Friday Prayers for Peace and Reconciliation
Friday 21st August 2026

Bible Reading: Matthew 22.34-40

When the Pharisees heard that Jesus had silenced the Sadducees, they gathered together, and one of them, a lawyer, asked him a question to test him. 'Teacher, which commandment in the law is the greatest?' He said to him, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind." This is the greatest and first commandment. And a second is like it: "You shall love your neighbour as yourself." On these two commandments hang all the law and the prophets.'

Reflection

There are so many forms of suffering in our world which call for our prayers and concern that we can easily feel overwhelmed. Over the next three days there are United Nations observances that highlight just a few of these. Today, and each year on 21st August, is kept as International Day of Remembrance and Tribute to the Victims of Terrorism. Tomorrow, and each year on 22nd August, is kept as International Day Commemorating the Victims of Acts of Violence Based on Religion or Belief. Then Sunday, and each year on 23rd August, is kept as International Day for the Remembrance of the Slave Trade and Its Abolition. None of these are purely the commemoration of past events but rather they remind us of continuing acts of injustice and suffering in our world today.

In each case it is usually innocent people who are victims, who suffer, men, women and children. It is often the most vulnerable, those who are poor, those who are powerless, who are the victims. Such terrible treatments they receive are a telling indictment on humanity. Acts of terrorism can never be justified in any circumstances, whatever motivation may lie behind them. The same is true of violence that is committed based on religion or belief. Freedom to follow one's religion is a basic human right. The slave trade was a truly abominable practice. Thanks to courageous campaigners it was officially outlawed. Yet forms of modern slavery and trafficking are still prevalent today, where individuals are deprived of both their freedom and their human dignity.

The Christian answer is the need for love, as expressed clearly in our Bible reading, which is the Gospel passage for today. Love treats everyone equally. Love accords everyone their true dignity and worth. Love does not dominate but instead serves. Love does not cause harm or suffering but instead enables others to flourish. Love does not consider its own needs and ambitions first but instead the needs and aspirations of others. Human love is a reflection, however weak at times, of God's love for the whole of humanity. May our prayer be that the power of love may prevail in all corners of our world. With God's help may love triumph over injustice, exploitation, prejudice and hatred.
