

The English Origin of Valentine's



The Feast of Saint Valentine was established by Pope Gelasius I in AD 496 to be celebrated on February 14 in honour of Saint Valentine of Rome, who died on that date in AD 269. The day became associated with romantic love in the 14th and 16th centuries

The first real association of Valentine's Day with romantic love, or "love birds," comes from Geoffrey Chaucer's poem Parlement of Foules. Dating from 1382, it states: "For this was on St. Valentine's Day, when every bird cometh there to choose his mate." William Shakespeare's Hamlet (1600–1601) refers to both Saint Valentine's Day and the phrase "to be your Valentine," showing that Valentine's Day was established in British culture by that time.

Response to God's Word

Sermon by Diane Lystor

Valentine's Day.

1 Corinthians 12.31-13.8 John 15. 9-15

May my words be in the name of the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit. **Amen.**

"Remain in my love."

Some years ago, Dr. Han Suyin wrote that "Love is a many splendored thing." The "love" she was referring to, was the love she shared with an Australian War Correspondent who sadly lost his life in the Korean War.

That love, opened up for this intelligent, well educated woman a whole new understanding of life, what really matters, just what two people can mean to each other and achieve together.

Love is "splendored" because it crosses boundaries, is filled with, and in its turn creates magnificent features and marvels. A deep, profound love that lasts throughout the changing scenes of life can illuminate the soul.

Love is what we are celebrating today – Valentine's Day! Not simply with flowers, chocolates and cards with big red hearts on them, although it is always lovely to receive them! We also give thanks to God for the power, strength and joy of this emotion.

There are several legends regarding St. Valentine of Rome, some more fanciful than others! But we can be fairly sure that he was a 3rd Century Priest or Bishop in the Roman Empire who ministered to the persecuted Christians. His devotion to Christ and success with healing the sick brought him to the attention of the Emperor who, after a friendly start, then decided to have poor Valentine executed.

Valentine is believed to have written a letter to a young woman (whose eyesight he had miraculously restored) on the morning of February 14th the day of his execution signing it "your Valentine" and this date has been observed as his Feast Day since 496 AD. I wonder what he would think of today's celebrations in his name because there is no hint of a romantic involvement for him at all!

The same can be said with regard to St. Paul: there is no doubt that Paul relied on the friendship of women throughout his ministry, Lydia and Priscilla being just two of them. He also depended heavily on his friendship with men such as Silas, Timothy, Luke, Titus and others.

His need for them is often expressed in his letters; he needs their company, companionship, understanding, devotion to ministry. He needs them to take news to other Christian communities and to bring HIM news too – he longs for their company. He just needs them to be there with him.

When Paul first arrived in Corinth he was in low spirits: he had suffered a bruising time in Athens where the philosophers made short work of his

teachings. What did this little bald headed Jewish ex Pharisee tent maker have to tell them about worship and spiritual matters!

At the beginning of this letter, Paul confesses to the Corinthians that he had come to them "in weakness and fear and with much trembling."

Poor man: fortunately, on his arrival he met another Jewish couple Aquila and Priscilla who had been expelled from Rome for their faith and the three forge a lasting friendship. At first, he works with them in their tent making business, until Silas and Timothy arrive bringing with them a gift of money that will enable Paul to give up tent making and concentrate on his ministry.

It is not easy going: worship of every pagan god you can think of is alive and well in Corinth! This fledgling Church is made up of lively argumentative people, so it should not be a surprise that as soon as Paul moves on to Ephesus they fall into trouble, arguing and fighting among themselves.

Paul is deeply troubled to hear what is happening and what we know as 1 Corinthians is his response to it and contains some of his most beautiful writing, especially on love. Paul knows how the power of the love of Jesus Christ can transform lives because it has done so for him. Paul now lives for Jesus, in Jesus, with Jesus. The Spirit of Jesus fills his life, every fibre of his being. It galvanises him into travelling from one place to another, always preaching, teaching, bring the message of the saving love of Jesus Christ.

Yet, he cannot do it all alone. He may have thought he could to begin with but very quickly Paul learns that he needs the friendship, help and companionship of other Christian workers who not only love Jesus but understand and love Paul too. He could not have been an easy character to work with, but these loyal friends sustain him over the years.

Their devotion both the Gospel and to Paul are a living example of what Jesus is teaching his closest friends in todays Gospel reading. "Love each other as I have loved you. Greater love has no-one than this, that he lay down his life for his friends."

To love each other is the only new command that Jesus makes. It sounds simple, but Jesus knows it will not be so and goes on to tell them just how much he is prepared to do for his followers. His example will reveal the

depth of his love as joyous obedience to God and selfless service of others. Our role is to continue his love – branches of the vine.

Jesus is teaching this to the twelve who will between them betray, desert and deny him in his hour of greatest need, and he is aware that they will do this. Yet he still puts all his trust in them, as he does us too. We are all fallible human beings. Yet we can achieve wonderful, fantastic things through the love of Jesus in our lives. Above all we can help each other achieve them too, just as Pauls devoted friends helped him! They weren't merely names added on at the end of his letters, they were vital to his missionary work. Without them he could not have achieved what he did.

Likewise the Disciples: that motley ramshackle bunch who hid away in the upper room fearing for their lives, once filled with the Holy Spirit became unstoppable bearers of the Love of Jesus Christ, the Wounded Healer who showed them the way.

So, Love in all its forms, from passion through to companionship, is a magnificent thing! Breaks down barriers, solves seemingly insurmountable problems, brings help, comforts, encourages, enjoys other people's success, understands, sustains and supports. It has inspired writers, poets, composers and lyricists throughout the ages. It is given, received, cherished and valued. Love is and will always be a many splendored thing.

And so, dear friends, in the name of Jesus Christ – Happy Valentine's Day.

Past and Present: Pastoral Care across space and time

Over the last year churches have wrestled with the question: How is pastoral and spiritual care given remotely, at a distance? It's a question that has been asked before. Indeed, it lies at the heart of USPG and what it means to be a global mission agency.

This Bray Day we will be releasing a fascinating digital archive, a freely available online exhibition of sources and letters from the time of the Society's foundation. This is the result of work undertaken over the last year by USPG in collaboration with scholars at the University of Leeds exploring themes of pastoral care in USPG's archive.

This work focusses on letters exchanged between missionaries in North America and the Caribbean and the Society's headquarters in London. It sheds an extraordinary light on the concerns and issues of pastoral caregiving in the early work of USPG. Pastoral caregiving remains a critical part of the global work of USPG particularly in the context of Covid 19. This evening will provide a rich exploration of the connections between the past and the present.

The world is in crisis; Creation is groaning. People and the Earth have been crying out for many years. But for too long, many people - particularly those in the global North - have chosen not to listen, instead remaining complicit in destruction and continuing to increase inequalities. In such a time as this, what have Christians got to offer?

Our doctrine of creation suggests that it was never meant to be like this, but that human nature is tarnished or fallen. The biblical narrative of salvation provides a remedy and challenges us to play our part in the process of redemption and recreation. This is the journey that we will take together over the six sessions looking at the implications for our daily lives both as individuals and as communities of faith and hope.

We are here for such a time as this. Called to respond with words and actions. USPG partners with churches across the world in their mission of transforming lives through education, health care and justice for all. USPG's partner churches offer us insights, hope and encouragement in the ways that they are confronting the issues of ecological justice in their own context: and in doing so, challenge us to respond: are we ready to accept the challenge?
