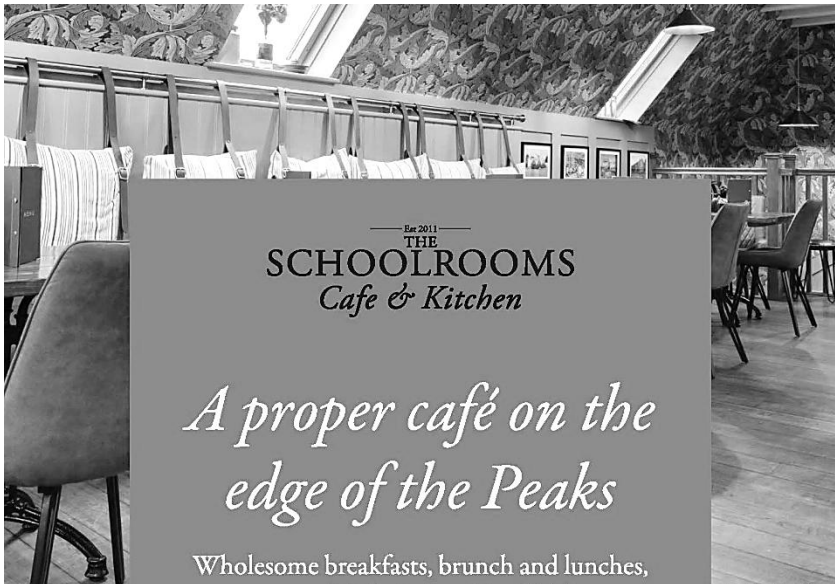

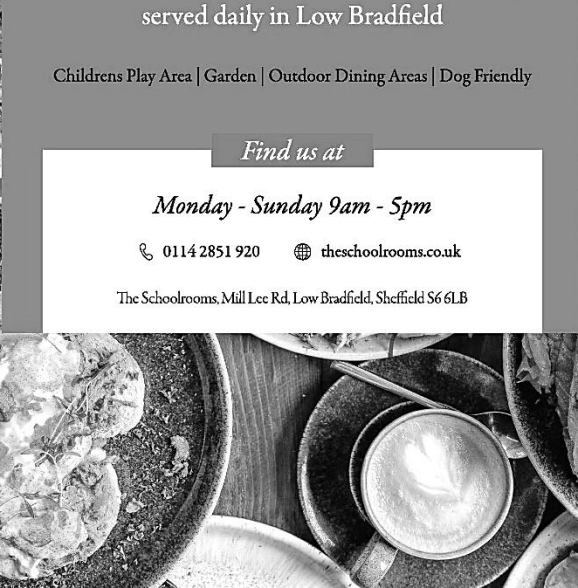

Pilgrimage

Pilgrimages have been rediscovered recently!

Not so many people hold to the Medieval idea of Pilgrimages being a way of suffering for your sins anymore – bare feet and crusts of bread!

But lots are discovering the joy and renewal of spending time with God outdoors surrounded by nature, solitude and the ancient rhythm of simply walking. Just as the founders of Monasticism discovered, time spent in a place away from the distractions of everyday life can give us space to process concerns and to find new hope and vision.

A Pilgrimage is different for everyone and depends a lot on what you bring to it. It might be a question, a joy to be celebrated, a grief, a sense of something new around the corner to be explored, or something you are not at all aware of when you start!

One approach is to take what you want to explore to God at the beginning of the Pilgrimage, and through walking, prayer and reading, see where your thinking goes and new insights God gives you as you journey. Another is simply to walk, watch, enjoy and see what comes to mind. Bill and I started our first Pilgrimage, along St Cuthbert's way to Holy Island, only three weeks after the end of my chemotherapy and for me, it was literally, walking back into life.

Preparation is part of the package and brings the joy of anticipation, physically and spiritually. You are both responsible for yourself and reliant on God.

Building up fitness to be able to carry a pack ten miles over the ups and downs of rugged country; checking that you can deal with the emergencies – a down-pour of sleet out of nowhere, a swollen river, a twisted ankle, the Pub not doing food tonight! It is all vital!

But alongside knowing God is with us in the challenges, are those shafts of radiance as we discover Him in the delights: enjoying the comradeship, someone new who comes across our path, a bank of wild-flowers or the opening up of a view; something laid down, a fresh perspective or a renewed vision. Or just the enjoyment of the outdoors.

Pilgrimage is about the journey: not the achievement. Opening up to all it brings will mean you will end up in a different place to the one you started from, in all kinds of ways.

HOWEVER: if Pilgrimage is a journey which helps you process, finding renewal and end up in a new and better place... you don't necessarily need to walk far to do one!

- It could be just a saunter round the block, chatting to God as you go, listening to His voice as you return.
- It could be journalling through a problem; processing your tangled thoughts and bringing in new insights as they occur.
- A finger labyrinth* can be a Pilgrimage.

- It could be so simple as fifteen minutes spent with God at the beginning of the day – bringing the day’s concerns to Him, reading a bit of Scripture and taking something which spoke to you in it into the day ahead.

Enjoy the journey!

The Mothers' Union is a Worldwide Christian organisation: One Worldwide family: growing in faith, living in action and united in fellowship. Founded 150 years ago, this year 2026 we are celebrating the life of our founder Mary Sumner and the humble beginnings of this wonderful charity.

Who was Mary Sumner?

Mary Sumner was not a Queen; she was not a celebrity; she was not a preacher; she was simply a Mother – who understood the power of prayer.

Born in 1828 she was the wife of an Anglican Priest living in England. As a young mother, Mary struggled with raising her children and often felt inadequate, but instead of giving up, she turned her weakness into prayer, and from that humble place, something powerful was born.

In 1876, Mary gathered women together to pray for their children and support one another in motherhood. That small gathering later became the Mothers' Union, a global movement of 4 million members that now supports families in over 80 countries.

Mary Sumner's message was simple but strong: the heart of a nation begins at home. When mothers pray, families are strengthened. When families are strengthened society is transformed. Today, millions of women proudly wear the Mothers' Union Brooch not as a badge but as a symbol of

prayer, service and family unity. Mary Sumner's legacy reminds us that you don't need a loud voice to change the world - you only need a praying heart, so when you see the Blue and White Brooch it represents a woman who believed that mothers who pray can shape generations, Membership of the Mothers' Union is open to men and women, all who have been baptised and support our vision and mission. Whoever you are, you have a valued place in our MU family.

If you would like to be part of something fulfilling and rewarding and would like to find out more, please have a look at the display board on the wall in Church, take a leaflet, and programme of Branch meetings.

On Mothering Sunday two new members, Rev. Sara Goodman and Maureen Ingham were enrolled and welcomed into Bradfield Branch. We pray their lives may be enriched in this loving organisation.

2026 is also a special year for Bradfield Mothers' Union as we celebrate 100 years, on the 4th June at 11.00am in St. Nicholas Church. You are all invited to a service of thanksgiving for the Worldwide Mothers' Union, for our branch and all that has been achieved by past members. Also to pray that we may continue to bring transformation, love and hope into the lives of families in our communities and around the world.

The Mothers' Union was featured recently on BBC1 Songs of Praise from Liverpool Cathedral meeting inspirational members whose faith motivates them to show God's love

and care. A Happy Band of Pilgrims.....

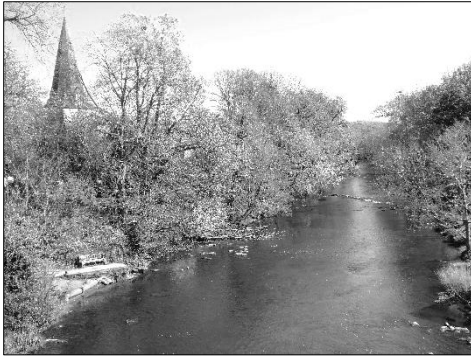

We would walk from Calver to Baslow by the River Derwent – an easy stroll with no hills to tax us!

Our pilgrimage began at All Saints' Church in Calver where we gathered to bring together some thoughts about our walk and the changes that would take place at St. Nicholas' in the coming months. Then we were off! A short walk over a bridge and we



were in fields, away from traffic noise and the busyness of other people. It was not long before we could feel an uplifting sense of calm in the countryside. The weather was fine and

Water

Now that summer is coming and warmer days are ahead, many of us think about taking holidays or days out by the sea, especially if we live in urban areas. It seems that being by the sea can lift our spirits and give us pleasure. We are drawn to water, whether it is a pond in the park, a stream to paddle in, a river, lake or reservoir to fish or sail on.

Water is of great significance in the Bible and is central to the ministry of Jesus. The first event in the River Jordan is the baptism of Jesus as described by Matthew, Ch.3 v.13 – 17. As a sign of willingness to enter into a life with Jesus, we now have the ceremony of Baptism where water is used to mark that commitment. It is on the shores of Lake Galilee that Jesus began his ministry by calling the first disciples to follow him. Several of His disciples were fishermen, whose livelihood depended on the lake. It is astonishing that these fishermen left the lake to begin a new life in which they would become “fishers of men.” (Mark1 v.16 – 20).

When Jesus was invited to a wedding at Cana in Galilee, we see the first indications of Jesus’ power to

perform miracles. At the wedding feast, the wine runs out but with some persuasion from his mother, Jesus changes the water in six stone water jars into wine. (John Ch2). After this, there are many occasions when Jesus shows his powers and ability to rescue a situation.

One evening, after Jesus had spent some time alone in a boat, he finds the shore filled with people who had been following Him. Knowing that they were tired and hungry and it was late in the day, He enables the disciples to feed the five thousand with five loaves and two fishes. (Matthew 14 v15 -21) Soon after this, He tells the disciples to go out in a boat to the other side of the lake and wait for him. When Jesus goes to join them, He walks on the lake to reach the boat which is a considerable distance from the shore. In Mark 4 v35 -41 there is an account of a similar incident though the emphasis is on the amazing power of Jesus to control natural elements as He calms “a furious squall” which causes the disciples in the boat to be afraid of drowning. This reminds us that as well as the pleasures we have of being by the sea, it can also make us aware of how small we are in this world when

we see the vast area of water and distant horizons over which we have no control.

Water is essential to our life and well-being. As we spend our time by water, it is worth thinking about the accounts in the Bible which show the power Jesus had to calm situations and bring the comfort and reassurance which is so often lacking in our lives.
