CHURCH NEWS

The 5th of August is the date of the death of St Oswald, King of Northumbria, in 642, and, as our Parish Church here in Dean is dedicated to him, we celebrate his life on the Sunday in August nearest to the 5th, so this year on Sunday 2nd at 10 a.m. with a service of Holy Communion.

Although he lived during his reign in Bamburgh Castle on the North Sea coast of Northumberland, he travelled a great deal with St Aidan who he had summoned from Iona to help him spread the Christian Gospel of Good News all around his kingdom and beyond – Aidan spoke only in his own language, so King Oswald acted as his translator. There is evidence that the pair did visit Grasmere, where the Parish Church is dedicated to St Oswald, and we know that it was his influence which brought monks from Caulder Abbey about 500 years later to regularly visit Dean and set up first the Preaching Cross and then our lovely old building as the heart of the village 850 years ago.

So, it is right and proper that we should remember him 1,384 years later. And not just him. Because of what he did during his reign, down the years many people with the same Good News have followed in his footsteps and left their mark here too, making Dean Parish what it is today. It is doubtful whether this place would be as it is now had education not been brought here first by the setting of the boys' grammar school in the churchyard in 1597, and rebuilt, larger, by the same donor 20 years later. Then, in 1815, we were blessed by the arrival of the Sherwen Dynasty – first Samuel who served the parish well, and who decided that girls as well as boys ought to be educated, and, in the 1860s had the girls' school erected on the site where Dean CofE School sits today at his own personal expense. He was followed as Rector of Dean in 1870 by his nephew William who, also at his own expense, had the girls' school converted to a "National School" for girls & boys in 1890, after the old grammar school was condemned as unfit for purpose.

It was also William who, in 1912, had the Kirkstile Rooms beside the Church built as a gathering place for the parishioners, again at his own expense. William was succeeded by his son William Basil in 1915 who held the position of Rector of Dean until 1943. It is very doubtful whether Dean Parish would have been as it is today had it not been served by that dynasty over those 128 years, and it is equally doubtful if they would have been here had not Oswald & Aidan influenced this place almost 1,400 years ago, which is why, in the south east corner of St Oswald's Parish Church Dean there is a rather special stained glass window of the pair of them.

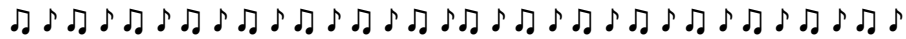

Suitable for all the family, tickets will cost £16, with accompanied u-16s free.

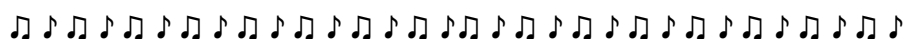

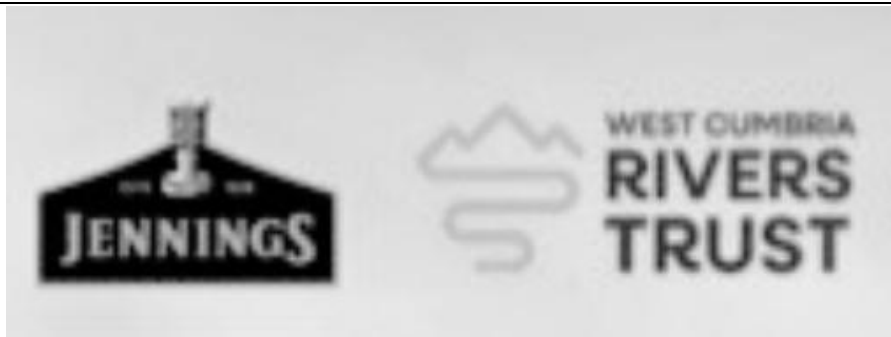

Pull Together: Bash the Balsam

We're joining forces with West Cumbria Rivers Trust to tackle Himalayan Balsam, a non-native invasive plant, along the stunning River Cocker. This summer, we're supporting the Trust to fight back against balsam in the catchment, and we're hosting four 'Pull Together' events where anyone can roll up their sleeves and help protect this beautiful river.

Our goal? To pull 132,000 balsam plants and stop 33 million seeds from spreading across the Cocker catchment.

Why balsam is a problem

Himalayan Balsam may look pretty, with its pink-purple flowers and sweet scent, but it's a real threat to local wildlife and our rivers. It grows fast, out-competes native plants, and dominates riverbanks. Dense stands can impede river flow, increase flooding risks, and when they die back in winter, leave banks bare and susceptible to erosion – which is terrible news for water quality and native fish. Invasive species like balsam cost the UK economy around £1.8 billion a year and are among the top five drivers of biodiversity loss globally.

***No experience needed* and no sign-up required - just turn up on the day. Everyone is welcome, and it's a great activity for all the family (Under 18s must be accompanied by an adult).**

Balsam is easy to pull by hand, so it's a simple, hands-on way to make a real difference. Come along for an hour or stay longer, meet others, and help us clear balsam along the river.

***Please note* balsam bashes involve manual work on uneven ground, with stiles in areas of limited access. Long sleeves and trousers recommended. Sturdy footwear or wellies. Waterproofs and weather-appropriate clothing, drinks, lunch and gloves.**

Gardening Tips for July & August

A brisk, stylish guide to the jobs that matter most this month — with less chores, more blooms, & only occasional battles against very bold courgettes.

There is something gloriously theatrical about the Summer Garden. Borders swell, pots perform, vegetables race ahead with barely concealed ambition, and every plant appears to believe it deserves top billing. The secret to staying ahead is not heroic effort but smart timing: deadhead before things fade, harvest before they become absurd, and water with intent rather than panic. Think of it as midsummer maintenance with excellent rewards.

The Border Edit

Deadhead bedding plants, roses and dahlias regularly to keep the display going rather than letting the garden slide into a tired midsummer sulk. Cut back early flowering perennials such as hardy geraniums and delphiniums after their first flush to encourage fresh foliage and, with luck, a second round of blooms. Keep containers and hanging baskets well-watered and fed, as pots in July can dry out faster than good intentions. It is also a fine time to sow biennials such as foxgloves, honesty and wallflowers for next year, and to plant autumn-flowering bulbs like nerines and colchicums.

The Kitchen Garden Briefing

Pick courgettes, beans, peas and soft fruit frequently—July rewards diligence and punishes hesitation, usually with marrows the size of small submarines. Make sure you water thirsty crops such as tomatoes, beans, pumpkins and celery consistently, and feed tomatoes once trusses have set for better fruiting. Sow quick follow-on crops such as salad leaves, rocket, radishes and a final batch of dwarf beans or peas early in the month, while longer-term planners can start brassicas for autumn and winter. Thin heavy crops of apples, pears and plums, peg down strawberry runners into pots, and prune plum trees in dry weather to reduce disease risk.

This Month's Best Moves

- 1. Keep flowers in full performance.** Deadheading and feeding may not be glamorous, but they are the backstage crew behind a truly good July display.
- 2. Pick before produce turns comic.** Courgettes, beans and soft fruit are at their best when gathered little and often, ideally before they become conversation pieces.
- 3. Water with purpose.** Containers, greenhouse crops and thirsty vegetables need consistency in July, not occasional acts of apology with a hose.
- 4. Sow now for a second act.** Fast crops such as salad leaves and radishes still have time to shine, while autumn and winter plans begin with a little July foresight.
- 5. Patrol for pests.** Aphids, lily beetles and vine weevils rarely take a summer holiday, so a quick weekly check can spare you a great deal of horticultural melodrama later.

Morning Tea/Coffee

There is plenty to choose from with a good children's menu too.

The Gather is dog friendly (although we thankfully didn't take our large furry friend with us as it was very crowded). The toilets & cafe itself are fully accessible.

There's a little shop selling local products- everything from Wild & Fruity preserves to Maryport tea towels!

After our visit we had an hour's leg stretch along Ennerdale Water.
