiah 2.1-5

The word that Isaiah son of Amoz saw concerning Judah and Jerusalem. In days to come the mountain of the Lord's house shall be established as the highest of the mountains, and shall be raised above the hills; all the nations shall stream to it. Many peoples shall come and say, "Come, let us go up to the mountain of the Lord, to the house of the God of Jacob; that he may teach us his ways and that we may walk in his paths." For out of Zion shall go forth instruction, and the word of the Lord from Jerusalem. He shall judge between the nations, and shall arbitrate for many peoples; they shall beat their swords into ploughshares, and their spears into pruning-hooks; nation shall not lift up sword against nation, neither shall they learn war any more. O house of Jacob, come, let us walk in the light of the Lord!

Reflection

I came across this quotation from J.R.R. Tolkien's *The Lord of the Rings*: "I wish it need not have happened in my time." said Frodo. 'So do I,' said Gandalf. 'And so do all who live to see such times. But it is not for them to decide. All we have to decide is what to do with the time that is given us.'"

I am sure we can apply this to a number of events and situations in our world today. One could well say we live in troubling times. Perhaps we always do, but the situation in our world today does seem particularly troubling and unsettling. Quite understandably the main focus is on the conflict in Iran and the Middle East. However, that should not be allowed to draw our attention away from other conflicts and dire humanitarian crises elsewhere, which are crying out for a swift resolution.

Our Bible reading is well known verses from the prophet Isaiah. They relate originally to the people of Judah and Jerusalem. Yet they have also very much a universal message. For the prophet talks about nations, all nations, and many peoples. His is indeed a very powerful and timely image.

To return to the quotation from Tolkien, what are we to do with the time that is given us? We may feel there is nothing we can do as individuals in the face of conflict, injustice and great suffering. We may feel helpless. Yet if nothing else we can pray. We can continue to pray for peace and justice in our world. We can continue to pray that Isaiah's vision of peace may be realized for everyone without distinction in our broken and troubled world. That is our earnest prayer to God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit - Creator, Redeemer and Sustainer of Life.
