Nikolaus Pevsner in his *Buildings of England* series, describes St James' as being the best Perpendicular work in Colchester.

Architectural evidence shows that the Church was founded by the 12th century or earlier. From 1328 or earlier until the Dissolution St Botolph's priory was patron, presenting regularly except on two occasions in 1469 when Coggeshall abbey presented. We want this Church to continue. Would you help to ensure that it continues to survive for generations to come, please?
