



From the Vicar's Study ...

I wonder if there are any other bookworms out there? I am sure there must be. From earliest childhood I have been an avid reader, and books hold a special place in my heart. In student days I was reduced to reading odd snippets, little chunks of text to support whatever argument I was making in an essay or dissertation. For a while fiction fell off my radar, until one year my sister did a wonderful thing and handed me a book token for my birthday. Her gift rekindled my literary imagination and re-established an old habit which has stuck. I already have a stack of novels on the shelves by the fire, waiting for the autumn evenings ahead. But the truth is I love all kinds of books, fiction or non-fiction, art books, travel guides and collections of recipes, even knitting patterns.



Recently I bought a very special book for my study. It is called *Exciting Holiness* and lists the collects and readings for the Festivals and Lesser Festivals of the Church year. I am guessing that some of you might wonder what is so exciting about that. Let me tell you. Each dated entry begins with a short biography of the saint, teacher or noteworthy person being celebrated on that day. By doing so it offers an insight into the diversity of Christian experience throughout the centuries. I would like to share a few of my favourite entries for September.

On the 3rd September we remember Gregory the Great, Bishop of Rome and teacher of the faith. Gregory was the son of a rich and powerful man but sold his inheritance to become a monk. In 590 he was elected Pope and sent Augustine and forty monks to successfully re-establish the English Church. Hot on his heels on the 4th, the church remembers my favourite Saint, Cuthbert of Lindisfarne, a man so holy that otters would come and dry his feet when he emerged from the freezing waters where he would pray.

The birth of the Blessed Virgin Mary is marked on the 8th, and for those raised on *The Book of Common Prayer*, John Chrysostom features on the 13th. On the 17th musicians and singers might like to reflect on the life of Hildegard of Bingen, and tax-collectors can remember St. Matthew on the 21st. There really is something for everyone, and as someone whose own spiritual journey included working for the Chalice Well Trust near Glastonbury Tor, the 29th offers an angelic jamboree as St Michael and All Angels, the beloved messengers of God, are celebrated. St Peter's Annual Parochial Church Meeting (APCM)

We will be holding our delayed APCM in St Peter's after the Sunday Service on 6th September at 11.15 am. The 2020 Agenda and the minutes of the 2019 APCM have been emailed to all on the Electoral Roll for whom I have an email address, an Agenda is also displayed on the Church Noticeboard.

I sent out the Annual Report and Financial Statements for the year ended 31st December 2019, together with the other reports to be presented at the APCM, back in May, if anyone would like a further email or paper copy or any other information please get in touch.

At the Annual Vestry Meeting before the APCM we elect our Churchwardens and have two nominations: **Eric Deyes** and **Geoff Hamlet**, our current Churchwardens, who are happy to stand for re-election.

At the APCM we need to elect 2 Deanery Synod members and have just one nomination: **Anne Sear**. We also need to elect 4 PCC members who will serve for 3 years (until April 2023), we have the following nominations: **Belinda Canning**, **Lynn Godfrey-James**, **Geoff Knapman**, **Jane Widgery**. The completed form can be emailed to me or left in the PCC Secretary drawer at the back of St Peter's church on one of the days when it is open, usually Sunday and Wednesday.

Somerset Churches Trust is an independent, registered charity dedicated to raising money to support churches of all denominations with the giving of grants for repairs, restorations and alterations to aid greater community use.

Much of the income is raised during '**Ride + Stride for Churches**' which, this year, takes place on **Saturday 12th September**. (If this date is not convenient, then any date between 5th and the 20th September is acceptable). In the twenty four years since the Trust was founded in 1996, **£466,478.00** has been raised during 'Ride + Stride', all of which has been recycled in the form of grants. This has been a major contributor to the more than £750,000 that the Trust has given to the churches, chapel and meeting houses of Somerset over the same period.

In 2021, the Somerset Churches Trust celebrates its twenty-fifth anniversary and our target is to raise our total income from 'Ride + Stride for Churches' to **£500,000.00**. With this firmly in our mind, and with your help, we are confident that we will do so.

With the Covid-19 pandemic affecting our country, 'Ride+Stride for churches' this year will be slightly different. The traditional format of walking, cycling, or by any means you prefer, between the churches or chapels in your area will still be available to those willing and able to do so, but the churches may not be open and will not be able to offer refreshment. Living the story. Telling the story.



I am writing this whilst receiving treatment in hospital, although by the time you read this, I hope that I may be back home having completed my first course of chemotherapy. The first thing I want to say, and I am sure this is echoed by so many, is what wonderful treatment and care I have received from everyone in the hospital. Their kindness, concern and professionalism are beyond words.

What is an unusual experience for me, however, is that I have not been allowed to leave my room and the doors and windows have been kept firmly shut. Looking out of my window and craning my neck upwards I am just able to get a glimpse of the sky outside. Without that I would not know whether it was sunny or cloudy or raining outside. Not that I am in any way complaining. I am safe and receiving the best care imaginable. It is also important whatever may happen to keep a sense of proportion. I vividly recall hearing Terry Waite speak when he came to the diocese on one occasion. It is unimaginable what he went through in those 1763 days in Beirut – the first four years of which were spent in solitary confinement, blindfolded, in a basement room with no windows, with no books or papers, chained to a radiator and sleeping on the floor. His courage and faith are remarkable and have inspired so many people since. I remember him once being interviewed and being asked what the happiest moment of his life was, one that he would cherish forever. He replied: ‘When my blindfold was taken off during my release in November 1991. I’d been in the dark – in a basement or blindfolded - for years. For the first time in five years I saw the sky, the grass, the colours, and I felt the wind on my face.’

Terry Waite is also very clear about how the prayers of so many others supported him through those years. As I write I am also very aware of all the prayers that have and are being said for me. That is both humbling and encouraging and once I am getting out and about again, I look forward to being able to thank you personally.





It was a pleasure to return to Evercreech Village Hall for our monthly meeting after having to resort to remote internet meetings for the last couple of months due to coronavirus restrictions. Guidance has also allowed us to reopen the playground, albeit that it comes with a warning that we cannot regularly sanitize the equipment, so users are responsible for their own precautions. We are continuing to roll out a maintenance programme following the update of our asset register, which means the refurbishment of all the seats in the village should be completed this summer, and following a tree survey, any works recommended for trees should commence after the nesting season ends on 1st September.

The Village Bier, with was which was so expertly restored by prisoners at Shepton Mallet prison will be returning there after a request from the prison to put it on display. The Greencore site remains a major concern, with reports of vandalism and nuisance. The Parish Council decided to support the efforts of our District Councillor in getting the owner to provide more robust security on site, and will write to the owners to request just that. Whoever said that summer days were lazy clearly never lived in a village like Evercreech! My work at MDC continues on at pace, attending meetings, providing updates including regular videos to inform you.

I am very pleased that with ever changing government guidelines, it was established Evercreech was entitled to a further £10,000 grant. I am a little astonished to confirm our community has benefited to the tune of £40,000 a positive outcome amongst the disorder of CV19. The council will consider what to do; **my personal preferred focus is to tackle speeding, village signage and resident safety. A unique and most importantly, funded opportunity to make a big difference to long term problems, so watch this space!**

I want to say **“THANK YOU”** to all 130 residents who attended the public meeting concerning the ex-Greencore site, and for the thoughtful questions. There seems to be next to little understanding on the developer’s part of the opportunity this site can offer. There is the danger of a negative impact from the addition of 129 homes with overwhelming pressure on the village school, shops, surgery and roads.

The rejection of any plan for employment use will rob future generations of local work opportunities. It ignores the obvious need for associated infrastructure, including expansion of the village shop or adding more retail and community services. There seems a determination to wipe away our finely built industrial past. By seizing on English Heritage’s decision, taken on technical grounds, not to provide listing protection for the original buildings, **the site owners are being selfishly opportunistic and insensitive.** Finally, there is a lack of ecological or design awareness. Their plan is for a bland ‘off the shelf’ standardised unimaginative development that could be built in any inner city setting. They show little concern for the impact on our rural settlement especially the visual impact of an unsuitable design in our rural environment. I am glad several residents have taken the step of establishing an action group to demand better; please contact me for details.

This week I had confirmation that Idverde will visit the village to engage a full road and hedge clean-up which I hope is actioned by the time you read this report.

Finally, it would seem that the days of having MDC and SCC may be numbered. There are now two proposals with the minister for consideration and we should know ‘in theory’ by October the direction of travel. Both councils will continue for now and certainly there would be a period of transition. Be assured I am here to help you, make life better!
