SUMMER HOLIDAYS BY WATER

I used to participate and compete in many sports, the main one being triathlon (swim, bike, run). In most of the competitions the swim was in open water - lakes, docks, rivers or the sea. Much of our swim training was also in open water. The club I belonged to, and all others I’m aware of, take safety in the water extremely seriously. We all took turns paddling rescue canoes where you towed a buoyancy float behind you. Depending on the type of training you always “buddied up”, that is you were only a couple of metres away from your training partner and we were all given training in what to do in an emergency situation. Although being a triathlon club we were all strong swimmers, anyone at anytime can get into trouble. During one long-distance cold-water swim I had severe cramp and was very grateful to have my “buddy” and rescue boat nearby.

During the last couple of heatwaves in the UK and across Europe a number of people have tragically lost their lives in water. Many of you will be heading somewhere near water for your Summer Holidays. If you do, please do take care.

Because many of the deaths and incidents are with young people, particularly teenagers, the first step is to simply “have the conversation” with them. The Royal Life Saving Society (RLSS) give information on potential risk situations and provides a downloadable pamphlet on how to start a conversation about safety; this can be found at

RoSPA (Royal Society for the Prevention of Accidents) also gives advice on open water swimming and precautions to take (<https://www.rospace.com/water-safety/open-water-swimming>)

It also may be confusing on who to phone in emergencies at different locations, <https://www.respectthewater.com/> gives simple details on which service to call in the event of an issue. Who to contact should be known in advance of entering the water. Everyone going on holiday to a place by water, even if you do not intend to enter, should familiarize themselves with this, the quicker emergency services are contacted the better.

This may seem over the top, but having swum open water a lot, you need to know potential issues and how to avoid them, and what to do if an emergency arises. No one wants to say don’t go in the water, but please do take open water seriously and make sure anyone you know going to a place near water is aware of how to act.



Reflection: Faith on the Football Field

As I write this the excitement of the World Cup continues to unfold. It has already given us plenty to talk about. There have been some controversies as well as a few hiccups along the way, as there always are in a tournament of this size, but despite these, overall, it has been a wonderful spectacle. We should hold on to the fact that fans have come together from every corner of the world to support their teams and celebrate their countries. The colour, noise, passion and pride have reminded us again of football's extraordinary power to unite people.

It has been especially exciting to watch smaller nations make their mark, including Cape Verde, appearing on the World Cup stage for the first time, doing brilliantly and carrying the hopes of a proud people. Their joy, determination and sense of achievement have been wonderful to see. Moments like these show that football is about far more than trophies. It is about identity, belonging, hope and the courage to step onto the biggest stage.

Watching it all, I am struck by how much football can resemble faith. There are great highs: moments of encouragement, celebration, unity and breakthrough. There are also lows: struggle, disappointment, pressure and the need to keep going when things do not turn out as we hoped. A team's journey through a tournament can mirror something of our own journey with God. We celebrate victories, but we also learn through setbacks. We rejoice when things go well, but we are also shaped by the difficult moments.

That is why it has been encouraging to see footballers speak openly about faith. Ballers in God, a Christian network in football founded in 2015, describes itself as a movement that connects, encourages and equips people to live for God through the platform of football. It provides community for players, coaches and professionals who want to grow in faith, support one another and use their influence well.

There are many well-known players whose faith appears to carry them through both triumph and trouble. Bukayo Saka has spoken movingly about trusting God in pressure-filled moments. After England's victory over Switzerland at Euro 2024, when asked how he had found the character to overcome past disappointment, he said, "I have faith in God." He has also described reading his Bible regularly and said that before every game he asks God to help him play well, help his team and make a positive contribution, adding that this is why he points to the sky to give thanks.

Marcus Rashford has also spoken about faith in a very grounded way. Reflecting on his family's journey, he said, "The faith we have in God is shown by the people that we are." He added that when he looks back at where his family came from and where they are now, "it's impossible not to have faith in God and all he does for us." That is a powerful testimony: not just faith as words, but faith expressed in gratitude, character and service to others.

Other moments have been equally striking. The sight of Egypt's players kneeling together in prayer after victory was touching and memorable. In a world that can so often seem driven by status, wealth and power, such moments point us towards something deeper: humility, gratitude and the recognition that our gifts are not ours alone.

So, what can we take from this? Perhaps the lesson is simple, but important. When we are successful, we should remember to give thanks to God for his goodness and provision. When we are struggling, we should remember where to turn. Faith does not mean we avoid disappointment, pressure or pain. It means that in the middle of all those things, we are not alone.

Football may give us drama, passion and unforgettable moments, but it can also remind us of something greater. Whether in victory or defeat, celebration or struggle, we are invited to place our lives in God's hands, to live with gratitude, and to trust him for the journey ahead.

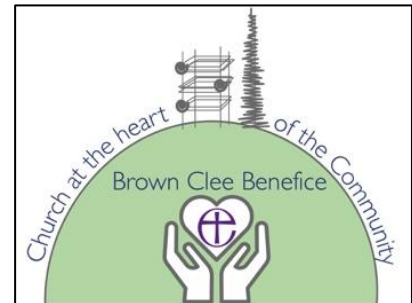


Brown Clee Benefice News

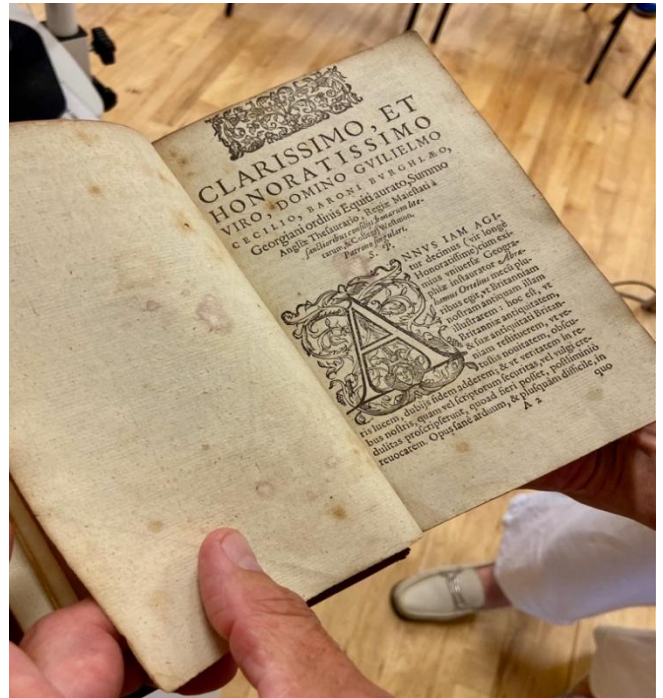




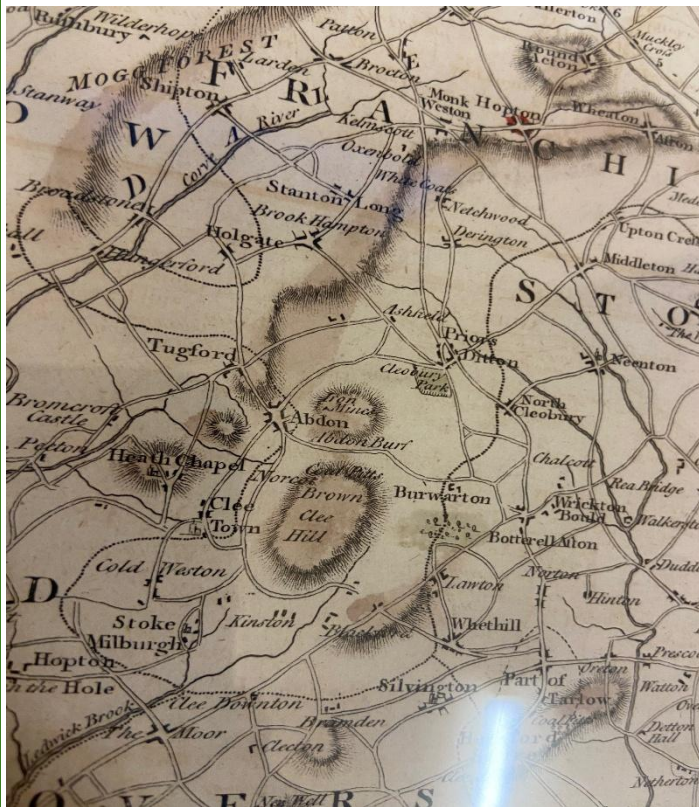

Memorial Service Brown Clee Hill at 2pm Saturday 5th September 2026.

With kind permission of Viscount Boyne, a service to commemorate the loss of military personnel on and around the Brown Clee Hill area during WWII will be held at 2pm on Saturday 5th September at the Memorial Site near the summit on Brown Clee Hill.

The service will be conducted by Revd. Joe Simons and will conclude with the playing of the 'Last Post' and laying of poppy wreaths in memory of both allied and German personnel who tragically lost their lives.

It is anticipated the service will last approximately 20 minutes.

Brown Clee Benefice is required to bring to the attention of all potential attendees the Health and Safety risks involved to be considered before attending this service.

The memorial site is near the summit of Brown Clee Hill and is located on Burwarton Estate. A very open and extremely exposed area. The location is approximately 2 ½ miles from the rendezvous point Cleobury North Village Hall. The route to the memorial site is via a combination of tarmac roads, stone tracks and very uneven trails.

It is advised substantial 4WD vehicles be used for this journey.

On completion of this journey vehicles will be parked in a rough clearing by a wooded area. It is then necessary to make the remaining one third of a mile distance to the memorial site on foot. Vehicles or assisted disabled wheelchairs cannot gain access to this area of Brown Clee Hill.

Unfortunately, it is advised that any person requiring walking assistance should consider very carefully before attending the service as the ground conditions, dependent on weather, can be a mixture of mud or hard uneven ground. The site is very exposed and suitable footwear/clothing should be worn to deal with the weather conditions of the day.

It must also be noted there are no seating facilities at the site.

All attending this service do so at their own risk.

It is proposed that all persons attending rendezvous at CNVH at 1.15pm on Saturday 5th September and anyone without suitable transport can be allocated to volunteers with spare capacity in their 4WD vehicles

On completion of the service light refreshments will be provided at CNVH and an invitation is made to anyone who cannot attend the service to remain at the hall awaiting the return of the service congregation.

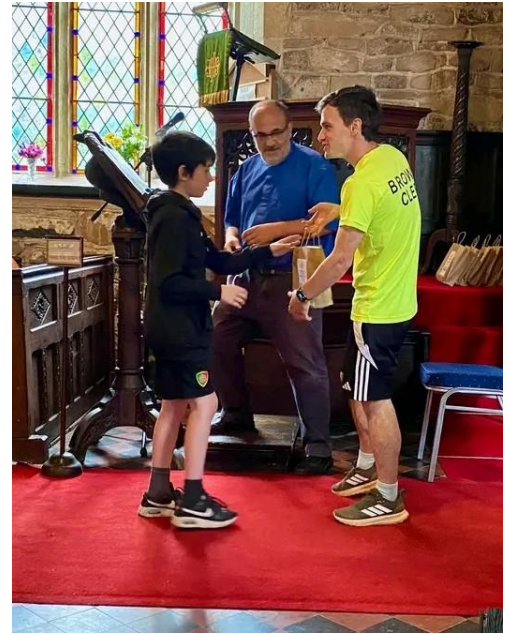

News from Stottesdon

I am sure this *not* news to anyone reading these pages but the decision whether to water or not to water looms large in the mind of any gardener at the moment. We know that the first shower of rain will green up the parched lawns as if by magic but that some of the plants will never recover and be part of the changing landscape as climate change sends gardeners and farmers and growers as Farming Today reminds us (5.45am on Radio 4 if you are around at this time) to use plants more tolerant of extremes of temperature.

A failure in the water supply recently created a sense of absolute challenge as the cattle (who drink between 27 and 55 litres of water a day, depending on their weight and air temperature etc) gathered in mournfully noisy clusters around empty water troughs. Water comes into an ordinary galvanised trough through the usual system of pipes and ballcocks housed in a metal casing to try to protect the mechanism. Cattle know where the water comes into the trough and can bash the system to destruction should the water cease to flow. As it seems the hot summers will continue and the water supply can fail the farmer has invested in the trial of a concrete trough roughly four times the capacity of the usual trough and much more than four times as robust. Seeing one of these full of cool water and looking remarkably like a bath tub does give pause for thought amongst the humans on a hot day. Hummmm.....maybe even a business opportunity if the pool at Highley seems a long way away.

Stottesdon & District WI Meeting – Guest Speaker from Severn Valley Railway (SVR)

We had a remarkably good membership turnout for the meeting on the 15th July with two partners also in attendance, where we had a super evening with a talk by Jim from the SVR.

Jim was very knowledgeable and engaging. He has worked as a volunteer for many years, and in fact came to the meeting straight from work in his uniform! We learnt that they have some 1,400 volunteers, and have specialist boiler makers and other craftsmen employed. It was super to hear that they have apprenticeship schemes for the various crafts as well.

Fundraising is always a challenge, but with the help of some grants, they have been able to enhance the railway in various ways. Their current project is to install a platform canopy at Kidderminster station. It was refreshing to hear that with anything they do, they try to use reclaimed historically correct materials, or manufactured items to replicate the historical. Protecting Brown Clee's Rural Character

As work begins on the new Local Plan, I will be arguing strongly for policies that recognise the importance of safeguarding our green fields, agricultural land and rural landscape. While there will always be a need for some new homes, I believe that should mean small developments that fit naturally within our villages, helping local families remain in the communities they know and love. I do not believe Brown Clee is the right place for large-scale housing developments and I will oppose proposals that would fundamentally alter the character of our communities or place unacceptable pressure on roads, schools, healthcare services and other local infrastructure. Our villages are surrounded by beautiful countryside, productive farmland and green spaces that define the area we call home. Throughout the Local Plan process I will continue to make the case that Brown Clee's future must be shaped by the people who live here, work here and raise their families here.

Your Voice Matters

I encourage you to get involved when consultation opportunities arise. You can find all the details and relevant forms on Shropshire Council's website. Please take a few minutes to complete surveys, attend consultation events where possible and make your views known. Too often, decisions are influenced by a relatively small number of responses. The more residents who participate the stronger Brown Clee's voice will be when decisions are made.

Together, we can help ensure that the future of Brown Clee reflects the wishes of local people while preserving the countryside and village character that make our area so special.

St Mary's press release July 2026

The *Common Treasury* project at St Mary's church Cleeton has got off to a roaring start. Songwriter Sid Peacock has been working with children from Farlow Primary School to write new pieces for the Song of the Hill. This collection of works celebrates the Clee hills and their heritage. The new songs had their first performance at St Mary's with a full band, historic instruments and a very full audience. There was standing room only as the children sang and played for villagers and parents.

One parent commented: "This has been such an amazing experience for the children. They will remember this for a very long time and it was so good to see it come together so beautifully."

As well as bringing the community together to celebrate this heritage, the project will see the church preserved and enhanced for the next generation. The roof is being retiled and power and lighting improved along with new displays about the unique history and nature of the area for visitors and locals.

Central to the project is the fact that the village is surrounded and shaped by common land, which residents can use for grazing and gathering materials. Inspired by this history, potter Rupert Brakspear has been investigating the sources of wild clay around Cleeton. On the 10th of July he led a walk to the historic clay pits and participants had the chance to work the clay straight from the ground. On August 22nd there is the opportunity to make and stamp a small tile from the clay of Clee Hill which will form part of a display about the people and landscape. Spaces are limited (as is the clay!) So please contact hello@cleetonstmary.uk for a free place. The tiles will then be fired overnight in a traditional pit kiln in September.

Sue Burbidge, project lead explains: "There are few places in the country where the complex and intimate relationship between people and their environment is so clear. Commoners rights embody a principle of care for the landscape that, if looked after well, will continue to flourish and provide resources for the community."

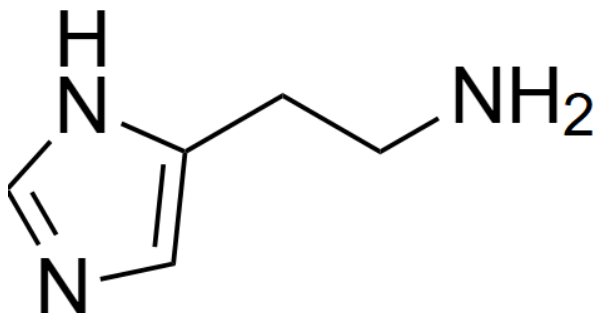


Performance of Song of the Hill at Cleeton St Mary church

Molecule of the month; Histamine by David Poyner

Recently, your editor complained of Hay Fever and laid down a challenge to Molecule of the Month to explain what was happening. As I am limited to a page of A4, not a 300 page text book, that is going to be difficult. What I can do is give an account of one of the main molecules that is released during hay fever, histamine (Figure 1).

Histamine is a simple molecule. Chemically it is made up of a ring to which is attached nitrogen (N) and hydrogen (H); what is known as an amino group (NH₂). That gives the “amine” part to its name. The “Hist” comes from the Greek word for body tissues, because when it was first discovered in 1910 by Sir Henry Dale and Patrick Laidlaw, they found it was abundant in almost all tissues of the human body but was not found in nerves. Histamine is mainly found in two types of cells connected with how the body protects itself by producing inflammation; mast cells in solid tissues and white blood cells called basophils. Inflammation is normally a good thing; it is key way the body protects itself. During inflammation a number of things happen. Blood vessels expand and become leaky. This is important as it brings white blood cells to a vulnerable area where they can fight infection, repair damage and remove toxins. The

increased blood causes swelling (due to the extra fluid), redness and also an increase in temperature. Nerves that respond to pain are also made more sensitive, so the damaged area is rested to give it time to recover. However, sometimes the inflammation is inappropriate; it can do more harm than good. Hay fever is an example of this.

During hay fever, the person breathes in grass pollen. Some of this gets into the body via the lining of the windpipe and the lungs. The body can react by making antibodies against this. These antibodies bind to the surface of mast cells. When the antibodies on the mast cells next encounter the pollen, they activate the mast cells, causing them to release histamine. Blood vessels, particularly in the nose and eyes start leaking fluid and nerves that cause itching are activated, hence the symptoms of hay-fever. People who suffer from hay fever are particularly prone to making antibodies against grass and tree pollen. The reason for this remains unclear, but there are various regulators of the immune system called interleukins which may become unregulated in hay fever sufferers; there is particular interest in one called interleukin 33. Genetics may play a part in why this happens.

Histamine causes blood vessels to expand and become leaky by activating a protein called the histamine H₁ receptor, found on the outside of cells that line blood vessels. The receptor is also found on nerve cells that cause itching. There are drugs that can stop histamine from binding to this protein and they are the active ingredient in many of the anti-histamine remedies that are available. Unfortunately, when mast cells become activated they release other chemicals besides histamine and so sometimes simply blocking the histamine receptors will not bring effective relief. More advanced therapies for hay fever work by stopping the mast cells from becoming active, by down-regulating the immune system or by neutralising the antibodies against the pollen so they no longer recognise it.

Histamine is a molecule of many parts. Antihistamine creams are used to treat many minor rashes or itches, such as those caused by insect bites. The expansion of blood vessels produced by histamine can, rarely, cause a potentially fatal fall in blood pressure; this is known as anaphylactic shock and is why wasp and bee stings can be dangerous in a few individuals. The histamine-H₁ receptor is found in the brain, where, amongst other things, it promotes wakefulness. This is behind one of the main side effects of H₁ blockers, as they can cause drowsiness.

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Chelmarsh News:



The annual plant sale on Saturday 27th June attracted a good turnout, despite the very hot weather. Business started rather earlier than the official 10am opening, as people took advantage of the cool of the morning. The marque and the trees in the churchyard gave some shade; the church itself was pleasantly cool. It was good to see so many people from the community coming to support us. The church was also well represented at the fete on 11th July, another very hot day. As with the plant sale, people seemed to brave the heat and my impression was that it was well-attended

We were fortunate to obtain a grant of £550 from the “Net Zero Carbon Quick Wins” fund administered by Hereford diocese to repair leaks around the lead at the top of the church roof. The hot weather has allowed this work to be completed by our contractor Richard Poyner.

We are looking into how we manage the unmown area of the churchyard. A few years ago, around 50 different flowers were growing here, but this number has declined due to problems with mowing it so as to encourage them. After talking to Caring for God’s Acre we have some ideas on how to restore this.

Billingsley News:



We had a visit from the Caring for God’s Acre team on the 8th July, to cut the grass in the churchyard. For the most part, they cut back the coarser vegetation to encourage the growth of flowers and more delicate plants. However, some clumps of brambles are allowed to remain as they are particularly important for the various animals that live in the churchyard. Alex, who is in charge of the work, told us that they have found slow worms in the church, although not today as the weather was too hot. We did however see a dragon fly and various butterflies, The church mouse, spotted by the cleaning team, remained in doors, out of the sun.

In July, our 6pm service was a look at the Shetlands. These are the most northerly part of the British Isles and of course now feature in a TV Detective series. Sadly, I have to report that during a recent visit, I found no sign of murders or indeed clan atrocities, a staple of the Hebrides. What the Shetlands do offer is stunning costal scenery and abundant birds, seals and otters. For much of its history it was part of Norway and so has a very different feel to many other Scottish Islands. It was a place where I could mentally relax and empty myself. We had a good attendance for the service.

At our August evening service, we welcome back Sue and Phil Bates. Sue gave invaluable service to Billingsley when she and Phil lived her, both to the church and also to the parish council. They are widely travelled and her talks are always interesting.

Our June Sunday service coincided with Father's Day and I am delighted to report that our treasurer brought his daughter and son-in-law and grandchildren to the service. We had almost 20 in the congregation and it was very good to have a range of ages.

Things are not what they used to be! *By Anni Calver*

It's been delightful recently visiting and working in our churchyards, many of which are full of colourful summer flowers in amongst the gravestones. But not everyone agrees with me! Some people feel that the grass should be kept well mowed and very neat and tidy. This got me thinking about the people who had built our ancient churches a thousand years ago.



In those days the only building in the village was the newly built stone church, started as a small place for worship and then expanded as the naves were added. William the Conqueror was very encouraging after his triumph at Hastings and bringing his forward-looking fancy French clever building ideas. The church would have been novel for our ancestors. Imagine putting all that effort in and only using it once a week for service. That is not what happened then. While the chancel, the part of the church where the altar stands was reserved for the priest, the nave became the meeting place for everyone.

So, while moved by faith to build the church, it soon became a covered space for other activities. There is plenty of evidence, particularly in the Marches, (the area of Herefordshire, Shropshire and parts of Wales) of games being played with balls thrown and caught from the walls of the buildings- something you could do then if the rain was pouring down. The nave was also used for council meetings and as a court if needed, and as time went on other events were introduced. Patronal festivals and the marking of important feast days became more than just a service by the addition of singing, dancing and drinking. They were very busy places.



Ironically today many of our churches are used for services once a month and often little else. Changes are happening to make them more useful but opposition to the addition of toilets and kitchens and removal of the Victorian pews can be very hard work for those keen for change.

Back in the churchyard where we started, the work of Caring for God's Acre has made the meadow approach more popular as many a village now enjoys an amazing

display of wildflowers, a stunning spread of colour, decorating the headstones. They now look as they would have looked a thousand years ago but with bigger yew trees.

The Importance of Species Abundance

It is widely known that the UK is one of the most nature depleted countries in the world. We have lost at least half of our wildlife since the industrial revolution, and 1 in 6 of our species is at risk of extinction. Our destruction of habitats, sterilisation of landscapes, and pollution of waterways have driven the collapse of our ecosystems and much that they support.



Shifting Baseline Syndrome, a gradual change in the accepted norms for the condition of the natural environment over time, masks this loss of species abundance and is not seen by the majority. When combined with an extinction of experience, a generational reduction in knowledge passed down due to less engagement with the natural world, it has caused most of the population to have a very warped sense of what our wider landscape and the species that frequent there should look like, and ultimately cause further extinction.

For many years we have managed land as nature reserves – relatively small, isolated pockets, where we protect a particular habitat and suite of species. While this has largely worked well in saving specific areas, and hugely important so they can act as rich hubs for when we have a wilder landscape, it's forced our perceptions of which species truly belong in which habitat to falter, with many species clinging on to the edges of where they can survive. When given the space, there are now countless examples of species not adhering to the guidebooks – Purple Emperor on sallows at the Knepp Estate and White-tailed Eagles nesting low down on willows in the Oostvaardersplassen just being a couple of examples.



We can't address this exponential loss with incremental change, protecting our existing nature is simply not enough if we want to stop a sixth great extinction. There is now a large push across the UK to move towards extensive, landscape scale restoration, where we can restore natural processes such as water restoration and introducing mixed grazing, to establish mosaic landscapes proven to deliver high levels of species diversity and abundance. Increasing abundance in both isolated populations and meta-populations helps build resilience across a landscape. Resilience is needed to prevent population loss, and ultimately extinction, by better enabling species to withstand both anthropogenically driven and stochastic events such as climate change, pollution, disease, and habitat loss.



As a new Senior Reserves Officer at Shropshire Wildlife Trust, I will be looking to put these principles into practice across any suitable land, helping to drive a nature recovery network across the county.

Who Doesn't Love Foxgloves!



In July we decided to meet informally at Stockton Bury Gardens, near Leominster for a cuppa and a look around the gardens. But with temperature predicted to be in excess of 30 degrees, Stockton Nury decide to close early each afternoon and so our visit was cancelled. This gave me a dilemma about what to write for August's edition of this magazine, but it seems like a good opportunity to republish an article written by our former president Dr. John Bell, who sadly passed away earlier this year. John wrote so beautifully and his article were extremely informative, so I have chosen 'Foxgloves'. This is something quite magical about them and John used his medical knowledge and expertise to enlighten us about the use of this common but versatile plant in modern medicine.

The name 'foxglove' is as old as the time of Edward III. In Wales it is thought to be the hideout of fairies and so is called 'fairy folks finger' or 'lamb's tongue leaves'. In Scotland, it is called 'bloody fingers' and moving further north 'dead men's bells'! The Scandinavian legend regarding the prefix 'fox' tells that mischievous fairies gave the flowers to muffle his paws as he prowled around village hen houses.

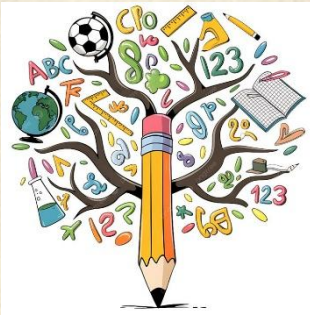
Digitalis is a genus of about 20 species, mainly perennials, shrubs and biennials. It grows over large areas of the world and the best-known is **Common Foxglove *Digitalis purpurea***. It thrives in acidic soils in partial sunlight to deep shade commonly found where the ground has been recently disturbed. Country lore advises its use in companion planting, where it is suggested that placing it around apples, tomatoes and potatoes simultaneously, stimulates growth of these plants.

In 1775, Dr William Withering working at the new Birmingham general hospital, was treating a patient for heart failure, the treatment was failing. The patient sought a herbal remedy from a gypsy woman and recovered, which roused Dr. Withering's interest. He found a woman in Shropshire and learned from her the concoction of herbs which included the foxglove. This was at the time the traditional cure for dropsy, a condition suggested by the swelling of the tissue due to the poor action of a failing heart. He knew that the extract from foxgloves was potentially fatal. He spent ten years experimenting to find a safe standard dosage, sometimes trying the infusions on himself. In 1885, he published his research with over 150 successful cases, and it followed that an extract of powdered leaf was used for treatment in medicine. Prior to this date, going back 100 years, foxgloves were recommended for skin complaints with the leaves applied directly to wounds as a poultice. The entire plant is toxic, including the roots and seeds, but Dr. Withering used ***Digitalis purpurea*** extract containing cardiac glycosides which increase the contractile muscle power of the heart, as well as being an antiarrhythmic agent to control the heart rate. It is thought that this was the beginning of modern therapeutics. ***Digitalis lantana*** is grown commercially for pharmaceutical use. Though there are over 20 species of digitalis in cultivation, only a few enter the plant catalogues and hence into private gardens.

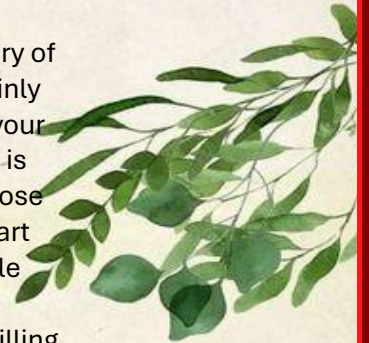
The genus is placed in the figwort family, ***Scrophulariaceae***. The flowers of the foxglove ***Digitalis purpurea*** are produced in a tall spike in the second year of growth. In the first year only one stem develops with long basal leaves, but in its second year the long leafy stem grows to over 100 inches. ***D. purpurea*** 'Apricot' has delicate shades of apricot-coloured flowers. ***D. purpurea*** 'Pams' Choice' has dense spikes of large creamy white bell flowers and splotches of deep burgundy colour in their throats. ***D. ferruginea*** 'Rusty' has striking, almost globular rusty red coloured flowers on long leafy spikes. ***D. lutea***, the small yellow foxglove has glossy green leaves and pretty yellow flowers crowded down to one side of the spike. A larger, but short-lived, yellow/white flowered species ***D. grandiflora***. ***D. x Mertonensis*** is a very fine hybrid described as having flowers the colour of crushed strawberries!

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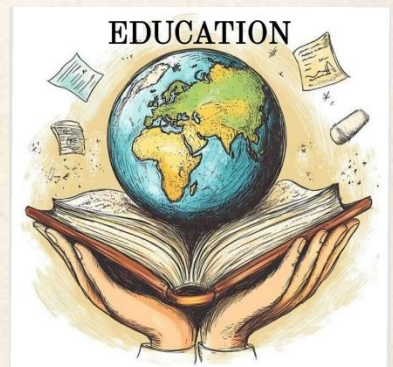

I can still remember one of my teachers, Mrs. Stephens, who was very proud of having taught me as the last one of three brothers all taught by her, I still have a lifelong love of reading mainly because of her.



Malala Yousafzai who with two other girls were shot by a gunman targeting her for her activism in educating girls who were banned from school said “Let us remember: One book, one pen, one child and one teacher can change the world”.



As the children leave these schools and prepare to embark on going to “big school” it brings a mix of emotions—excitement, stress, nostalgia, and everything in between, some will be going to different schools, there will be different teachers and different routines, so remember as you leave “goodbyes are not forever; goodbyes are not the end; they simply mean I’ll miss you until we meet again”.
