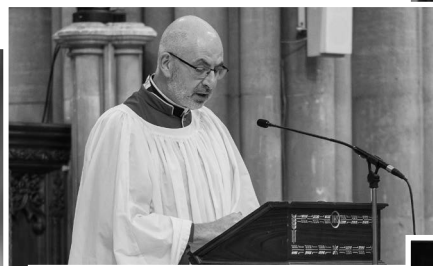
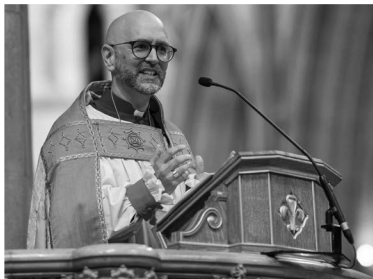


BISHOP, INTERIM DEAN, AND CANONS WELCOMED

CHURCH IN ACTION IN 'THE LIVING ROOM'

A shared community space in Truro city centre offering support to people in the area is going from strength to strength.

People often think The Living Room, on River Street, is another modern café in the city with its welcoming decor, fresh cakes and coffee – but it is much more than that.

The building hosts seven local projects, around 20 volunteers, and people from a variety of denominations running various sessions throughout the week. These include a Sunday church service, community larder, clothes bank, and a bible study. There are also bookshelves offering free bibles as well as a book and toy swap.

Volunteers work in the kitchen preparing soup and salads or offering tea, coffee and cake to people arriving.

Three years ago, Revd Erica Payne and a group of churchgoers formed The Dockyard Collective with the vision of creating a shared space to support their community after witnessing deprivation in the area.

BUILDINGS STRATEGY WILL BENEFIT PARISH CHURCHES

The diocese's **Buildings Strategy** has received final approval from members of the Bishop's Diocesan Council (BDC) this month after previously being enthusiastically welcomed by diocesan synod members in February.

Work will now begin on a delivery plan with the aim of parishes seeing the first benefits later this year.

Speaking after the BDC meeting, Kate Cortez, Deputy Diocesan Secretary and report author, said: "The key aim of this strategy is to really help parishes. This strategy drives real investment into the life and mission of the Church in Cornwall. It will support parishes in their stewardship of historic church buildings."

In 2023 the Diocese of Truro committed £22 million taken from diocesan reserves over the next ten years to support parish and deanery plans; investing in the life and mission of the church in Cornwall. £2 million of this will go towards the aims and objectives set out in the Buildings Strategy.

Revd Laura Bushell Hawke, who chaired the advisory group developing the strategy, added: "We think the proposals

for match funding, more small grants, shared services and support officers is the most effective way to reduce burden and move from fear to faith."

The strategy was subject to extensive consultation during its creation and at February's Diocesan Synod meeting, members were quick to support it.

Speaking at the time, Patrick Newberry, member from Stoke Climsland, and founder of the Cornwall Buildings Group, said: "It is an excellent paper about helping people overcome the daunting process of looking after these buildings. Great paper, great ideas... It could do a lot to help people blow away the myths."

Revd Elizabeth Burke member from the Isles of Scilly said: "I love the direction its going in. Triage of the buildings. Increase of building support officers, grant raising, help with faculties."

Revd Laura added: "Our prayer is that this strategy will help us steward these sacred places with courage and kindness, so that we remain rooted in place; growing in faith - and so that these buildings continue to be signs of God's life among us for generations to come."

FRESH SHOOTS SPRING UP FROM GREENHOUSE COURSE

A course helping mission-minded churchgoers introduce faith to their community groups has been heralded a success after more than 60 people attended the first session.

In West Wivelshire a pilot of the course, called Greenhouse, takes place three times throughout the year, and people are already said to be putting what they are learning into practice.

Soul Space, an initiative born through Greenhouse, has seen parishioners offering an optional Christian reflective space during the community groups they run.

Lindsey Morgan Lundie, Diocese of Truro's Pioneer Network Facilitator, explained: "Sometimes people don't know how to make the move from being a community group to including faith. Soul Space, developed by Micheal Moynagh, offers the idea of creating a short reflective space which is very comfortable and flexible.

"The whole point of Soul Space is to create opportunity for faith to be shared in a really gentle way with no pressure."

The Soul Space resource has been trialled in a toddler group, a women's group and been part of a rural lay lead service.

Linda Myles, who organises a community breakfast, used ideas from Greenhouse including creating a small space with a prayer tree for people to use.

Linda said: "Greenhouse is really helping me to think out of the box and try different types of church.

"I look forward to hearing how to continue, and if you want to change how things are done or want to know more, go to a Greenhouse event. I can guarantee you will be really inspired. I already have a few more ideas that are percolating away."

FLOURISH WORSHIPPING COMMUNITIES

Camborne Science and International Academy is one of three Flourish Worshipping Community pilot locations and in May, leaders from all three locations, colleagues from the National Society for Education and the Growing Faith Foundation joined Bishop James and Lee Moscato at the school to hear the good news about how this location is growing and growing.

Lee and James were visibly moved when hearing about the difference this club makes to the students. The young leaders shared how they lead assemblies to share what's happening in Flourish Club and how they enjoy engaging with God Send materials that help them explore and ask questions about their faith. Those gathered heard about the community events that, in partnership with local



churches, sees families gather for Christingle and Easter services.

Colleagues from the national team were clearly delighted when hearing about how this space, that's now in its second pilot year, is creating a safe space where young people can express their thoughts about faith, explore it alongside their peers and do so in a place in which they feel they belong.

'KERRIER IS WHERE GOD WANTS ME TO BE'

After three years as a Strategic Rural Dean, Revd Heidi Huntley still knows this is where God wants her to be.

When she first saw the vacancy for Kerrier's Strategic Rural Dean (SRD) in 2023, Heidi felt such a 'strong sense of God' and knew she had to apply.



After being offered the position she relocated from Hertfordshire, where she served as vicar at the Parish Church of St John the Baptist for 10 years, to Helston.

"God asked me to take on this role," Heidi says. "I saw the advertisement for the Strategic Rural Dean in Cornwall – it knocked me for six. I had a real strong sense of God calling me to this."

Today, her role within the diocese sees her working and ministering with 21 churches in the Kerrier deanery, she is also an oversight minister and is a co-director of a Community Interest Company.

As part of her role, she provides advice and oversight of safeguarding in parishes and supports safeguarding training, has fortnightly meetings with Deanery Implementation Teams and attends chapter meetings with clergy, readers and lay leaders where they have a service and a lunch together.

"The day to day in my job is a real mix," Heidi explains, "I love to be out visiting and seeing people where they are."

VOICE OF HOPE FOR COUNTY'S CANCER COMMUNITY

A new weekly podcast offering comfort and companionship to those affected by cancer has been launched in Cornwall, thanks to nearly £20,000 of support from The National Lottery Community Fund.

The Cornwall Cancer Cafe Podcast is led by Camborne broadcaster Matthi Clarke, whose own long journey through blood cancer inspired the project. Following treatment for Diffuse Large B-Cell Non-Hodgkin's Lymphoma at the Royal Cornwall Hospital and Derriford Hospital, Matthi says he wants to offer others "a big virtual hug".

Drawing on his radio background and personal experience, Matthi hopes the easy-listening podcast will be a source of

encouragement for patients, families and carers across Cornwall. He also speaks warmly of the support he received from Macmillan Cancer Support at The Cove in Truro.

Joined by co-presenter Emma Coombe and occasional guest Mark Guymmer of Cancer Support UK, the team will share stories of lived experience and conversations with those working in cancer care.

In a place where community matters deeply, this new ministry of compassion offers hope and fellowship to many.
