Friday Prayers for Peace and Reconciliation
Friday 24th July 2026

Bible Reading: Romans 8.31-39

If God is for us, who is against us? He who did not withhold his own Son, but gave him up for all of us, will he not with him also give us everything else? Who will bring any charge against God's elect? It is God who justifies. Who is to condemn? It is Christ Jesus, who died, yes, who was raised, who is at the right hand of God, who indeed intercedes for us. Who will separate us from the love of Christ? Will hardship, or distress, or persecution, or famine, or nakedness, or peril, or sword? As it is written, "For your sake we are being killed all day long; we are accounted as sheep to be slaughtered." No, in all these things we are more than conquerors through him who loved us. For I am convinced that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor rulers, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord.

Reflection

"Who will separate us from the love of Christ?", St Paul asks; and the answer that he gives us: nothing "will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord". These are powerful words indeed from our Bible reading, which is part of one of the readings for this coming Sunday.

The overall message of the Bible, and particularly of the New Testament, is that of love: God's love for us, for all of us, and the call for our response of love in return, to love God and to love others as ourselves. That is a very simple and direct message, not complicated or purely theoretical but extremely real.

God's love is revealed especially, as St Paul reminds us in this passage, in God's Son Jesus, through his death and resurrection. That is Good News indeed. The more challenging part is our response of love. If we all loved one another in the deep sense presented to us by Jesus and following his example, then ours would be a very different and better world.

There are many barriers to love, though, as we may well experience within ourselves, in our own individual lives. That is even more evident in our world, where there are conflicts, injustice, inequality, prejudice, and so much else that divides people. Christian love, on the other hand, brings us together.

We very much need to hear St Paul's declaration that nothing can separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord. He provides a comprehensive list of the potential barriers - death, life, angels, nor rulers, things present, things to come, powers, height, depth, and anything else in all creation. Some of these are easier to interpret and understand than others. Yet all ultimately, we are promised, will give way to God's overriding and all-encompassing love.

In the face of all the suffering and all that is broken in our world, God is our hope. In the God of love alone, Father, Son and Holy Spirit, can we truly place all our faith and trust.
